Wheeler County voters will go to the polls Saturday to decide the fate of two constitutional amendments and three county education district propositions. Most voters will be required to report to two voting locations to cast their ballots.

The voting on the constitutional amendments will be held in the voters regular voting precinct locations. The voter will need to present his voter registration card.

Amendment No. 1:

Amendment No. 2:

The voter will vote "for" or "against": "The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

The voter will vote "for" or "against": "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to

provide educational loans to students." for the National Little Britches will hold elections to decide the fate

propositions concerning taxation. The first two concern exemptions and the third concerns taxation of tangible

Voters in Wheeler School District will vote at the courthouse, Commissioners Court Room.

The voters will decide "for" or "against":

No. 1: "The exemption of 20 percent of the market value of the residence homestead from ad valorem taxation in twenty-fifth county edu-

cation district." No. 2: "The exemption of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is disabled and of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of ar individual who is 65 or older from ad valorem taxation in twenty-fifth county education district."

No. 3: "The taxation of all tangible personal property, other than manufactured homes, in twenty-fifth county education district .:

The twenty-fifth county education district is all school districts in Each of the local school districts Wheeler, Donley and Collingsworth counties.

Coronado Hospital Opens Therapy Dept.

Coronado Hospital has opened an Occupational Therapy (OT) department, according to an announcement made this week by Al Chapa, assistant administrator. The Occupational Therapy department will work in conjunction with the Physical Therapy department to provide rehabilitation services to both inpatients and outpatients, Chapa said.

Chapa said that the physical therapists. "Edwin Donker and Dorien Groenveld have joined PT director Berrie DeLange to complete the department," he said.

Chapa said the new OT department is a contract unit staffed by HealthFocus, the same company which staffs the physical therapy de-partment. The therapist who is open-ing the unit is Pamela Little, OTR, who completed her bachelor's degree in OT at Boston University in 1988. She has completed internships in adolescent/adult psychiatric OT at Oakland, Calif.; pediatrics at Cincinnati, Ohio; early intervention and psychiatric OT at Boston, Mass.

Ms. Little explained that occupational therapy is a profession concerned with individuals of all ages whose lives have been disrupted by physical, developmental, and/or so-cial deficits. The patient requires special assistance in learning or relearning skills to enable him to lead an independent, productive, and satis-fying life," she said. "Striving to help." the patient achieve optimal indepen-dence is the key to occupational therapy" she noted.

Ms. Little said that the therapist

uses various techniques to evaluate a patient's abilities to function in daily activities. Once the evaluation is done, the therapist devises ways to train the patient in neuromuscular facilitation, muscle strengthening, coordination and dexterity techniques, cognitive and perceptual training, sensory evaluations, range of motion and endurance.

OT can often benefit patients who have neurological impairment, suffer from strokes, arthritis, spinal cord injuries, hand injuries, head injuries, or a variety of pediatric or congenital disorders causing developmental delays or learning disabilities, she said.

"If a patient thinks he can benefit from our services, he should check with his physician. The physician will beable properly to assess the patient's need for occupational therapy," Ms.

In conjunction with the OT department and the newly expanded PT department, Coronado Hospital recently opened a five-bed inpatient rehab unit on the second floor of the facility, which will specialize in orthopedic rehabilitation, Chapa said. Frank Vincenti, MD, an orthopedic surgeon in practice in Pampa, is the director of the unit.

Patients referred to this unit will receive therapy-intensive treatment, Chapa said, consisting of three hours of combined therapy each day. Therapies may include occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech therapy, dietary therapy, and social services. The rehab team will also include nurses and physicians to provide complete comprehensive care on the unit.





From the Minister's Desk:

In the eighth chapter of the book of Acts, there is recorded an account of a person's conversion to Christianity. (Acts 8:26-40) This person was "-an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of Candace, queen of the Ethiopians—." (verse 27)

This person's conversion occurred as he was returning to Ethiopia from Jerusalem where he had gone "-to worship-". As "he was returning and sitting in his chariot, and was reading the prophet Isaiah-", the eunuch was approached by Phillip, the evangelist, who ask: "Do you understand what you are reading?" (verse 30)

And this question is still pertinent. A national news magazine recently reported that the Bible is annually listed among the top ten selling books in the United States. But while the Bible is a best selling book, it is also apparent that it is a book that is largely misunderstood. Several reasons could be suggested for this misunderstanding, but I think that the most logical would be the failure of its readers to apply some prin-

ciples of Biblical interpretation. Please allow me to call your attention to three principles of Biblical interpretation. With these principles, you and I can properly understand the Bible. These three principles are:-

1. Always study the context. Someone has said that a Biblical text apart from its context is a Biblical pretext. The Bible may be made to teach almost anything imaginable

by taking a text from its context. 2. Recognize the difference be-

tween the Old Testament and the New Testament. You and I live under the New Covenant which is revealed in the New Testament. The Old Covenant, which is revealed in the Old Testament, was nullified by the death of Jesus.

Hebrews 10: 9-10 states: "He (Jesus) takes away the first (covenant) in order to establish the second (covenant). By this will we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all."

To properly understand the Bible, it is necessary to recognize the dif-ference between the Old Covenant and New Covenant because it is the New Covenant which you and I

must obey. 3. Recognize the difference between a specific and a general command. A specific command is one which specifies that a certain action is to be taken and it specifies how it is to be done. But a general command is one that does not specify what is to be done or how it is to be done. What God specifically commands must be done without addition, subtraction, or substitution. But what God does not specifically command can be done in the most expedient manner.

These three principles of Biblical interpretation will allow us to properly understand the Bible. When we use these principles in our study of the Bible, we can emphatically say, "Yes", if we are asked: "Do you understand what you are reading?"


