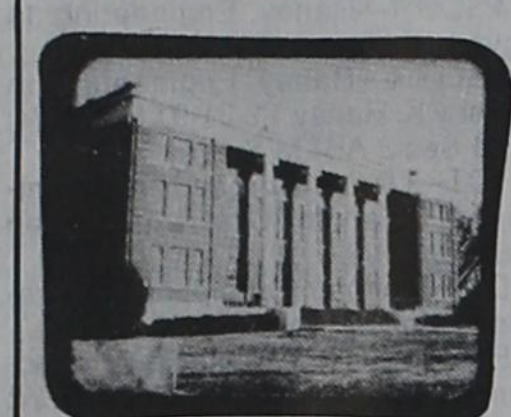


# May 4 Banquet Honors Athletes

Each year in Texas, trauma is a major cause of death and disability, especially for young Texans. The 1,330 emergency medical service departments in Texas answer more than one million calls every year for trauma and other injury and medical emergencies. Emergency medical services specialists work to ensure that citizens receive prompt and appropriate care whenever and wherever it is needed. Thousands of lives have been saved with prehospital medical assistance and with the prevention messages taught by local emergency medical services.

We can thank the 41,000 emergency medical services personnel in Texas for reminding citizens about the dangers of drinking and driving, about the importance of wearing safety restraints, about putting children in safety seats, and about being alert to pedestrians and bicyclists. Emergency medical services personnel also teach citizen CPR courses and first responder medical care courses to help citizens know what to do in a medical emergency.

It is important that the citizens of Texas know about our emergency medical services and to learn more about what to do in a medical emergency and who to call. All citizens can benefit from learning how to prevent emergencies from happening.

Therefore, I, Ann W. Richards, Governor of Texas, do hereby designate May 10-16, 1992 as Texas Emergency Medical Services Week and urge all citizens to become aware of safe and healthy habits.

