

"Extension Update" By Joan Gray, CEA-HE Eating Breakfast May be a Heart-**Smart Choice**

A new study shows that children who skip breakfast have significantly higher blood cholesterol levels compared to children who eat morning

Researchers looked at the breakfast habits of more than 500 children (ages 9 to 19) and divided them into six categories: Skipper; ready to eat (RTE) cereals with fiber; traditional breakfast of eggs, bacon, sausage, waffles or pancakes; chips or sweets; other RTE cereals, and mixed break-

Breakfast skippers were found to have cholesterol levels 7 percent to 8 percent higher than those who ate breakfast. Dr. Ken Resnicow, director of child health research with the American Health Foundation in New York City and conductor of the study, found that the group consuming RTÉ cereal with at least 2 grams of fiber per ounce had the lowest cholesterol levels. Those consuming chips and sweets had the highest.

Encouraging children to eat break-fast can pay off. The morning meal provides energy and can help the child concentrate during study or play. However, it may be difficult to get some children to eat the traditional-type breakfast like bacon and eggs or ce-real. Trying a little breakfast variety can encourage a child to look forward to morning meals. Here are some

Make a shake for breakfast-combine milk, fresh fruit (bananas, strawberries, or peaches) and ice in a blender. Before serving, add a dash of cinnamon and nutmeg.

Make popsicles from low-fat yogurt. Pour fruited yogurt in popsicle molds and freeze on a stick.

*Serve sliced apples or crackers with a dip made of peanut butter, cream cheese, honey, raisins, and flaked coconut.

*Serve sliced apples, spaghetti, chicken or pizza (hot or cold).

*Bake a potato and top with grated cheese, steamed vegetables or chili. *Serve bagels and English muffins. Spread with cream cheese or peanut butter and top with chopped bananas or crushed pineapple.

Make Kabobs with combinations of cheese, fruit, sliced or cubed cooked meat. Be sure to remove toothpicks

before serving

*Sprinkle flour tortillas with grated cheese and broil. Then, top with yogurt or chili sauce. Then top with yogurt or chili sauce. Tortillas can also be served with other combinations such as potatoes, cheese and eggs.

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

RENDER INCOME-PRODUCING PERSONAL PROPERTY NOW FOR 1992

Business owners are reminded that they must file property rendition forms with the Wheeler County Appraisal District office by April 1, 1992. Property owners may receive a 30-day extension, but must file a

written request with the appraisal district by the above date.

Anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1, 1992, must file a rendition statement. Businesses must report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery, equipment, business vehicles and any other tangible property used in the production of income.

When business personal property isn't rendered, the Chief Appraiser is forced to estimate the value.

While only business personal property must be rendered, anyone may voluntarily file a rendition. The rendering of Real Estate is not required by law, but the act of rendering is a good way to prevent errors.

Property owners with damaged buildings (storm, fire, etc.) may also file a special report of decreased value. Rendition and report of decreased value forms are available at the Appraisal District office, courthouse square, Wheeler. Phone 806/826-5900.

It is a criminal offense to make false statements on renditions or reports of decreased value. These forms are also confidential and not open to public inspection.

Mickey Macina Named Conservation Program Ass't.

Conservation Program Assistant Mary (Mickey) I. Macina, is the program assistant responsible for all conservation programs in the Wheeler County ASCS office. The program with the most activity is the Conservation Reserve Program. Wheeler County has 332 CRP contracts that cover 53,825.5 acres. These acres are the maximum that can be entered into the CRP this time for the county. The CRP Program started in 1986. A contract is for ten years.

In 1991 Mickey was responsible for seeing that 352 CRP participants received \$2,073,245 in annual payments at an average of \$38.00 per acre.

Mickey is also responsible for making costshare payments to CRP participants for establishing a grass cover and for controlling weeds on CRP. The producer pays the cost of the conservation practice and ASCS reimburses him half of this expense. The CRP participant must comply with a Conservation Plan that has been developed by Soil Conservation Service. A participant then receives costshare as he completes a component of the plan. At least \$334,378 were spent by 71 CRP producers to either sow grass or for eligible weed control on new grass stands in 1991. ASCS paid \$167,189 in cost share to these producers.

A producer that refuses to maintain an established grass stand or does not comply with the Conservation Plan can be determined ineligible to receive any further annual rental or cost share payments and be required to pay back all payments they have re-Producers are required to maintain ceived plus interest from the dates the payments were issued.
