Panhandle used runningback Brady Shadid's 53-yard scoring jaunt and converted three Wheeler turnovers into 20 points all in the fourth quarter to blow open what had been a moderately close game. Going into the fourth guarter Panhandle led the Mustangs 30-20. Twelve minutes later however, the score board read 57-20.

57-20? It was strange to see those kinds of numbers up on the scoreboard. There have been entire 10-game seasons in which a Wheeler defense has not allowed 57 points. Wheeler's 20 points is mildly surprising considering what the Panthers' defense usually gives up. But believe it or not, between these two normally defensive teams, the combined score was a very offensive 77 points.

A big reason for the Panthers' offensive success was the running of Junior fullback, Mark Land. The 163pounder slammed his way to 240 yards on 22 rushes and scored three TD's on runs of 2.67 and 56 yards. Sophomore Brady Shadid, who was moved to runningback from guarterback because of injuries, danced for another 120 yards on 19 carries and three TD's on runs of 53 and 2 yards. Shadid

Two Arrests Made Are In Drug Related Cases

The Wheeler County Sheriff's Dept., U.S. Postal Inspectors, Texas Dept. Public Safety Narcotics Offices culminated a threemonth investigation in Wheeler County resulting in the arrest of two individuals for criminal conspiracy to deliver a controlled substance (Cocaine). Two subjects have been arrested in this case and charged with criminal conspiracy to deliver a controlled substance. One arrest is pending in California for the same charge.

Charged locally is Jamie Darrell Gilmore, 35, a white male,. And Sandra Kay Navratil, 40, a white female. Gilmore is a resident of Wheeler Care Center and Navratil was an employee of Wheeler Care Center. Both persons have been arrested and charged with that offense. His peach orchard was one of his biggest accomplishments. People in Wheeler are still enjoying peaches from his orchard. I enjoyed visiting with Shorty very much and plan to go back and visit him often. I feel like I have met a new friend. When I was in the fifth grade I remember Shorty coming to the school and sharing some of his exciting stories with us. When I told him that I remembered him coming to the school, he said he hoped to get well soon so that he could return to the school and share some of his artifacts and stories with other kids. If you get a chance go by and visit Shorty Sechrist, ;he is a very interesting man to talk with.

Tax Practitioner Workshop is Planned

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service and the Texas Extension Education Foundation, Inc., is once again offering the Tax Practitioner Workshops across the state of Texas, in the Fall of 1992. These workshops are led by CPA's and attorneys who are experienced in the field of income tax reporting and planning. They provide valuable continuing education opportunities for tax professionals seeking DPE and MCLE credit.

This year twenty-six General Tax Workshops, designed for practitioners who work mostly with individuals and small businesses, are offered in major Texas cities. The nearest one will be in Amarillo, on November 23-24. Fourteen Advanced Tax Workshops are also offered. They are directed at the practitioner with substantial experience with individual returns, who does some business work, and feels the need to develop more skills in business related work. One will be offered in Amarillo on December 7-8. In addition to the General and Ad-

vanced Workshops, there will be four each of the Estate Planning Workshops, and threes each of the Fiduclary Income Tax, S Corporation and Basic Partnership Workshops. The Agricultural Tax Problems Workshop, which was introduced in 1989, will be offered this year in two locations -Lubbock and San Antonio. A new workshop for 1992 will be the Taxation of Non-Profit Organizations & Charitable Giving held in San Angelo. HELP CHILDREN TO SHOP WISELY

When shopping with your child, you have a great opportunity to develop their skill in finding the best buy for the money. Choose an item that is something they recognize, but not something they are trying to buy, such as milk or bread. Ask them to tell you which brand, or which size container is the best buy? They may have learned some buying skills at school. Let them show you what they know. Ask them to share how they made their choice.

Take a few minutes to show them the unit price label on the shelf. This helps them spot quickly which one costs the least per ounce or pound. Then ask them how much they think the family needs. Would one size be better than another for your family? Would one type be better for the use intended? Is there some other reason why the lowest price may not be the best buy? Some people prefer whole grain bread over enriched white bread, and are willing to pay more for it. Explain how the giant, economy size may not be the best buy if you need only half as much. Help them see that products that look alike may have different purposes, such as skim, low-fat and homogenized milk. Show how other products that may look entirely different can be a better buy, such as non-fat dry milk for cooking; or, canned rather than fresh tomatoes for soups and sauces. If you are shopping for clothing, let them compare the cost of brand name items with the cost of similar items having a store or generic brand. Let them figure out whether it is more important to them to have more of the items (jeans, shirts, shoes) at a lower price, or fewer at a higher price. Which is more important to them, and what trade-off are they willing to make to get what they want? Next, choose an item on your list and give them the responsibility for finding the best buy. Build their confidence by showing them how much they saved the family by making the best buy.