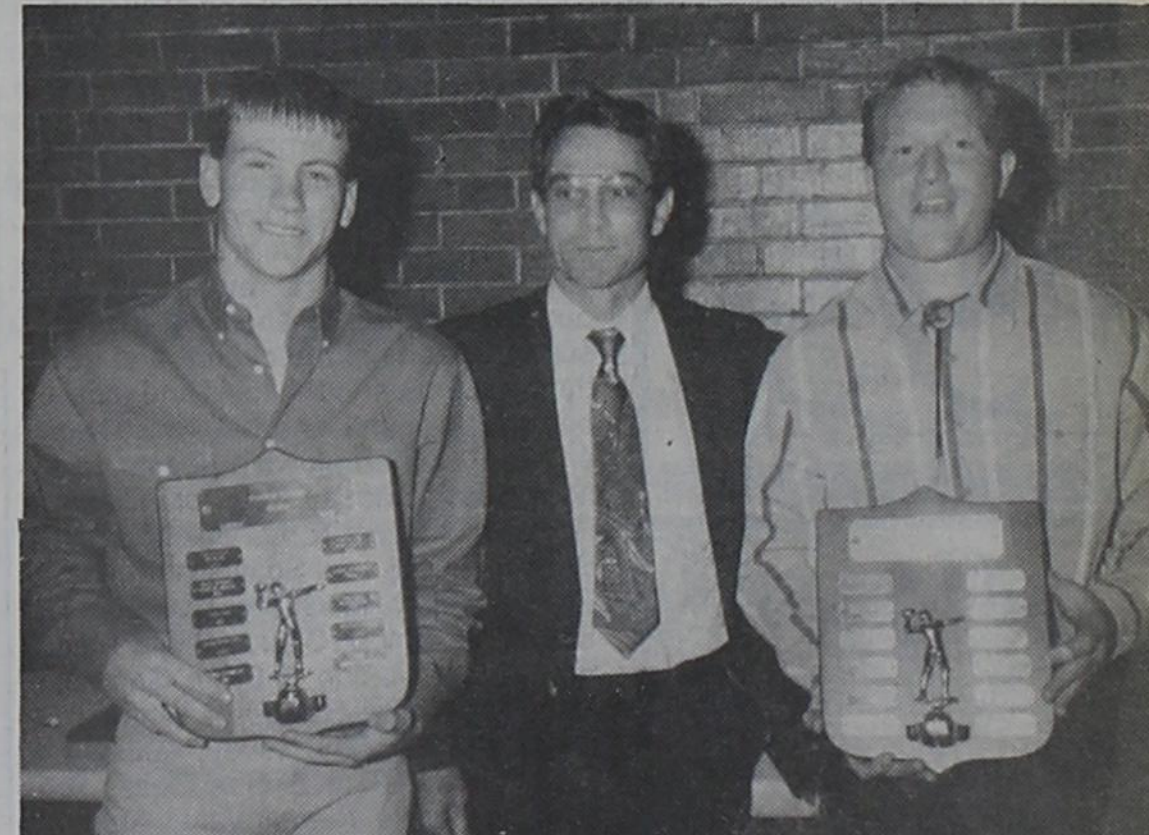

On the basis of that act of Christ, we can now be free from sin. Isaiah 53:3-5 informs us that Jesus was acquainted with sickness. That was during His sufferings at the cross. He was made sick for us. Isaiah 53:10 says that God put Him to grief. Grief in the original language means sickness. Therefore, it literally means God made Him sick. He was made sick with our sicknesses just as He was made sin with our sins. Since it happened at the same time on the same day at the same place in the same sacrifice, that means He paid the same price for our deliverance from sickness as from sin.

So the Word says that He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities . . . and with this stripes (His sufferings) we are healed. Psalm 103:2-3 says that among the benefits that God gives us are (1) He forgiveth all our iniquities, and (2) He healeth all our diseases. If all means all pertaining to sins and iniquities (and it does), then all means all pertaining to sickness and disease.

He paid the price for us to be free from sin and from sickness. When God transferred our diseases to Jesus at the cross, He closed the deal once and for all. If we will believe and receive it, we can now live above sin and sickness. The fourth reason then that I know God wants to heal you is that IT IS IN THE GREAT REDEMPTIVE WORK OF CHRIST.

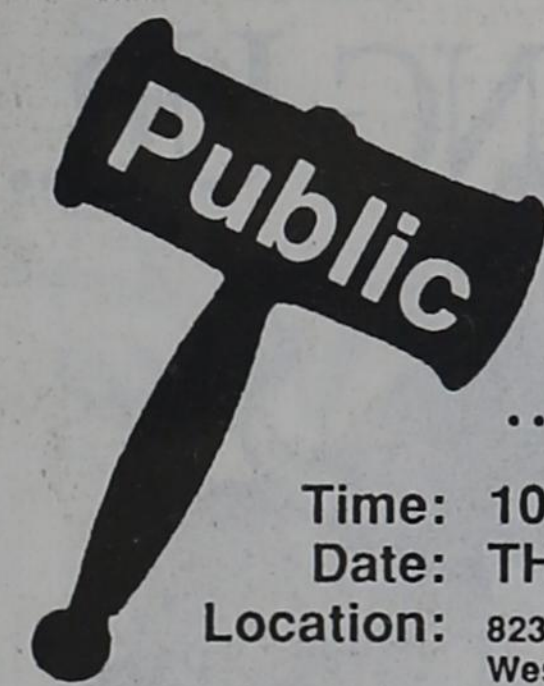

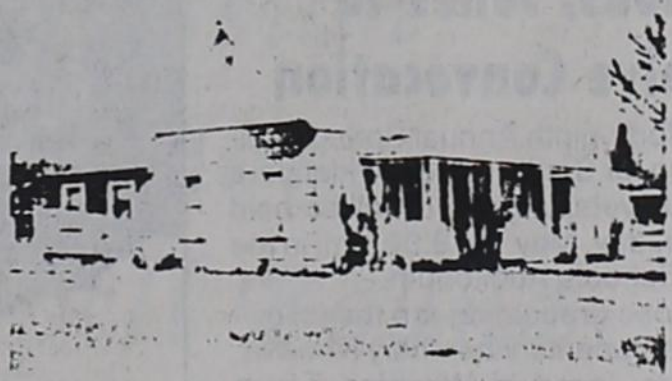

## ASCS Consumer Update & Price Comparisons

You've all heard talk in recent months that higher farm prices for wheat are forcing bread prices higher. Wheat prices did jump more than 50% from the low July 1991 price of \$2.47/bu. to the February 1992 price of \$3.78/bu. It would appear that this increase in wheat prices received by farmers would cause some increase in the price of bread. How much?

According to Jerry D. Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee, in 1990 a \$1 loaf of white bread contained just over 5 cents worth of wheat. So if the 1990/91 average price of \$2.61 for a bushel of wheat was doubled to \$5.22 that would give credence to raising bread prices by making the wheat in a loaf of bread worth a dime.

But wait, what happened when the price of wheat fell. Farm wheat prices in 1991 were 14.4% lower than in 1985, but 1991 bread prices were 31.7% higher than in 1985.

