Featured entertainment will be: Chapman Family Band, Aurora, Colo.;

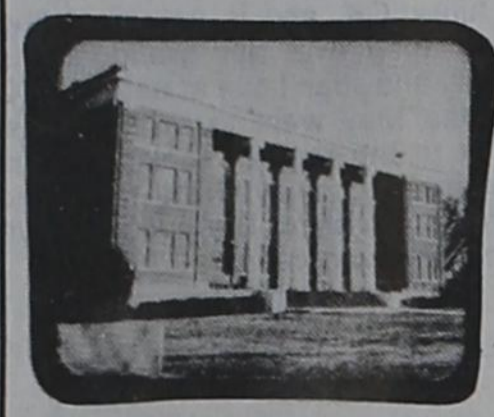

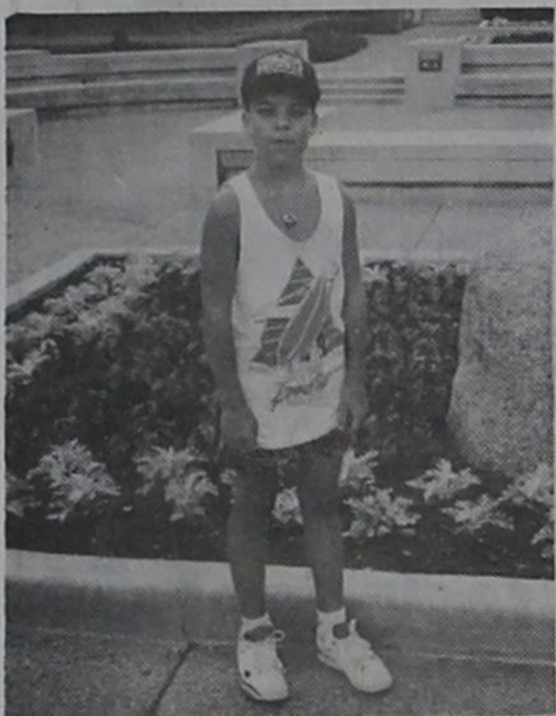

Pesticide Applicators Continuing Education

Pesticide Applicators can earn five continuing education units in Canadian on Saturday, July 25th, at the WCTU library, sponsored by the Hemphill County Extension Office and Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The training has been approved by TDA for 5 CEU's for commercial, non-commercial, and private applicators licensed by TDA. Approval is pending from the Structural Pest Control Board for CEU credit. Applicators licensed by SPCB should call the Hemphill Co. Extension Office, 323-9114, on Friday, July 24th, to find out if any credits will be offered.

The program will begin at 8:30 a.m. with registration and end by 3:30 p.m. Each applicator completing the training will receive 1 CEU in Laws and Regulations, 1/2 CEU in Integrated Pest Management and 3 1/2 CEU's in other specific areas. Such as safety, labels, mixing, handling, pest features etc.

Participants will have an hour break at noon for lunch on their own in Canadian. There is no charge for this educational program. Applicators planning to attend should call 323-9114 by Friday, July 24.

From The Minister's Desk:

Percy Shelley, a nineteenth century English poet, was once described as a man "whom envy never touched."

If this description is true, Shelley was an exemplary individual because envy is a common but destructive attitude. This destructiveness can be seen in the lives of several people who are described in the Bible. For example, Joseph was sold into Egyptian bondage by his brothers because they were envious of him. David had to flee for his life because King Saul was envious of his popularity. Jesus was crucified because the chief priests were envious of Him. (Matthew 27:18, Mark 15:10)

Since envy is so destructive, there are at least two questions that need to be answered. These two questions are:

1. What exactly is envy? Webster's Collegiate Dictionary defines envy as a "painful and resentful awareness of an advantage enjoyed by another, joined with a desire to possess the same advantage." According to this definition, envy is a resentful attitude which closely

scrutinizes the lives of other people, desiring to have their possessions and advantages.

2. How is envy controlled? Envy can only be controlled by contentment. The New Testament contains several tests which urge people to be content with who they are and what they have. For example, I Timothy 6:6-7 says: "Godliness actually is a means of great gain, when accompanied by contentment. For we have brought nothing into the world, so we cannot take anything out of it either." If envy is to be controlled, it is imperative that contentment be developed and practiced.

Envy is an extremely destructive attitude, but it can be controlled with contentment. When people control it with contentment, they can be like Percy Shelley "whom envy never touched."

