CYCLONES DOWN MUSTANGS Wellington Is Friday Opponent PEP RALLY FRIDAY

Anyone who witnessed last Friday night's game between Wheeler and Memphis can attest to one fact: the Memphis Cyclones did some offensive numbers to Wheeler. But it's not what you would think.

Memphis was not a rude guest who came into Nicholson field and taunted the Mustangs and cheap-shot or speared. Not at all.

What Memphis did that was so offensive was bringing their offense. And, oh boy, did they ever bring their offense.

The cyclones used to quarterback to shred Wheeler's defense for 266 yards while their runners averaged a shade under 10 yards per carry en route to 321 yards rushing on the way to Memphis' 52-22 win over Wheeler.

Meanwhile on the other side of the ball, Wheeler pounded out 237 rushing yards but the Mustangs' passing game was dreadful. Stang quarterback Chad Dunnam was harassed, sacked, hurried and beaten up into misfiring on all ten of his passing attempts while being picked off twice.

Things started out really badly for Wheeler just one play into the game. Cyclone quarterback Jay Lynn Runnels scooted 71 yards for six points on the first play from scrimmage and added a PAT kick for a 7-0 Cyclone

lead just 21 seconds into the game. Runnels was the catalyst for Memphis all night as the speedy senior passed for 168 yards on 9 completions with 2 TD's via the pass and another 107 yards on six rushes and two more TD's on the ground.

After Runnels' initial score and kick, things were all Memphis as they rolled to a 26-0 halftime lead. Fullback Kerry Brown scored six on a 29-yard run with 11:45 left to cap a six-play, 62-

Deadline Is Near For Tagging, Entering Stock

Although it is only October, 4-H and FFA members who plan to exhibit in the Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show are putting their lambs and hogs on feed.

These members should remember that the entry deadline for the county stock show is November 1, 1992 according to Don King, county Extension agent. All lambs and hogs must be tagged in June but steers and heifers must also be entered by November 1. The exhibitor may receive a refund of the entry fee if he scratches his animal from the show by January 1, 1993.

This year all of the animals will not be brought to the county show barn to be tagged. Instead, they will be tagged by the agriculture science teacher or county Extension agent. For those who are unable to get their animals tagged earlier may bring them to the county show barn between 10:00 and 11:00 a.m. on Saturday, October 31 to be tagged.

Any members who plan to show but do not have animals yet should contact the AST or CEA immediately.

4-H is the youth development program of the Texas Agriculture Extension Service and focuses on the needs, interests and concerns of boys and girls between 3rd grade and 19 years of age regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, handicap, religion or national origin.

yard drive. Runnels garnered his second rushing touchdown with a six-yard burst to end a 7-play, 32-yard drive with 8:48 left in the half. Runnels went to work again with 3:25 left by connecting with Tony Samaniego on 26-yard scoring pass to close out a four-play, 87-yard drive that ended the scoring for the first 24 minutes.

There was much more to come however. The Ponies put points on the board with a 12-play, 80 yard adventure that Mark Marshall ended with a 5-yard run. The Mustangs were extremely impressive on this drive as they ate 6:25 off the clock right off the second half kickoff.

But Memphis was merciless as they came back with a six-play, 62-yard drive that Kerry Brown finished with a 23-yard catch-and-run with 4:42 left on the clock in the third quarter. The Cyclones were at it again with 1:57 left in the third period as Cyclone tailback Brian Brown sprinted 38 yards to paydirt to boost the Memphis lead to 38-8.

And they were not even through yet. The Cyclone reserves entered the game without missing a beat. Re-

The Wheeler Seventh Grade Colts held on to defeat Memphis 14-6 to remain an undefeated 6-0 squad. The Colt defense spearheaded by linebackers Mike Johnson and Jeremy Davis held the Whirlwinds at bay. Memphis gained only 48 total yards.

The Colts opened up quickly as Davis scored on a 63 yard run on the opening play from scrimmage. Bryan Judd added the 2 point conversion to make the score Wheeler 8, Memphis 0. At this point, mistakes continued to plague the seventh graders. Penalties and fumbles stopped more plays than the Whirlwind defense. Disaster finally struck in the 2nd quarter, as an errant Wheeler pitch was ran back by Memphis for a 42 yard TD. The PAT pass failed. This 8 to 6 Wheeler lead

remained at the half.