What does this mean? One should be wary of blaming the 'increase' in bread prices on the nickel that wheat adds to breads price. In fact, between 1981 and 1991 the farm value of all farm commodities in the USDA "market basket" increased only 6% while retail prices of these commodities increased 45%.

Harris reminds consumers that USDA farm programs administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service continue to ensure all Americans an adequate supply of food and fiber at a reasonable price.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is the United States Department of Agriculture agency that administers farm programs passed by Congress. This includes programs that effect many local farmers and ranchers.

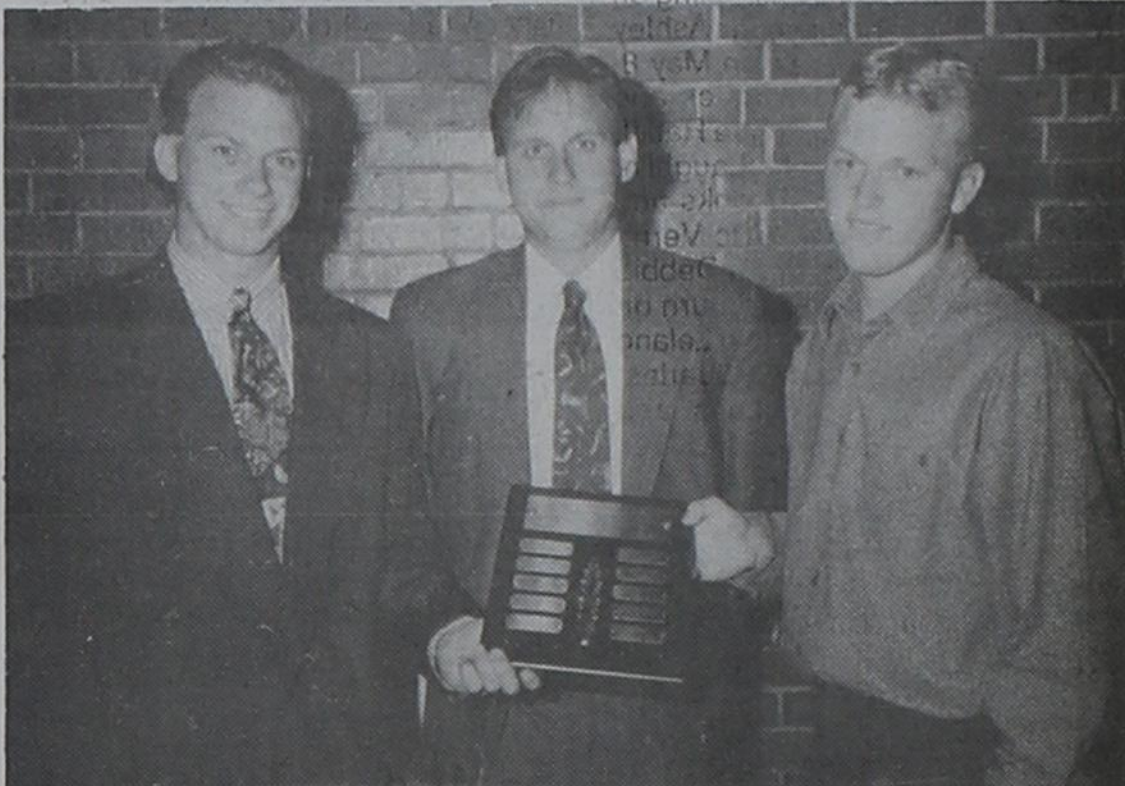
Chad Dunnam ran his personal best of 40.7 in the 300 m IH to place 5th. A very good effort with the windy condition that existed.

