Recognized each year by the Chamber are the Outstanding Citizens. The recipients of these awards are announced each year as the plaque is presented. The Outstanding Man, Woman, Teenager, Employee and Farmer/Rancher will be named and plaques will be presented.

Kenneth Wyatt is truly one of America's foremost artists. Dr. Wyatt is known for his Western and Christian

are; however his landscape, still life and character study work is among the best anywhere. Wyatt is internationally recognized for his Christian paintings, is the author of several books on art, is known for his numerous books as author, poet and illustrator, and he is one of the most sought after speakers for after dinner affairs.

Kenneth Wyatt works in oil, watercolor, pencil, pastel, charcoal and sculpture. His work is produced for the public in original form, framed or matted print, note cards, Christmas cards, jewelry and in limited edition bronze and pewter sculpture.

In recent years, the Tulsa artist gained national recognition when he painted *Offer Them Christ*, commemorating 200 years of Methodism in the United States. Following this, Wyatt painted portraits of the Twelve Apostles, Paul and Jesus.

Among many celebrities who own Dr. Wyatt's work are Ronald Reagan and Queen Elizabeth of Great Britain. Both have painting depicting cowboys wearing yellow slickers in a rainstorm, riding their horses while herding cattle.

The meal will be catered by Maxey's Steakhouse. The barbecue meal will

offer a choice of two meats. Tickets will be \$12.00 per plate; tickets are on sale and may be purchased from any member of the Chamber. Tickets are also available at the Chamber office.

Just a few short weeks ago I noticed in my hometown paper where a couple were celebrating their 50th wedding anniversary. I just couldn't believe it, we just can't be that old but time has flown by. I remember when we were kids in school together and how much fun we had just being kids. Kids walked to school and these two just lived 2 1/2 miles east of town and many of the kids lived near them. I enjoyed visiting with one friend that lived out that way and on the way home I guess we were just glad to be out of school and we laughed and chased each other and many the times we would go to one or the others home and play softball for a while till many of them had to do the chores that were a part of their lives such as feeding the stock, gathering the eggs and milkin the cows.

Just a couple of days ago one of our daughters that has been married into this family we have known so long called me and said Papa, Bill, was taking Marie to the bathroom just before retiring and as he pushed her wheelchair into the bathroom he had a heart attack and passed away instantly. Marie had been in the wheelchair for the past several years due to a diabetic condition and her vision was gone all but just seeing light or dark and being there in the bathroom and being blocked by her mate's body, she had to sit there through the night until one of her married sons came by about seven in the morning.

Your heart goes out to a dear friend at times like this and I'm sure all the readers feel the same. When I called Marie I asked how she was doing and she said through her faith she was fine and by her side were her four grown sons and their families and she said the Lord has blessed me with my family.

We have been watching the inauguration doings in the Capital and all the things that are happening there in preparation for the new administration and really don't envy the folks that have been standing in the long lines to see what is happening. Honestly you have a much better view of all of it in the comfort of your home than anyone there in the thousands of viewers, that's including the new President and their guests.

As we were watching the gala event I thought of my mother that had the privilege of being there sixty years ago when Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Garner were to be inducted into these honored positions. Mother had a seat with the Garner family and had received an invite to the event some few weeks before. At the time I wondered what it meant and how in the world mother could get there. I knew mother was a cousin of Mr. Garner and she had gotten invited since he was Speaker of the House in the 20s but we were in a depression and she was a widow with three children at home. I was 12 and the others older but where would her funds come from for the trip.

Mothers determination was the solution and she came home from the visit with more determination to survive. We still have the photos of the ceremony and her invite among mother's things. Somewhere on the train trip mother was injured by a fall that was caused by a new engineer that bumped the train and caused her to fall back and hurt her back. The C&O RR was very nice to her and asked how she felt about the injury caused by them. Mother said I know the young man didn't intend to injure anyone and anyone could have had it happen. For many years after the C&O RR sent her a small Christmas gift. Her back bothered her the rest of her life but she blamed none.

My favorite wife is that way, she don't blame me for my mistakes nor my undoings. Reconciling mothers are like that and thank goodness for their endurance and determination.