Following a detailed discussion of their first half play, the Colts opened the second half with a fine 7 play 57 yard march into the Memphis end zone. Marshall Flowers covered the final 15 yards on a bootleg run. The PAT run was stopped. Once again, the offense went stale and could not muster any more points. The 14-6 score was the final.

COUNTY-WIDE MEETING SET FOR TUES. EVENING

The Wheeler County Commissioners have called a bond election for October 31, 1992; to determine if the commissioners shall be authorized to issue bonds in the amount of \$1.25 million. the bonds are to go for the construction of a private prison at Shamrock.

A county-wide meeting has been called by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce on Tuesday, October 27, 1992, for the purpose of discussing the issue. Informed individuals will be at the meeting to discuss both sides of the issue. Those in attendance will be offered the opportunity to ask questions. The meeting will begin at 7:00 p.m. and will be held at the school.

Prison Bond Election Questions & Answers

The following questions on the Prison Bond Election were answered by the Shamrock Economic Development Board.

What is the Bond Election For?

The purpose of the bond election is to allow the County of Wheeler to be able to provide incentives in the amount of \$1,250,000.00 to the State of Texas for the purpose of building a privately managed correctional facility in Wheeler County.

How much is the proposed tax increase?

The proposed tax increase will be .0443 cents per \$100.00 of valuation. The current tax base of Wheeler County is \$404,062,940. A .0443 cent per \$100 increase would generate an overall increase of \$170,000 per year for ten years. This total would completely retire the bond issue and the cost associated with the issue.

How much will the proposed increase cost me?

It depends. The additional cost to a Wheeler County tax payer will depend upon the taxable value of your property. Here are some examples.

1) A piece of property valued at \$50,000.00 will cost an additional \$22.15 per year for ten years, or a total of \$221.50.

2) A piece of property valued at \$20,000.00 will cost an additional \$8.86 per year for ten years, or a total of \$88.60.

Will the proposed tax increase affect my city or school taxes?

Absolutely not. The only tax that will be affected will be the county tax bill.

Why should I vote to increase my taxes?

It may sound odd, but a small increase in county taxes now will save a large increase in taxes later. There are two reasons for this statement. First, in 1990 Wheeler County had a tax base of \$468,070,474. The next year in 1991 the tax base had fallen by almost thirty million dollars to \$438,587,618 and now in 1992 stands at \$404,062,940. The tax rate in 1990 was .2925 cents per \$100 valuation. The next year it went to .3600 cents per \$100 valuation and now it stands at .39069 cents per \$100 valuation. As valuation falls, the rate of tax must increase to maintain the same revenue as the previous year. Secondly, the population of Wheeler County has declined. This due in large part to lack of jobs for the area. With fewer people to pay taxes, a heavier burden is distributed over fewer people. The increase that has been proposed is for one reason only...to create jobs in Wheeler County. About 110 jobs with a \$4.5 million payroll annually.

How is this private prison different from Tulia's private prison?

The private prison that was built in Tulia was a speculative gamble. It was built with the hopes that the State of Texas would contract to house inmates there. The State of Texas found the private prison in Tulia to be inadequately constructed and therefore refused to contract with the owners. The unit Wheeler County is trying to secure is "response to a State generated request for proposal." In other words, the State of Texas is originating the idea to build a 500-bed facility to house inmates. The State will guarantee to put prisoners here or the County will not issue the bonds. It is as simple as that. If the State is not willing to sign a contract to guarantee inmates in the prison, then Wheeler County will not offer any incentives!

What happens if Wheeler County does not get a prison?

The bonds will not be issued and the taxes will not go up to cover the bonds. it will be just like no action at all was taken.