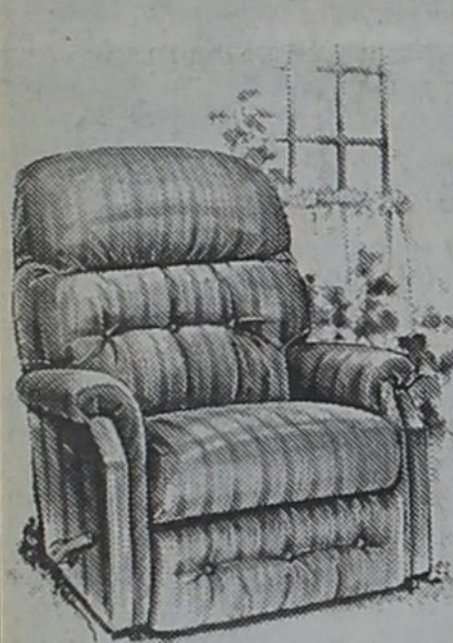

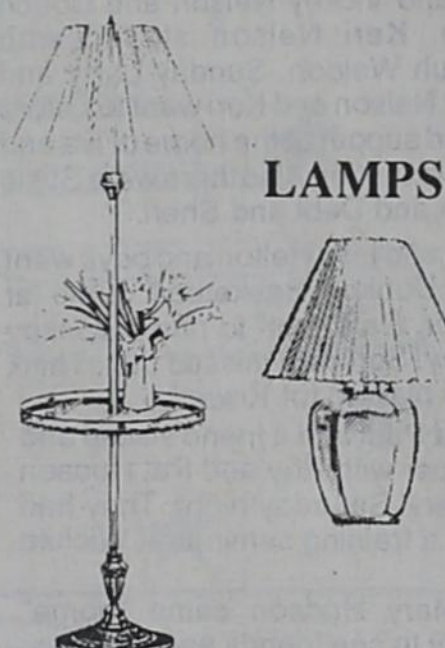

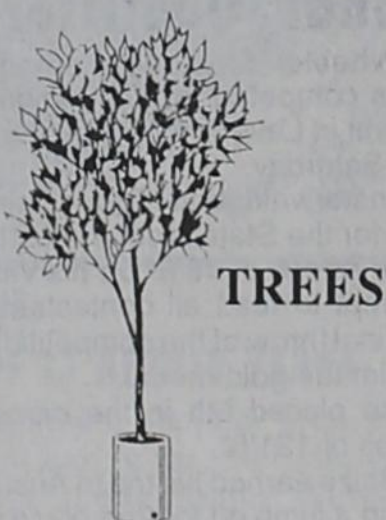

### From The Minister's Desk:

On September 7, 1977, Oral Roberts announced that he had received a revelation from God, directing him to build a medical complex that was to be called the City of Faith. With the generous contributions of his followers, Mr. Roberts obeyed this divine mandate and built the 2.3 million square-foot medical complex adjacent to Oral Roberts University.

Since God told Mr. Roberts to build the City of Faith, I was a little surprised when I recently read an article in the *Daily Oklahoman* which reported that the City of Faith had been sold. According to this article, the City of Faith had been sold to a group of real estate investors because it had been a financial disaster.

As I read this article, I could not keep from asking if God really told Mr. Roberts to build the City of Faith, why did He allow it to become a financial disaster? Since I did not believe that a revelation from God could be wrong, I had to conclude that Mr. Roberts did not really receive a revelation from God. My conclusion was based on a great Biblical truth. This truth was that such revelations have ceased because the will of God has been completely and perfectly revealed. Jude 3 says: "Beloved, while I was making every effort to write you appealing that you contend earnestly for the faith that which was once for all delivered to the saints."

Notice that this text refers to "the faith" and says that it has been "once for all delivered to the saints." The phrase "once for all" is translated from a Greek word that means, "Of what is of perpetual validity, not requiring repetition. This same word is used in the Hebrew letter to describe the sacrifice of Jesus. It is used in Hebrews 9:28 which says: "So, Christ also having been offered once to bear the sins of

many, shall appear a second time for salvation without reference to sin, to those who eagerly await Him. "The sacrificial death of Jesus for the forgiveness of sin was "—offered once—" which means that it was of "—perpetual validity—" and would not require repetition. Like the sacrificial death of Jesus, "—the faith—" is of "—perpetual validity—" which means that additional revelations are not needed.

If "—the faith—" has not been "—once for all—" revealed, there is no objective standard of truth that people can use to learn the will of God. And without an objective standard of truth for learning the will of God, people will have a faith that consists of blatant error and subjective nonsense. Do you remember Jessica Hahn? Ms. Hahn was the young woman who was involved in a sexual scandal with the former televangelist, Jim Bakker. As a result of this scandal, Ms. Hahn received financial offers which would allow her to profit from this scandal. For example, she was offered a substantial amount of money to pose nude for *Playboy* magazine. But before she would accept this offer, Ms. Hahn stated that she would have to receive a sign of God's approval. Within a few days of receiving the offer by *Playboy*, she claimed to have received God's approval because she has seen a rainbow.

In my opinion, Ms. Hahn and Mr. Roberts made a similar mistake. If they truly wanted to know and to practice the will of God, they should have adhered to an objective standard of truth. And this objective standard of truth is found in "—the faith—" that has been "—once for all delivered to the saints."
