BEN TROUT MARKS 100th BIRTHDAY

Ben Trout will be 100 years of age Saturday, February 1, 1992. Ben and his niece, Ola Underwood, reside northeast of Wheeler on the quarter section purchased by Ben's father in 1909. Part of the residence is the original house.

Ben, his twin brother Jim and his dad arrived in Shamrock by freight train from Roff, Oklahoma, with the family's livestock. The family left Oklahoma when the open range was closed. The family moved to the Wheeler area and Ben remains on the land and in the house.

During his lifetime, Ben has been engaged in farming and purchased

the quarter adjoining the family quarter section on the north. They had a number of good years for farming, but the worst are remembered as '34 & '36.

Ben, who does not show his age, is completely mobil and passes his time reading. His reading does include novels, he prefers government pamphlets and magazines to keep up with world events and politics. Ben commented he hoped to live to see another president inaugurated. (This statement was not completely clarified)

Ben is the last of a family of 5 children; his older sister, Pet, lived to

the age of 101.5. Ben's longevity may have been inherited; his father lived to the age of 94 and his mother, 90. Ben's twin brother, Jim, reached the age of 85.

Ben never married, but has had the responsibility of taking care of different family members, he helped raise a set of twin nephews and his sister, Pet, remained in the family home until her death. Ben's explanation for remaining a bachelor is that he "never could talk fast enough to get married."

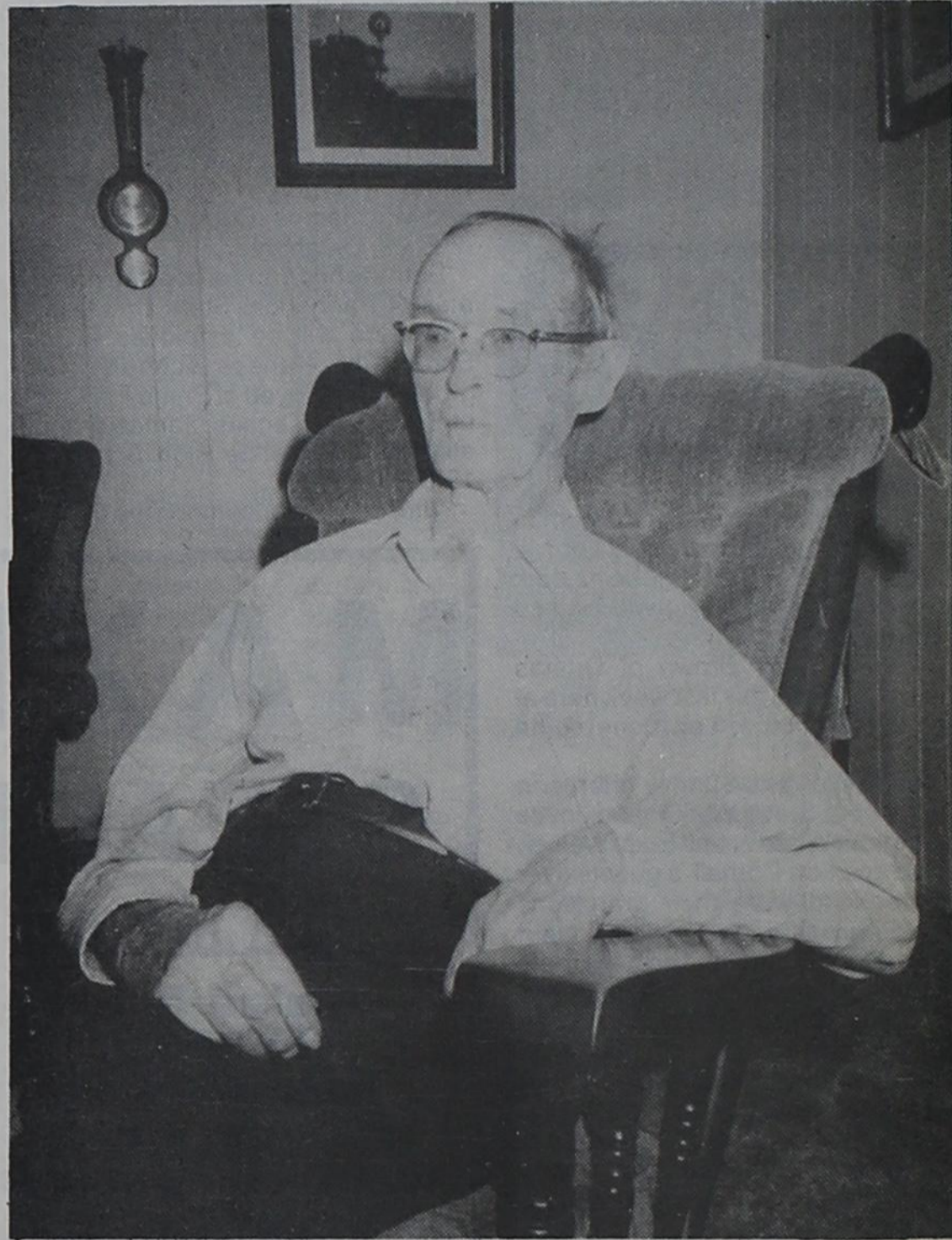
Ben has been to several of the reunions of his alma mater, Wheeler High School, and is now the oldest