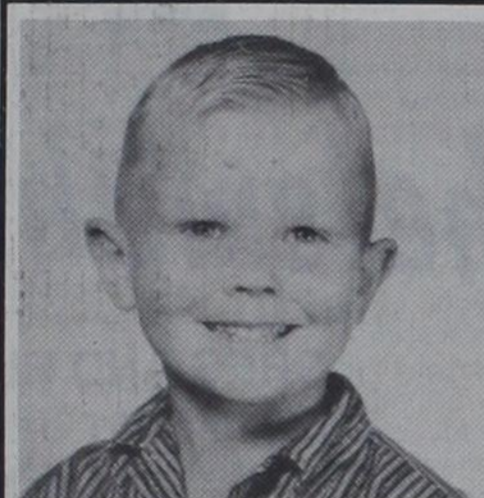

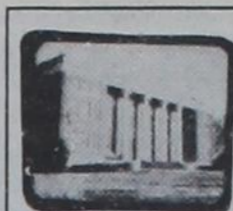

TEACH CHILDREN HOW TO SAVE WITH COUPONS AND SALES

Youth are drawn to advertisements and coupons. Resourceful youth are able to recognize when these sales tools are helpful to the consumer.

Think with your children about a family goal — a vacation, a weekend outing, repainting their room, something that's important to them. Let them choose a goal and start teaching them how they can help the family reach this goal. Teach them to be resourceful shoppers, spotting sales, advertisements and coupons for things the family will be buying. The money they help the family save from sales prices and coupons can be added to family savings for the goal they've chosen.

Planning as a family, list the items you will buy this month in addition to your weekly food shopping list. Show your children how to check the expiration date for coupons and set up a box or envelope for them to store clipped coupons. Have a place for family members to place magazines and newspapers that are ready for clipping.

Set a time to have "shoppers' news" each day. This is a time for children to report on sales for the family to consider, if they have found something at a good price the family plans to buy. Most sales have cut-off dates. Check advertisements to decide why the sale price is being offered. Will it not likely be at this low price again soon? Is it something that is used frequently by stores to pull consumers into the store, hoping you will switch to a nicer, higher priced product?

Use shoppers' next time to organize coupons clipped. Show your children how to organize coupons in the order that items are typically found in the stores where you shop, so price comparisons can be made easily at the store.

On shopping day, involve your children in locating the items that they

have found sales ads or coupons for, and involve them in deciding if it truly is a good buy. Help them compare to see if the produce price is lower than other options after the coupon is used, or does the coupon require them to buy a size or quantity the family does not need.

Let them add up the savings that come from their efforts, and record on a chart at home their contribution to the family's goals.

Resourceful youth develop skills in spotting money saving ads and coupons. They also are quick to recognize when these sales tools truly save them money and when ads might encourage someone to buy something they really did not need or plan to buy.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

From the Minister's Desk:

The *Amarillo Globe News* recently contained an article about a spiritual retreat that has been attended by many people from this region of the Texas panhandle. Having heard some favorable reports about this retreat, I anxiously read this article. But after I read it, I had at least two serious concerns about this retreat.

According to the article in the *Amarillo Globe News*, the purpose of this retreat is: "to help people become aware of Jesus Christ in their lives, as the disciples did on the road to Emmaus in the 24th chapter of Luke and to inspire them to serve in their home churches." While this is a commendable purpose, my concern is how it is achieved. In my opinion, a genuine awareness of Jesus is not achieved in the lives of people by some highly emotional ploy. Rather it is produced by faith in the objective teachings of the Bible. (Romans 10:17)

When Jesus met the disciples on the road to Emmaus, they were confused about His crucifixion and resurrection, but He did not use some highly emotional ploy to correct their confusion. Jesus simply said: "O foolish men and slow of heart to believe in all that the prophets have spoken! Was it not necessary for Christ to suffer these things and to enter into His glory?" (Luke 24:25-26) Then following this admonition, Jesus began "with Moses and with all the prophets", explaining "to them the things concerning Himself in all the Scriptures." (Luke 24:27)

From this explanation, it should be obvious that an "awareness of Jesus" in the lives of people is not achieved by some highly emotional ploy. This awareness is achieved by an obedient faith in the inspired teachings of the Bible.

Another concern of mine is the

attitude that this retreat fosters toward the will of God. This concern was caused by a statement that was quoted in this article. It was a statement that a lady made after she attended this seminar. She said: "It's kind of like a supermarket, you just take off the shelf what God's got for you, take it home and leave the rest."