GIVE AND RECEIVE

The economy may not improve substantially in the coming years. There are many things that could happen to make it worse. AIDS could become very costly especially if homosexuals in the military begin receiving full government paid medical coverage and they have the virus. Businesses across the country which will be required to provide health care in much greater degrees will not help the economy if some of those businesses go out of business and others raise their prices to the consumer to pay the bill. Soaking the rich more will not help because in the first place, that won't produce that much more revenue to pay for government programs, and in the second place, many will simply tie up their money in tax shelters or in some other way which will take substantial amounts of their investments away from the economy. I'm certainly no expert on these matters and don't claim to understand all things about the economy, but one doesn't have to be much of an expert to see that many things the government thinks must be done to us to supposedly take care of us do much more damage that good. It looks like the tax and spent liberals in this country could see some of these things, but generally speaking, they don't believe the American people can do for themselves. Therefore, they always come for more and more money from us to be our big brother. I recently heard a Congressman say that in the last 28 years, taxes have been raised 56 times by the federal government. For every dollar in increased revenue, he said the government has spent \$1.59. What is the "YES." Well, the government and the new Administration says more revenue. Actually, they call it "Investment" in America and the people. It plainly means more taxes.

Is there something you can do to help your financial situation in light of all this? The answer is "YES" Biblical principles work if you follow them. Jesus Christ said, "Give, and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down and shaken together, and running over, shall men give into your bosom." (Luke 6:38) This is not a time for being slack in giving to the Lord's work. God had given clear promises to provide for us even in bad economic times if we give tithes and offerings. He said that He would rebuke the devourer for our sakes and that we would be blessed if we would be faithful to tithe. Tithing and giving offerings is the best investment for the future that you can make. God said that if we sow financial seeds into the ministry that we will reap. No economic disaster, no political maneuver, and nobody can keep God from keeping His Word to you if you will believe it and obey it. Keep on giving and you will keep on receiving. He will give you enough and more if you'll trust His Word. He doesn't lie. He'll take care of His obedient people if He has to send ravens with provisions in their mouths or if He has to rain down manna from Heaven. The greatest tragedy for you will be if you look at the ominous clouds on the horizon and quit giving to God's work. Then, you are indeed headed for trouble. Then you can never save up enough to take care of yourself. When evaluating what to cut out in order to stay solvent, don't cut the wrong thing. Be faithful to God, and He will be faithful to you.

SUPPLEMENTS MORE BENEFICIAL TO SOME THAN OTHERS

According to research, many groups of Americans—from infants to the elderly—can benefit from taking supplements.

Infants that are breast-fed or fed with prepared formula that requires no additional water can be given fluoride supplements. Infant formulas lack fluoride, and breast milk lacks adequate amounts.

Since breast milk is low in vitamins C and D pediatricians may prescribe Vitamin D to breast-fed infants if exposure to sunlight is inadequate. By six months of age, all infants need a readily absorbable source of iron, such as fortified cereal or a low-dose supplement.

Generally, the diets of well-nourished children provide enough vitamins. However, children often indulge in prolonged food jags. Many parents opt to give their children over-the-counter supplements to safeguard against nutrient gaps.

Vitamin D, calcium, phosphorus and iron are supplements needed by teenagers to support bone growth and a growing muscle mass. High-bone density in youth protects against osteoporotic fractures in later life.

Women in their reproductive years, especially those who experience excessive menstrual bleeding, may need supplements to make up for what's lost. About 30 milligrams of iron per day or more may be needed to correct anemia. Zinc and copper supplements are also important.

Folic acid supplements may be beneficial to women taking oral contraceptives whose diets are lacking in fruit juices, whole grain or fortified cereals and green leafy vegetables.

The average adult women consumes only a little over half the recom-

mended daily allowance of 800 milligrams of calcium. It is extremely difficult for women who do not consume dairy products to meet the RDA. This group should consider a calcium supplement, especially those ages 11 to 24 who need 1200 milligrams.

Pregnant women with inadequate diets may benefit from a daily supplement supply folic acid, vitamins B-6, C and D, calcium, copper, iron and zinc at the beginning of the second trimester. However, routine supplements are not recommended.

Pregnancy dramatically increases the need for folic acid, which helps build new blood cells. Supplementation is advised when there are serious doubts about the adequacy of dietary folic acid.

