Synod Leader Comments On Meet Here

Rev. McMurry Has Article In Presbyterian Christian Observer

An account of the Presbyterian Synod meeting held in this city October 14-16 was given in the Christian Observer, organ of the Presbyterian Church, and was written by Rev. S. J. Murry, S. C. of Bartlett, Texas.

THE SYNOD OF TEXAS

By Rev. S. J. Murry, S. C. The Synod of Texas met in its seventy-fifth session at Big Spring, Texas, October 14-16—not quite so far west as when it met at Lubbock two years before. It was a remarkable manifestation of the "Westward Ho" spirit of the members of the Synod to go so soon again into the western part of the state. It was a real compliment to the statement and plea of Ruling Elder E. A. Kelley of the Big Spring church, who assured the Synod that the Big Spring church was laboring under unusual conditions in that it had "waxed up."

Every member of the Synod attending at Big Spring was impressed with the fact that Mr. Kelley did not exaggerate the "unusual conditions," when that wonderful working plant came into full view. The pastor host of the synod, Rev. R. L. Owen, and his people are to be sincerely congratulated for having "into the Kingdom for such a time as this."

For the material comfort and efficiency of the members of the Synod the pastor and his efficient committee, both of men and women, did everything that thoughtfulness could desire to help in the prompt and efficient work of the synod and of its constituent churches and were ably and thoughtfully assisted by many friends outside of the membership of the Presbyterian church, including the "Secret Service" and officials of the Big Spring.

The pastor instituted a new trend in the way of preparation for the meeting of Synod by inviting a number of ministers to preach in the different churches of Big Spring the Sabbath before the Synod met. Most of these ministers were former pastors of the Big Spring Presbyterian church, and they were greeted with special pleasure by many members of the congregation. The interest in the meeting of Synod was manifestly not confined to the Presbyterians of the city and surrounding country.

The volume of business was large, but the Synod had a mind to work so that the business was pressed into the two days after the opening night, although there was more than the usual amount of inspirational sermons and addresses provided for and heard in the program of the Synod.

The Synod is humbly grateful for the assistance of the Great Host of the Church on the efforts of the churches and ministers in the special work of the synod, the enthusiasm during the last year, and provided for the campaign to be intensively carried on for the next three years. A new committee was appointed containing some of those who so successfully guided that work the last year. They will begin at once to push that special work, trying to more nearly make it unanimous than before, and profiting by the former experiences.

The work of religious education, home mission, foreign missions, and the work of the women's work, student work, the Presbyterian camp, and the junior, educational institutions of the Synod all received special attention, especially with more enthusiasm than usual. Perhaps the most important single item of business was that presented in the report of the committee on "Consolidating the Synod." The College of the Synod, the Consolidated College being located at Sherman, and for the present, under the old name of Austin College. Quite a good deal of discussion was expressed, especially touching the final action of the commission, as not being what the majority of the members of Synod wanted. Some, but not many, who will read, even half sympathetically, the minutes of the commission admitted to record, will be overwhelmed with the many separate problems and had little besides brains and heart with which to settle those problems. Oklahoma is associated with Texas in the Consolidated College. Perhaps the two states together can build a great Presbyterian university.

General Bliss Dies; Funeral At Arlington

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 (AP)—Gen. Tucker Edward Bliss, who served in the Civil War, and more than a half a century of service to his country. The soldier-statesman recaptured early Sunday to an intestinal illness, several days after physicians at Walter Reed hospital had given up hope of riving him. He was within six weeks of his seventy-fourth birthday.

He will be buried Wednesday at Arlington, escorted in the grave by a group of distinguished soldiers and sailors whose names with his were an every day during the World War.

Gen. John J. Pershing, Admiral W. S. Benson, Admiral Hugh Rodman, Major General Hugh L. Scott, William Crozier and Brig. Gen. Stanley D. Embrick together with Newton D. Baker, former secretary of war and Col. E. M. House, will be his honorary pallbearers.

PARIS, France, Nov. 10 (AP)—The death of Gen. Tucker E. Bliss occasioned a prominent place on Paris front pages today, most papers publishing photographs and lengthy obituary notices of the general, who presented to the Synod. 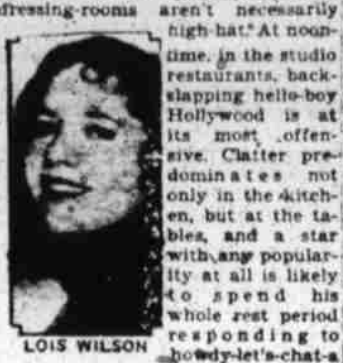

It is true as a rule to give the benefits of the money to the needy. But there are many who are not in need of the money. Some are in need of the money to help them to live better.

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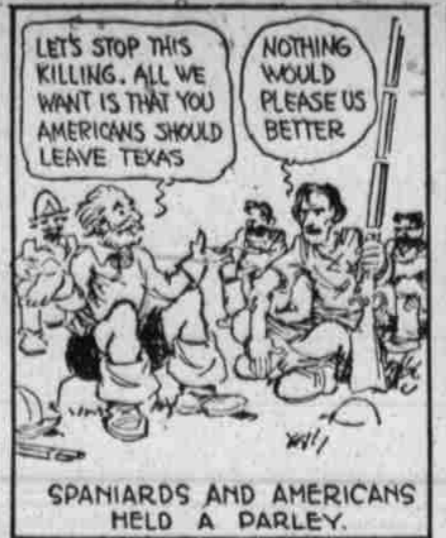

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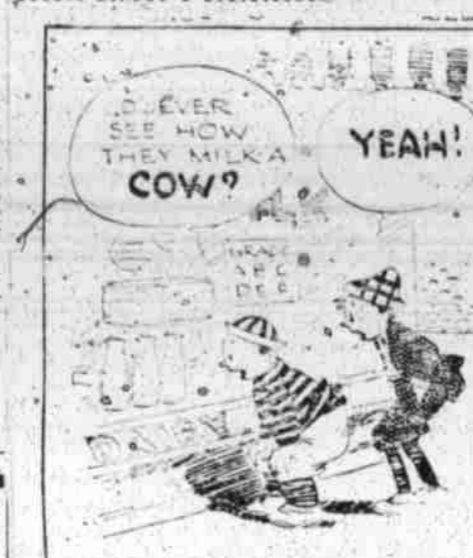

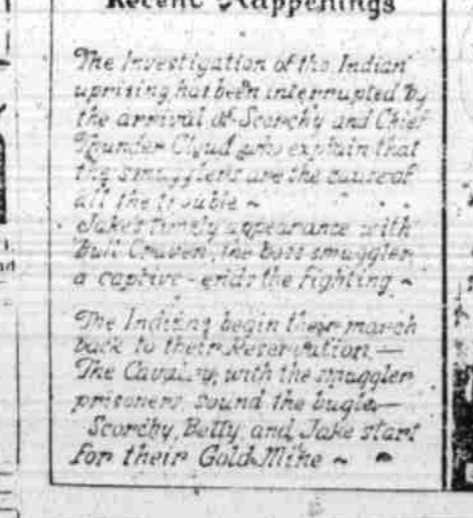