It is totally inconceivable to me that some people believe that the will of God can be determined by personal choice or preference. These people need to remember that Jesus said: "Not everyone who says to Me, Lord, Lord, will enter the Kingdom of heaven; but he who does the will of My Father, who is in heaven, many will say to me on that day, Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name, and in your name cast out demons, and in your name perform many miracles? And then I will declare to them, I never knew you; depart from Me, you who practice lawlessness." (Matthew 7:21-23)

To enter the "—kingdom of heaven—" people must do the will of the heavenly Father. For this reason, people must expositively study the Bible. When people expositively study the Bible, they have only one concern which is to learn and to know the will of God. Their allegiance is to the will of God not to their personal opinion, preference, or choice.

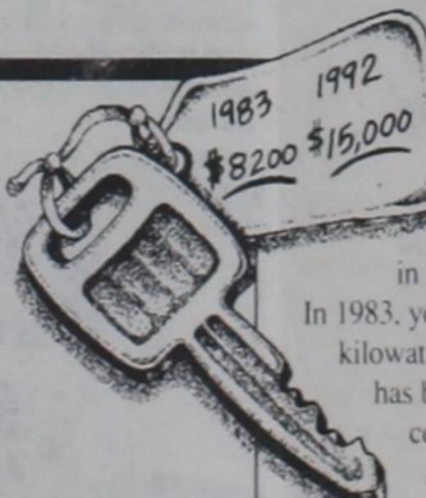
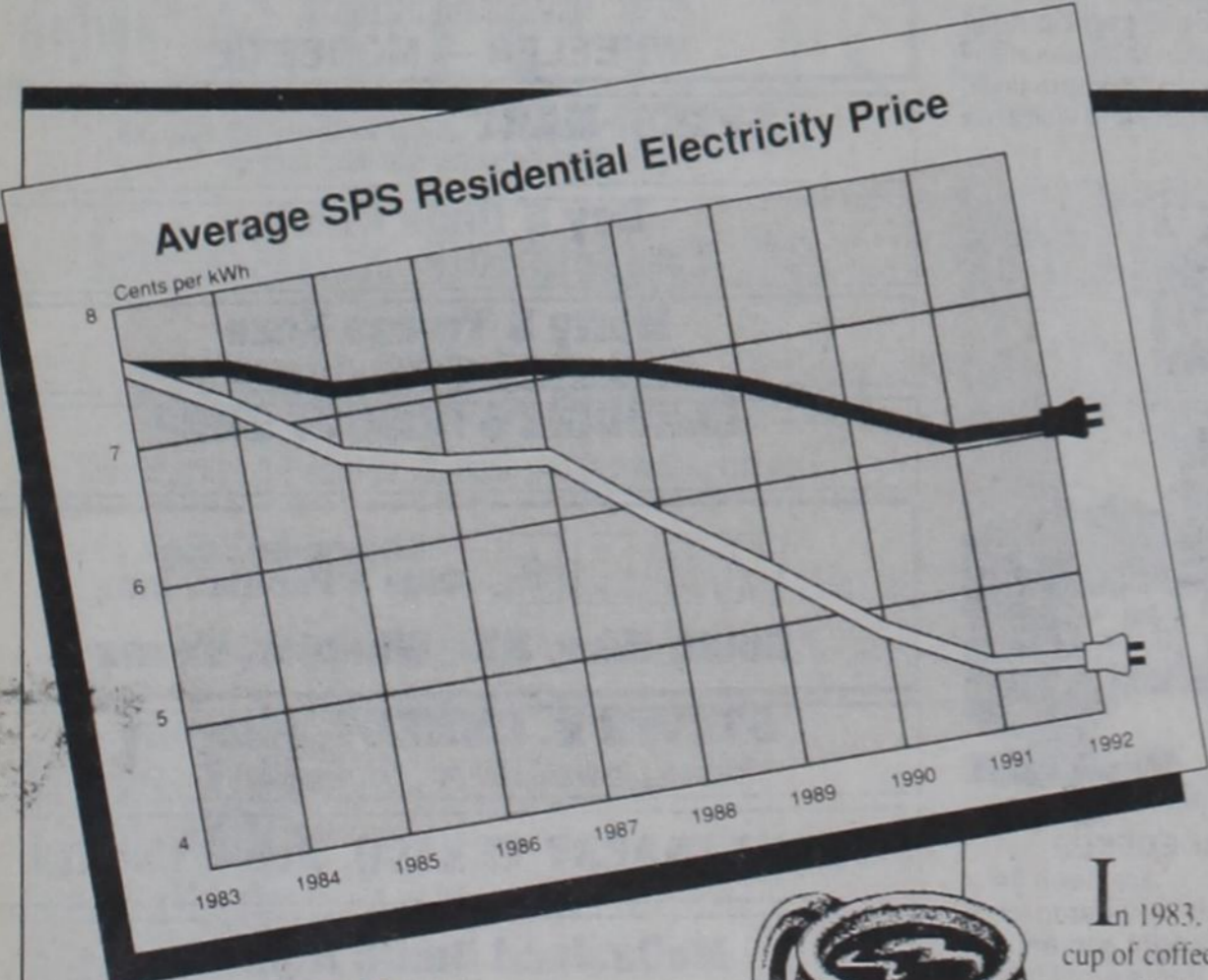