The requirement for iron doubles during pregnancy to ensure adequate oxygen transport. This increase cannot be met by diet alone. During the second and third trimesters of pregnancy, iron supplements are recommended.

Nursing mothers are vulnerable to depleting their nutrient stores and must give special attention to the intake of vitamin B-6, folic acid, calcium, magnesium and zinc. As long as lactating women take in enough extra calories, they will probably also meet the RDA for all nutrients but calcium and zinc. Supplements may be needed if dietary sources are marginal.

Recent research indicated that some postmenopausal women may preserve their bone mass by consuming calcium supplements. Only women more than five years postmenopausal who consumed less than 400 milligrams of calcium daily exhibited favorable effects.

These women may benefit from taking a calcium carbonate supplement or calcium citrate malate—the highly absorbable form found in fortified orange juice.

Smokers need vitamin C. Smoking speeds up metabolism of the vitamin. The RDA is 100 milligrams a day for those who smoke 20 or more cigarettes daily. Yet, even this may not be enough. Smokers need at least 150 milligrams per day of Vitamin C just to reach the same blood concentration as non-smokers consuming the standard RDA of 60 milligrams.

Those on low-calorie diets may benefit from a multivitamin/minerals supplement. It becomes increasingly difficult to meet nutrient needs when daily caloric intake falls below 1,500 calories, and below 1,200 calories.

Elderly individuals are at risk for many nutrients. As people age, they require more vitamin B-6, important for neurological and immune functioning. Some people over 65 develop atrophic gastritis, a condition of decreased stomach acid, which impairs the absorption of vitamin B-12, folic acid and calcium.

Elderly people may need additional calcium since they tend to consume only about half the RDA of calcium daily, while also losing calcium from their bones. A supplement of no more than 400 IUs vitamin D is advised for those who do not regularly drink fortified milk and get enough sunlight.

The requirement for vitamin A in the elderly actually may be less than the current RDA, due to increased absorption and/or decreased clearance from the blood. Because too much vitamin A is toxic, intake should not exceed the RDA.

Complementing our diets with a daily multivitamin/mineral supplement providing no more than the RDA for a given nutrient provides insurance for meeting the RDAs. However, always check with your physician before taking supplements that you may not need.

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Veterans with a service-connected disability can receive property tax relief in 1993 by filling out a simple exemption form at the Wheeler County Appraisal District office.

The amount of exemption is based on the veteran's percentage of service-connected disability and can range from \$1,500 to \$3,000. The following taxpayers are eligible: A disabled veteran; a surviving spouse of a deceased disabled veteran, as long as the spouse remains unmarried; a surviving minor child of a deceased disabled veteran, if the veterans spouse does not survive the veteran and if the child is both under 18 and unmarried; a surviving spouse of a person killed while on active duty, whether the spouse is remarried or not at application time; a surviving minor child of a person who was killed on active duty, if the child is both under 18 and unmarried.

Any eligible person who has not received this exemption before must apply by April 30. Those who received the exemption in 1992 need not re-apply in 1993.

An applicant can claim the exemption on only one piece of property, such as a home or any other property the applicant owned on January 1. The applicant must be a Texas resident in order to qualify and must file the exemption application at the appraisal district office by April 30.

An applicant may be required to provide proof of the service-connected disability, such as documentation from the Veterans Administration or the branch of the armed services in which the veteran served. Depending on the applicant, proof of marriage, death, or age may also be required.