DISTRICT PRESENTS ANNUAL REPORT


The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District was formed on April 6, 1948, with the protection and enhancement of the available renewable natural resources as its primary purpose. Its boundaries coincide with the boundaries of Wheeler County. It is governed by a board of five elected directors who are resident land owners in the District and are actively engaged in farming or ranching.

The current Board of Directors consists of Paul Macina, Jim Batton, Darville Atherton, and John Vermillion. Clarence Zybach, who has been on the board since it was created, passed away this year, and his position has not been filled as of this date.

The District entered into a memo of understanding with the Soil Conservation Service in 1948 to provide personnel specially trained in the field of erosion control. The current SCS staff consists of Fred Allison , Jr., district Conservationist; Kenneth Reed, Range Conservationist; and Calvin Devereaux, Soil conservationist. Rhonda Ferguson is employed as a District Clerk. Don Humphreys is a Green Thumb employee.

The SWCD works closely with the SCS to promote all phases of conservation. Your SWCD is proud to present this report of some of the work and accomplishments during the 1992 fiscal year.

Wheeler County SWCD has been busy during 1992. Most of the business involves establishing grass on acreage enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and development & servicing of Food Security Act (FSA) plans. Under the CRP program, highly erodible cropland is converted to grassland with government assistance. Each CRP contract is for a ten year period where the land user Notice is hereby given that receives annual rental payments in exchange for not farming land. Wheeler County has 341 active contracts on approximately 55,222 acres. Wheeler County has reached its 25% limitation. The Food Security Act of 1985 mandated that every farmer who produces crops on highly erodible soils must have developed a conservation plan by January 1, 1990. These plans must be fully applied by January 1, 1995. Wheeler County has approximately 826 Food Security Act plans.

Oct. Named Domestic Violence Awareness Mo.

October has been designated Domestic Violence Awareness Month, according to Janet Watts, Executive Director of Tralee Crisis Center.

Each year in the United States about 3-4 million women are physically abused by their mates. Because understanding the problem is the first step toward solving it, Tralee is sponsoring a ribbon campaign in honor of those women who have lost their lives at the hands of their partners. Everyone is asked to wear a purple ribbon which Tralee is providing in each community served during the month in support of this cause. Ribbons are available in the County Judge's office in the courthouse.

During the last year in the eight counties served by Tralee, services were provided to 335 adults and children. Sexual assault cases accounted for an additional 20 victims.

Tralee Crisis Center is a non-profit organization whose belief is that every person has the right to live free of violence. If a woman chooses not to stay at the shelter but is subjected to an abusive partner, there is a counselor who provides help for her. Recently, a children's program has been formed for residents' and non-residents' children who have been emotionally and/or physically subjected to Brenda Wilkinson, Victim Services Coordinator, also serves as the Outreach Representative for Roberts, Hemphill, Wheeler, Collingsworth and Donley counties. She is available to serve anyone by appointment in these communities on Thursdays. Linda Wright of the Borger office serves Carson and Hutchinson counties. There is also offered a 12 step program, HEART, Helping End Abusive Relationship Tendencies, which meets bi-monthly and is open to the public. The center is always in need of dedicated volunteers. Anyone who is interested in serving in that capacity is urged to call the office at 669-1131 or if in an Outreach area, 800-658-2796. Any donations or financial assistance are always appreciated. Youth figure out pretty quickly that money is required to get many of the things they want. To help them put money in a resourceful perspective, use activities that help them realize that money is used for goods and services you cannot or do not want to make or perform for yourself.

Choose a discovery time to share with your children. Discover together what your family uses that requires money and what you can do or get without spending money because you choose to use your time and talent instead. Involve your child in listing things your family bought or used recently, such as toys, books, paper for drawing and writing, groceries, food eaten away from home and gasoline. Discover together what choices your family had about using your talents and time or your money to get these goods and services.

For example, is paper recycled from work for them to use for art activities at home? Are toys "handed down" from child to child within the family? Are books checked out from the library or bought for family reading? What do you use the car to do that family members could do by bicycle or walking instead? Why do you choose to cook some meals and pay more to eat some meals away from home? The answers are different from every family and may be different from child to child. Your goal is to help you children see money as one of several resources the family can use to get the things you need and want.