What is the bond election for?

The purpose of the bond election is to allow the County of Wheeler to be able to provide incentives in the amount of \$1,200,000.00 to the State of Texas for the purpose of building a privately managed correctional facility in Wheeler County.

How much is the proposed tax increase?

The proposed tax increase will be .042 cents per \$100.00 of valuation. The current tax base of Wheeler County is \$404,062,940.

A .042 cent per \$100 increase would generate an overall increase of \$170,000 per year for ten years. This total would completely retire the bond issue and the cost associated with the issue.

How much will the proposed increase cost me?

The majority of all county taxes are paid by the oil and gas industry. The cost to you as an individual taxpayer depends upon the taxable value of your property. Here are some examples:

(1) A piece of property valued at \$50,000.00 will cost an additional \$21.00 per year for ten years, or a total of \$210.00.

(2) A piece of property valued at \$20,000.00 will cost \$8.40 per year for ten years, or a total of \$84.00.

Will the proposed tax increase affect my city or school taxes?

Absolutely not! The only tax that will be affected will be the county tax bill.

The added jobs and increased population could prevent increases in future city, school, and county taxes.

Why should I vote to increase my taxes?

It may sound odd, but a small increase in county taxes now will save a large increase in taxes later. There are two reasons for this statement.

First, in 1990 Wheeler County had a tax base of \$468,070,474. The next year, in 1991, the tax base had fallen by almost thirty million dollars to \$438,587,681 and now in 1992 stands at \$404,062,940. The tax rate in 1990 was .2925 cents per \$100 valuation. The next year it went to .3600 cents per \$100 and now it stands at .39069 cents per \$100. As valuation falls, the rate of tax must increase to maintain the same revenue as the previous year.

Secondly, the population of Wheeler County has declined. This due in large part to lack of jobs for the area. With fewer people to pay taxes, a heavier burden is distributed over fewer people. The increase that has been proposed is for one reason only...to create jobs in Wheeler County. About 110 jobs with a \$4.5 million payroll annually.

How is this private prison different from Tulia's private prison?

The private prison that was built in Tulia was a speculative gamble. It was built with the hopes that the State of Texas would contract to house inmates there. The State of Texas found the private prison in Tulia to be inadequately constructed and therefore refused to contract with the owners. The unit Wheeler County is trying to secure is a "response to a State generated request for proposal". In other words, the State of Texas is originating the idea to build a 500 - bed facility to house inmates. The State will guarantee to put prisoners here or the County will not issue bonds. It is as simple as that. If the State is not willing to sign a contract to guarantee inmates in the prison, then Wheeler County will not offer any incentives!

The Golden Agers from the First Baptist Church of Wheeler took a Fall Foliage Tour in the Springfield, Missouri/Eureka Springs, Arkansas area October 12-15, 1992.

We left Wheeler at 6:00 A.M., Monday. Stopping in Carthage, Missouri we toured the Precious Moments Chapel. Many beautiful sights awaited us there. Fifty-four spectacular murals, painted in Renaissance tones, line the walls of the Chapel which covers 5,000 square feet. Each mural depicts one of the artist's favorite Bible stories. The largest mural, the ceiling, spans 26,000 feet and pictures cherubs floating overhead.