living graduate, having received his diploma in 1911.

Ben has never held public office—again his inability to talk fast, but he did serve a number of years as Precinct Chairman, voting precinct 5, for about 50 years and helped with the holding of elections. (This is the closest Ben ever came to being president.)

Ben has seven nieces and nephews living with an untold number of grand, great, great-great, etc. nieces and nephews.

Ben has received congratulations from President Bush and Rep. Graham.

Shepard's Crook Officials Attend Tax Workshop

Ernie Wilkinson, administrator of Shepard's Crook Nursing Agency, and Glenn Markham, manager of Shepard's Crook office in Wheeler, were recently certified as Tax-Aide Counselors, following a training session in Amarillo. The free, nationwide tax-counseling program is a service of the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), in cooperation with the Tax Counseling for the Elderly Program of the Department of the Treasury, Internal Revenue Service.

*To keep foods hot for several hours, a thermos designed for hot foods will work. Be sure the thermos has been adequately washed after each use. Before pouring a hot food in, rinse the thermos with boiling water. Bring the food to as high a temperature as possible before pouring it into the thermos. The food should be hot to touch when eaten.

*Keep everything clean when preparing lunches to avoid spreading bacteria that cause the illness. Be sure that utensils, hands and work areas are clean. Wash food containers, including the thermos and lunch box itself, after each use. Wrap foods in clean wrap. If using paper bags, use one purchased only for that purpose. Bags which have carried groceries may already be contaminated from insects or food leakage.

Occasionally, foods that don't need to be kept hot or cold may be a desirable lunch choice. These foods include dry meats such as beef jerky, peanut butter, and some non-perishable cheeses and cheese spreads. Canned meat, poultry and seafood products that can be opened and eaten immediately are other options, as are fresh fruits and vegetables, breads and cereals and nuts. Some packages ready-to-eat foods now on the market in individual size servings, such as canned fruits and pudding, make a nice addition to a carried lunch.

Remember the food can be contaminated with enough bacteria to make you sick without looking, smelling or tasting bad. Keep carried lunches safe.

*Keep everything clean when preparing and packing lunches.

*Plan a balanced menu of healthy foods that have been properly prepared. Be sure meats are thoroughly cooked. Avoid using leftovers that have been in refrigerator for an extended time.

*Keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold. Don't allow these foods to remain at room temperature for more than two hours.

*If perishable lunch foods aren't eaten, throw leftovers away.

Packing a Safe School Lunch

Whether it's in a brown bag, a lunch box or a tote bag, many children will carry a school lunch every day. Often when kids come home with the stomach cramps, diarrhea or even vomiting, it's diagnosed or dismissed as "just a bug going around." And indeed it may be a "bug", but not the "flu bug" often suspected. The "bug" may be foodborne illness.

