Criminal charges of malicious mischief or criminal trespass can be filed and if resulting damage is over \$750 the incident becomes a felony.

The gathering will include a concert Friday evening, chuck wagon cookoff that will feed the public Saturday afternoon and a western dance Saturday

Last year folks who never sat a saddle, as well as many who have, turned out in droves to be entertained by songs and stories normally told and sung 'round the campfire - and to eat authentic cowboy grub cooked over a camp fire.

Located smack, dab in the middle of Texas ranch country, Lake Meredith is going to again be the scene of Red Steagall's cowboy gathering June 27 and 28. Born and raised just a mile from Lake Meredith, Red's roots go deep into the area, although his work in country music, songwriting and producing have taken him to the Ft. Worth

Performing in Lake Meredith's outdoor amphitheater with a backdrop of cool, clear water, Red Steagall, Buck Ramsey and Curt Kraigbaum will be presenting a cowboy concert Friday evening, June 27.