The fifteen stained glass windows, some containing over 1,200 individually cut pieces of glass, are among the most exquisite treasures in the Chapel. These were designed and hand-leaded by the artist, Samuel Butcher, and his family.

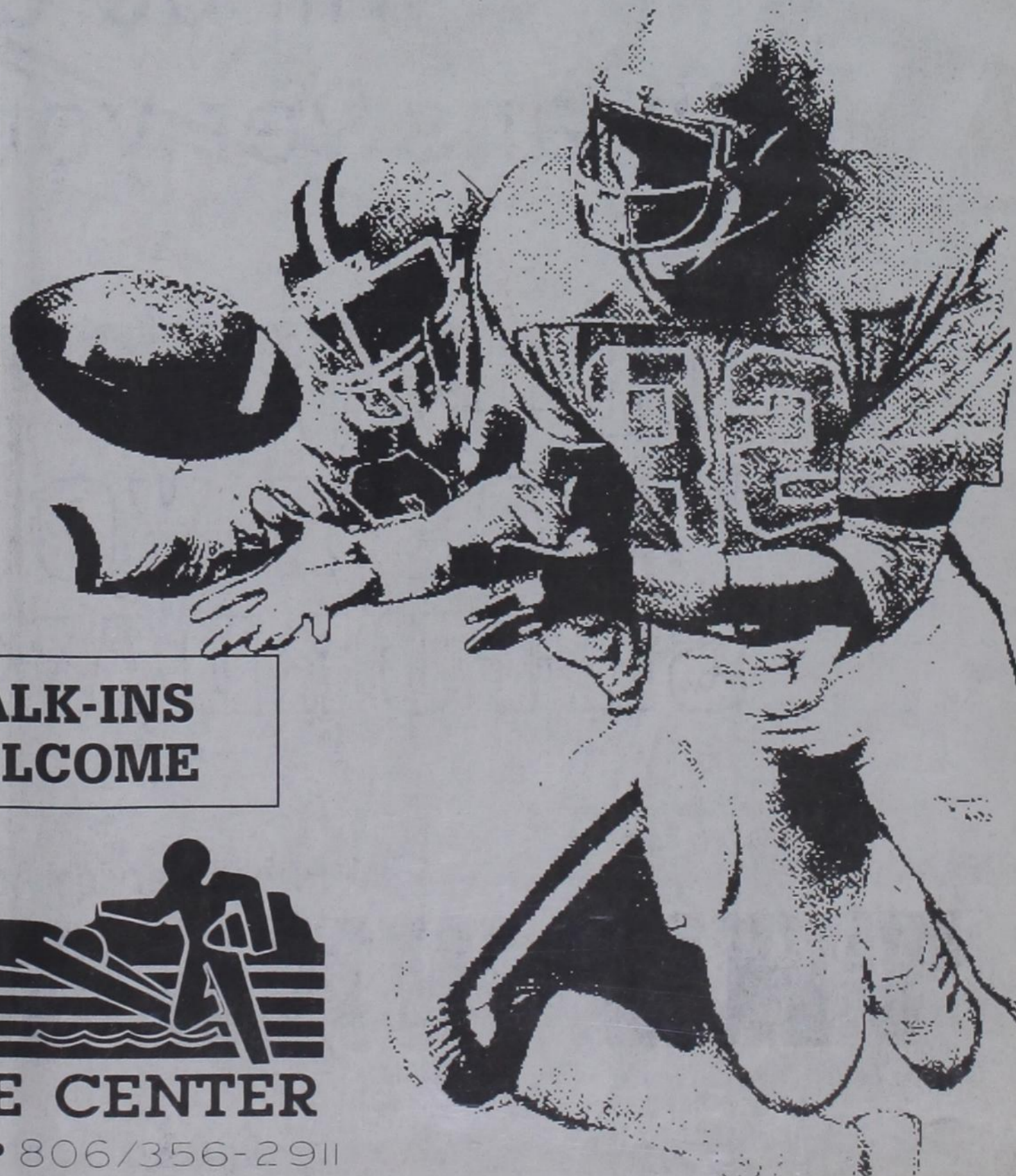
