The Wheeler Mustangs hosted the District 1-A track meet this past Thursday and Friday. The Mustangs competed in every event, but fell short of their 10th consecutive district title by a

mere 25 points. The Memphis team compiled 142 points and Gruver 130 to out-distance the Mustangs.

The Mustangs had 9 personal bests in their effort to repeat as the District

Champs.

The Wheeler Colts, spurred on by a 63 point performance in the field events, never looked back in winning the District 1-1A junior high Championship this past weekend. The Colts scored 152 points to win the trophy were chased by runner-up Gruver 117 points, Memphis 97 1/2 and Booker 81 points. Shamrock, Claude, Valley, and Vega also competed in the meet but were distant contenders at best.

Seventh Grade Track Girls Season Ended

The Wheeler 7th grade girls track team ended their season last week with an encouraging fifth place finish at the District 1-1A meet held in Wheeler. Shamrock won the meet and were followed by Vega, Gruver, Claude, Wheeler and Memphis. Mika Goad captured 4 individual medals, 4 silver and 1 bronze. Miss Goad placed second in both hurdle events. In the 100 meter hurdles, her time was 20.14 and in the 200 meter hurdles 38.27. In field events, Miss Goad hurled the shot 27 feet 31/2 inches for second. This was only her second time to enter that event. She finished third in the discus with a toss of 63 feet 6 inches. Misti Patterson also earned points in the throwing events. She was 4th in both the shot and discus. Miss Patterson was also 5th in the high jump with a leap of 4 feet 2 inches. The 7th grade distance runners also contributed in a big way. Cassidi Wallace medaled in both the 800 and 1200 meter runs. Miss Wallace was second in the 800 in a time of 2:45.55 and third in the 1200 in 4:27.81. The ever improving Vanessa Baize was fifth in the 800 and fourth in the 1200. All three relays were able to score points at the district meet. Relay specialists Kate Woollard, Mandi Scrivner and Hillary Mitchell were members of all three relay teams. These three young ladies were joined by Misti Patterson to place 5th. Jason also ran a good leg on the mile relay, also consisting of Francis, Charlie Flanagan and Dustin Light. Bradley scored 32 points.

Jeremy Kenney scored 18 points by winning the gold in the 110 m hurdles (18.23) and the silver medal in the 200 m Hurdles (29.63) Charlie Flanagan contributed 24 points to the Colt cause by placing 2nd in the long jump (17'7"), 3rd in the shot put (42'81/2") and fourth in the 100 m dash along with running well on both relay squads. Dustin Light placed 3rd in the 800 meters (2:22.06) and fourth in the 1200 m run along with running a very impressive leg on the mile relay. Others scoring valuable points for the Colts included Jason Porton, 3rd in 110 m hurdles (18.64), Travis Stevens (4th) in the Pole Vault and 6th in the 1200; Ty Ferguson, fourth in the high hurdles. Rocky Mendiola threw the discus 125 feet to place 4th. Shane Sparlin placed fourth in the long jump (17'1/4") Ramon Meraz placed 5th in the 1200 m Run, and 6th in the 800 meter. Keith Rose's leg on the sprint relay earned him two points to round out the Colt scoring machine.

At a hastily called press conference following the track meet, Coach Pierce praised his squad for good consistent effort all year long and for improving all times and field event performances at the right time, the District Track Meet. The championship marked the 9th time in 10 years that the Colts have won the district meet.

The Wheeler Junior High 8th grade girls cruised to the District 1-1A last Thursday and Friday by winning four events and placing second in six. The Lady Colts scored 167 points to best Gruver (124) and Booker (72). Order of finish for the rest of the competing schools was Claude, Valley, Memphis, Vega and Shamrock.

The 1600 meter relay team of Angie Thomas, Ember Bradstreet, Vanessa Shepard and Dena Compton remained undefeated for the 1992 season. They turned in another fine performance as their time was an excellent 4:32.29 which is probably a new district record.

Jeseka Wallace ended the season on a positive note as a double gold medal winner. She hopped, skipped and jumped 29 feet 3 inches to win the triple jump. Then on the track, Miss Wallace won the 100 meter hurdles with a time of 18.00 seconds. She also placed second in the 200 meter hurdles. Vanessa Shepard once again improved her time in the 400 meter dash to 64.99 as she again won the event rather handily. Miss Shepard almost pulled off a win in the 200 meter dash but was unable to overcome a quick start by her Gruver competitor and settled for second place.

The 800 meter run was very interesting as Wheeler and Gruver battled it out for all six places. Dena Compton, Angie Thomas and Kasey McCasland finished second, third and fifth; the Gruver girls placed first, fourth and sixth. In other individual events, Miss

READING IS FUN WEEK, APRIL 19-25

Those who love to read know that reading is fun. However, children need to learn this from significant people in their lives.