Packing a carried lunch does require some food safety precautions especially since the lunch may be standing at room temperatures for several hours before being eaten. Bacteria that cause foodborne illness live and grow at room temperatures. In fact, between temperatures of 40 degrees Fahrenheit and 140 degrees F., enough bacteria can grow in two hours to cause illness.

The key to packing a safe lunch is "keep hot foods hot, cold foods cold, and everything clean." Here's why and how:

*Some foods need to be kept either cold (below 40 degrees F.) or hot (above 40 degrees F.) There are the perishable foods like meats, poultry, seafood, eggs and milk products (including yogurt). In fact, any moist protein-containing foods are susceptible to bacterial growth because the bacteria that cause foodborne illness need a food source, protein in this case, and moisture to grow. Meat salads like ham, chicken, or egg are especially susceptible to food germs because they are handled a lot during preparation and hands can spread germs. If cooked, ready-to-eat lunch meats are a sandwich choice, pay attention to "use-by" dates. These products may contain a special type of bacteria that can grow slowly at refrigerator temperatures.

*Ideally, you should store lunches in a refrigerator to keep them cold, but this often is not possible. Lunch boxes, especially insulated ones, will generally keep foods cold much better than paper bags. Cold devices such as a commercial freezing gel, a container filled with ice or a frozen drink will help keep lunch contents chilled. Advise children to place their lunch in as cool a place as possible, never in the window ledge in the sun.

From The Minister's Desk:

Did you hear about the football coach whose team had lost nine consecutive games? He desperately wanted to break this losing streak by winning the tenth and final game of the season. To win this game, he decided that his team needed to be more motivated.

For this reason, the coach made several highly emotional speeches to his team during their practice sessions in the week before the game. These emotional speeches were so long that the team could not practice the game plan that the coach had prepared. But the speeches were effective!

When the coach assembled his team in the locker on the night of the game, the excitement and enthusiasm of his team was unbelievable. The players were chanting: "We're number one! Let's kill them!" The coach then yelled: "Go get them, men!" And his team rushed onto the field where they played their last game, losing by a score of 48 to 0.

This coach made a terrible mistake. He apparently believed that emotion could compensate for his team's lack of preparation and practice. But he was wrong! While his team was extremely emotional, they were soundly defeated, failing to score a single point. Such is the nature of emotion. It is fickle and unreliable if it is not accountable to objectivity. While this accountability is important in several aspects of life, it is especially important when spiritual beliefs are determined. But there are many people who strictly determine their spiritual beliefs by emotion, saying: "I just feel that this is what God wants me to do."

In my opinion, these people do not understand the most basic characteristic of Christianity. This characteristic is that Christianity is a faith of objectivity. It is a faith of objectivity. It is a faith that consists of Biblical facts that people can believe and obey. But when people choose to ignore these facts and rely upon emotion, their spiritual beliefs will be erroneous and foolishness.

For example, I was recently listening to a preacher who was exhorting people to "accept Christ". With an organ softly playing in the background, he repeatedly whispered: "Jesus, Jesus, Jesus". As I observed the people who were listening to this purely emotional appeal, I saw that many of them were visibly upset. While I am certain that these people were sincere, I ask myself, "How can these people be so gullible?"

According to the Bible, people do not "accept Christ" by some highly emotional experience that a preacher has induced. Rather the Bible teaches that people "accept Christ" by believing that Jesus was the Son of God and that he died upon a Roman cross as an offering for sin. (John 3:30-31; Romans 3:21-31) The Bible also teaches that these people show their belief by repenting of their sins, by confessing His name, and by being baptized in His name for the forgiveness of their sins. (Romans 10:8-10; Acts 2:37-38; 1 Peter 3:21-22; Colossians 2:8-12)

When people "accept Christ" as the New Testament teaches, they will be like the Ethiopian eunuch who "went on his way rejoicing" after his conversion. Christians will be emotional people. But like a football team, their emotion must always be accountable to objectivity.