EPA will notify each person who submits a written request of the final decision on the Proposed Administrative Order.

The Proposed Administrative Order requires the city of Mobeetie to attain compliance with the following requirements of the Safe Drinking Water Act:

1. Upon receipt of this Order, whenever a routine or repeat sample is total coliform positive, to collect a set of repeat samples within 24 hours of being notified of the positive total coliform analysis, and conduct total coliform analyses on the repeat samples.

2. Within sixty (60) days of receipt of this order, meet the maximum concentration level for bacteria coliform.

3. Upon receipt of this Order, analyses or use the services of an approved laboratory for coliform bacteria at least once per month.

(Part 2)

1 Peter 5:10, "But the God of all grace, who hath called us unto his eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after that ye have suffered a while, make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you."

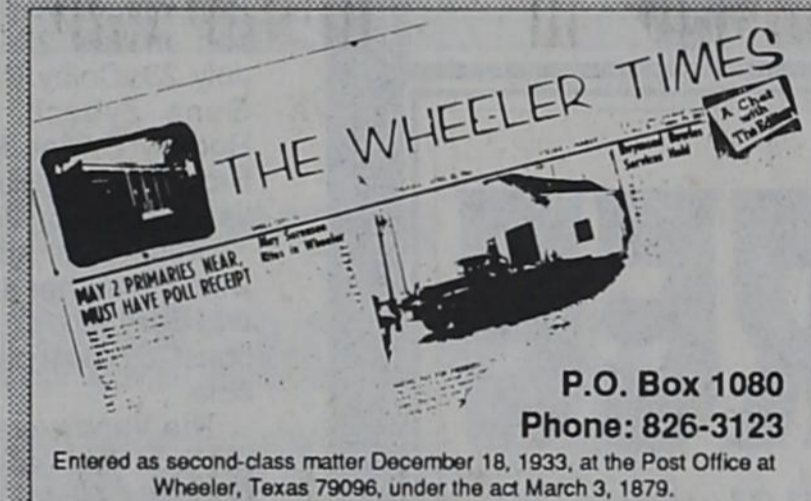
So many people automatically equate sickness and afflictions with suffering for Christ. It is not because the Bible teaches that. Rather, it is because that is what they have been taught over and over again. I guess it comforts some Christians when they are hurting to believe that it is for the Lord. It is always interesting though that while they think the Lord wants them to be sick or in pain, they are at the same time trying to get as much relief from it as possible through the doctor and pharmacist. It looks to me like if God wanted you to be suffering, you shouldn't try to get out of it. The doctor is your enemy and not your friend because he is trying to get you healed. Of course, Christians don't usually think all this through. If they did, they would realize how ridiculous it is to think God wants you to be sick. Of all the nonsense in the world, sometimes religious nonsense is the most nonsensical.

If God doesn't want you to be sick, then what is referred to in the Bible when it talks about suffering? If you will read it again without the preconceived ideas, you can see that it mentions reproaches, persecutions, slanders, and that type of thing. In extreme cases, such as the apostle Paul, physical attacks from unbelievers stirred up by the devil are part of suffering for Christ. But sickness and disease is not suffering for Christ. More on this subject will be in next week's paper.

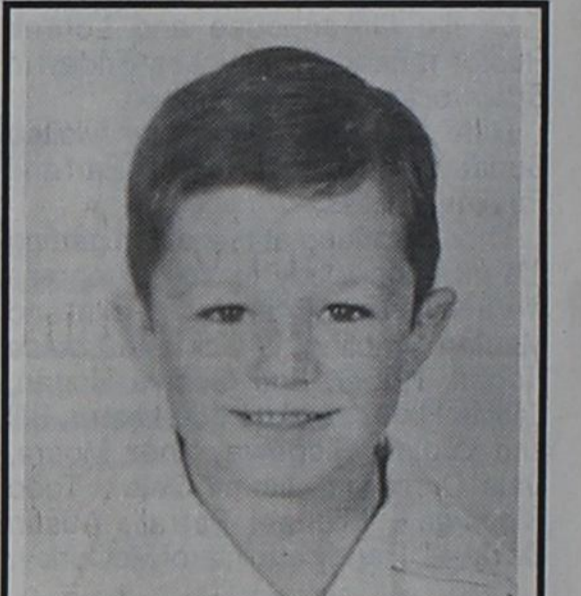