Parents, relatives and friends can help children understand the importance of literacy, and help them develop a love for reading by setting a good example.

Here are 15 tips (from an unknown source) to help your children get ready to read:

* Read, read, read aloud! Choose from a variety of books, including picture books and simple books for beginning readers.

* Make sure reading times are cozy and relaxed. The calm and intimacy between you and your child will help to connect books with pleasurable feelings.

* Build a library of picture books at home for your child to handle and pour over. Opportunities to turn pages and examine pictures lead to curiosity about text and print.

* Share rhyming books with your children. Invite them to fill in the "missing" rhyming word as you read.

* Look for predictable books that have recurrent lines or phrases.

"Chime in" together when you come to the familiar part.

* Listen to your children "re-tell" a storybook in their own words as the pages are turned. These approximations are a step forward in the reading process.

* Invest in a book with an accompanying audio cassette and don't worry if your page-turner can't keep up with the tape. Putting story and pictures together will inspire an interest in the written words.

* Take your child to the library and allow time for browsing in the children's section. Let your child apply for a library card.

* Keep paper, crayons and pencils readily available. Encourage all efforts your young writer makes, from squiggly lines to "inventively" spelled words. Early efforts at writing are closely related to beginning reading.

* If your child is beginning to write, ignore that backward "s" and inverted "b" and "d". The child is still in a practicing phase on the road to reading through writing.

* Purchase some inexpensive magnetic letters for your refrigerator door. Allow your child to handle and play with them freely. Rather than instruct, respond to questions such as "Mommy, what letters say 'Daddy'?"

* Ask your child to tell you a story, write the story down as it's told, then read it back and share with others.

* Make a book with your child. Staple some blank pieces of paper together

and ask the child to illustrate the cover and inside pages. Write down whatever your child wants to say about the pictures at the bottom of each page. Enjoy reading and sharing the results.

* Make shopping lists with your child. Say the names of the grocery items aloud as you write them down. Search

for and check off the items together as you shop.

* Make a batch of pretzel dough together and use it to form different letters of the alphabet—shape, bake, and eat.







From The Minister's Desk:

Since last Sunday was Easter, I am going to make some post-mortem observations about Easter. These observations are:—

1. Easter is a holiday that originated from a Celtic festival. This festival was held in the spring by the Celts to honor their goddess of spring, Eostre. having originated from such a pagan festival, it is not surprising that Easter is characterized by several practices which originate from a Celtic practice. Perhaps the best example of one of these practices is the hunting of eggs which have been brought by the Easter bunny.

This practice began when a Celtic woman hid some decorated eggs for her children. As her children hunted for these eggs, a rabbit raced across the field where the eggs were hidden. The Celtic then quickly explained to her children that the rabbit had hidden the eggs that they were hunting. And from this explanation, the practice of hunting eggs that have been hidden by the Easter bunny has evolved.

With this pagan background, I would think that some parents would have the same attitude about Easter that they have about Halloween. I would think that these parents would not allow their children to hunt Easter eggs, fearing that they would become followers of the Easter bunny, worshippers of Eostre, or believers in Bugs Bunny. These parents must recognize that the intention of their children is to find Easter eggs not to participate in some pagan ritual. For the sake of their children, I wish that these parents could have the same attitude about Halloween.

2. Easter is mentioned in only one Biblical text. This text is Acts 12:4 which describes King Herod's

imprisonment of Peter, saying: "— When he had apprehended him, he put him in prison, and delivered him to four quaternions of soldiers to keep him; intending after Easter to bring him forth to the people."

Notice the phrase that says: "— Intending after Easter to bring him forth to the people." This phrase is one of the most misleading renderings of the King James Version. With the use of the word Easter, the translators of the King James Version followed the example of earlier versions of the Bible and transliterated the Greek work, *Pasche*, rendering it as Easter. An accurate translation of this word would be Passover or Days of Unleavened Bread which is the rendering that later versions of the Bible use.

The proverbial "bottom line" is that the Bible does not authorize that a certain day be set aside for the commemoration of the resurrection of Jesus. But while the Bible does not authorize that the resurrection of Jesus be commemorated on a certain day, it does authorize the commemoration of His resurrection. This commemoration is to be done on the first day of the week through an observance of the memorial service that Jesus instituted on the night before His death. (Matthew 26: 26-29, Mark 14: 22-25, Luke 22: 14-20, I Corinthians 11: 23-24)

Easter was observed last Sunday, April 19th. Many children enjoyed hunting Easter eggs. And disciples of Jesus commemorated the resurrection of Jesus by partaking of a memorial service that is observed on the first day of every week.