From the Minister's Desk:
 Throughout the history of the military judicial system, there have been several highly publicized court-martials. One of these court-martials occurred in 1975 when a naval chaplain, Andrew F. Jensen, was accused of adultery by two women. After a long and highly publicized trial, the jury acquitted Chaplain Jensen, stating that he had been victimized by two sick and conspiring women.
 At the time of the trial, I closely followed its progress and I was pleased with its verdict. To me, it was absurd for the Navy to court-martial a chaplain for having an "affair" when sexual misconduct is often openly practiced by other naval personnel. Why should the Navy have such high standards for a chaplain's behavior and not have equally high standards for other navy personnel? The Navy probably believed that Chaplain Jensen should be "different" from other naval personnel.
 Such an attitude is not limited to the Navy. Many disciples of Jesus often demand a measure of devotion and dedication from a minister which they themselves do not possess. For example, a religious periodical recently published the criteria that some church leaders had used to hire a minister. One of the characteristics of the criteria was that the minister had to "--display the qualities of New Testament Christianity."
 Why should it be any more necessary for a minister to "--display the qualities of New Testament Christianity" than any other disciple of Jesus? These church leaders apparently had the same attitude that the Navy had about Chaplain Jensen. They believed that a minister is "different" from other disciples of Jesus; therefore, he had to "--display the qualities of New Testament Christianity."
 But the Bible does not teach a clergy and laity distinction between a minister and other disciples of Jesus. Yet many disciples of Jesus do make such a distinction, demanding extraordinary devotion and dedication from a minister. It is interesting to think about the reaction of these disciples of Jesus if a minister demanded the same extraordinary devotion and dedication from them.
 Please do not misunderstand. I realize that a minister is a very "visual person" who should be an example of the devotion and dedication to other disciples of Jesus. For this reason, I am not suggesting that less devotion and dedication be required of a minister, but I am suggesting that every disciple of Jesus require of themselves the same devotion and dedication that they expect of a minister.

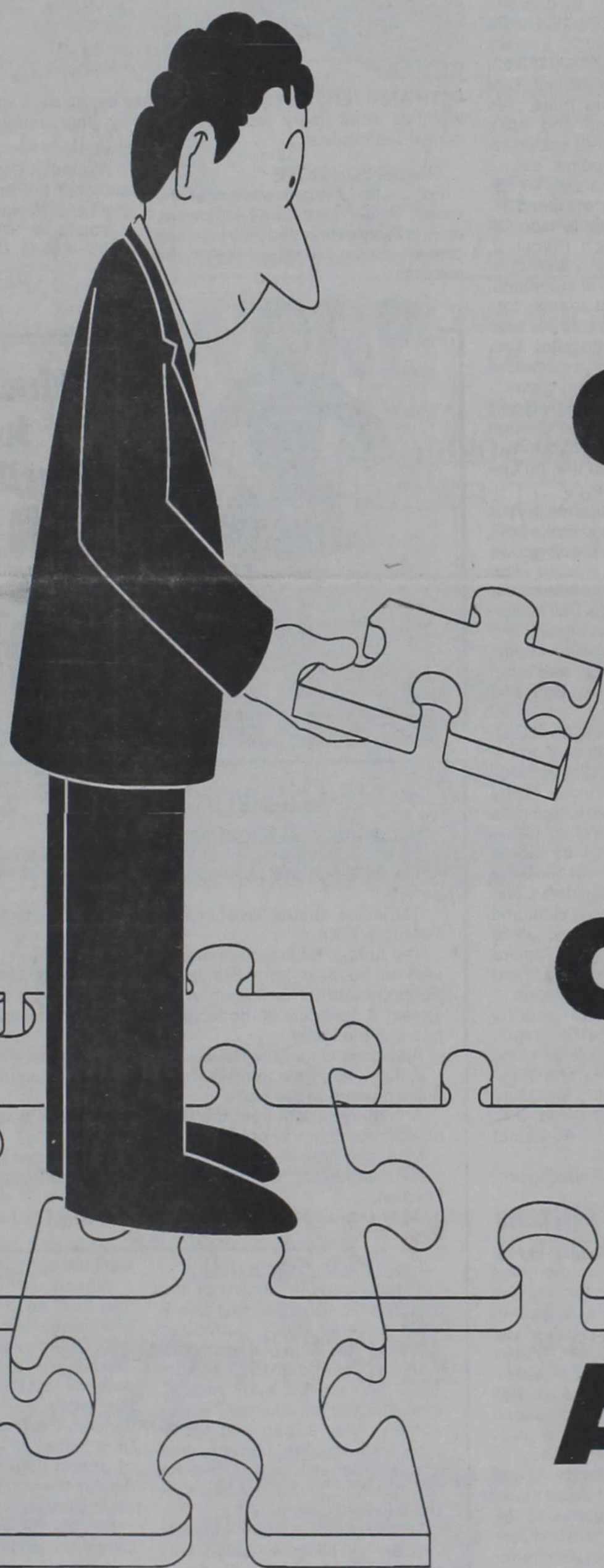
Dorothy Risner came by for a short visit last week. She couldn't stay long because she had to rush on to make somebody else happy with a Meal on Wheels.