Encourage your child to begin adding up how much money it takes to get the things he or she wants or needs for a week. At the end of the week, let them share their discovery. Let them share their decisions about when to use money and when to use their other resources to get what they want. Resourceful youth develop a sense that money is not the only resource, but one of many choices they have for reaching their goals in life.

Teach Children How to Use their Resources

Guiding the development of your child's personal resources builds the greatest resource they will ever have - themselves. As you build your child's confidence in his or her resourcefulness, it is also important to



a want and why, and what choices the two of you have for meeting the need or want.

For example, if your son has been learning about building personal energy resources, he may need more exercise, but want to watch TV more. Guide his thinking with questions about the choices he has about playing that could also give more exercise, such as play that involves running, swimming, or dancing

By helping children learn the difference between needs and wants and seeing how they make choices in the use of their resources to meet their needs and wants, they begin to see and live with the limits of their resources. Teaching them principles of resourceful living gives them a foundation for thinking about using limited resources to meet unlimited needs and wants as they increase their responsibility for managing money resources and become more aware of the limits of our natural resources. They become resourceful in applying the same principles to living with all resource limitations with greater understanding and less stress.

I never worry about writing for my classes I passed the English Proficiency Test the first time I took it, which is something not many students can attest too. In case you wondering, this is an essay test that must be passed in order to graduate.

WHEELER CARE CENTER.

There is one thing that can be declared without reservation about a nursing home. There is no monotony. Each day brings its own surprises and interesting events. There are no problems, just situations to be handled and very seldom do we see two days alike.

The purpose of this letter is to make a first hand statement to give facts regarding a happening that has caused wide spread rumor both in Wheeler Care Center and in the town of Wheeler. About a month ago activity intensified at WCC with law enforcement officers swarming in and around the nursing home. Taking employees and others away to be questioned and holding conferences within the facility. Needless to say this caused no small stir among patients and staff alike. Those staff members who were in the know were instructed by Sheriff Jimmy Adams to make no comments about the case and we were forced to evade the many questions which came forth. Wheeler has a very effective small town grape vine and word spread but it does not always carry the full truth.

For some time some of the Department Heads at the Center had suspected that a resident of the nursing home was involved in the distribution of illegal drugs and that one or more of the employees were helping him. Nothing could be done until there was evidence to support their opinions.

When they had something to back up the charge the Administrator was informed and he called Sheriff Adams for a meeting. Within minutes of the call Sheriff Adams sat down in the office with the Administrator, Director of Nursing, Karen Puryear, and Tracy Newsom, Assistant Administrator. Upon hearing our report the Sheriff informed us that he was aware of the situation and was working with federal drug agents and the Postal Inspector, as a PO box was being used. This meeting was on Friday, August 21st, and Sheriff Adams asked that we keep it quiet over the weekend while they gathered more evidence.

On Monday, August 24th, the mail came and an envelope was delivered to our resident who has no use of his limbs and requires total assistance. He called for help to open the envelope and put its contents in a locked drawer in his room.







opened the envelope law officers swarmed into the room and took possession of the packet which proved to be cocaine. Angie was escorted out of the facility by two officers and was questioned extensively. She was then released without being charged in any manner as she was only doing her duty in assisting a resident and did not know what was in the package she was asked to open. There was a rumor in town that Angie was arrested for stealing, but it was totally false. She was not arrested, only questioned as were many other employees.

It is our understanding that one resident of Wheeler Care Center, one employee and one or more persons in California who supplied the drugs are being charged with crimes. It has been extremely difficult to continue suppressing gossip, caring for a resident everyone on staff knows is being charged and quelching rumors while indictments were being prepared.

I want to publicly apologize to the staff members who have been questioned, suspicioned and inconvenienced by the month long ordeal. Sheriff Adams has stated that the case could never have been closed without the help of the WCC staff. They all performed in an admirable way and I want to personally thank each of them.

This case has been reported to the Texas Department of Health both in Austin and in the Regional office at Canyon and there is no stigma attached to the Nursing Home in regard to this matter. Charges are pending against the individuals who were caught dealing in illicit drugs, but there are no charges being filed against Wheeler Care Center, its owner, Administrator or any of the management staff of the Care Center.

Special thanks for fulfilling their duty in a superb way during this investigation go to Tracy Newsom, Karen Puryear, Angie Mata, Kim Flanagan, Cathy Montgomery, Janine Mata and also I want to thank Sheriff Adams and those who worked with him for their quick response and systematic investigation which brought this issue to fruitation quickly before it could involve others.
