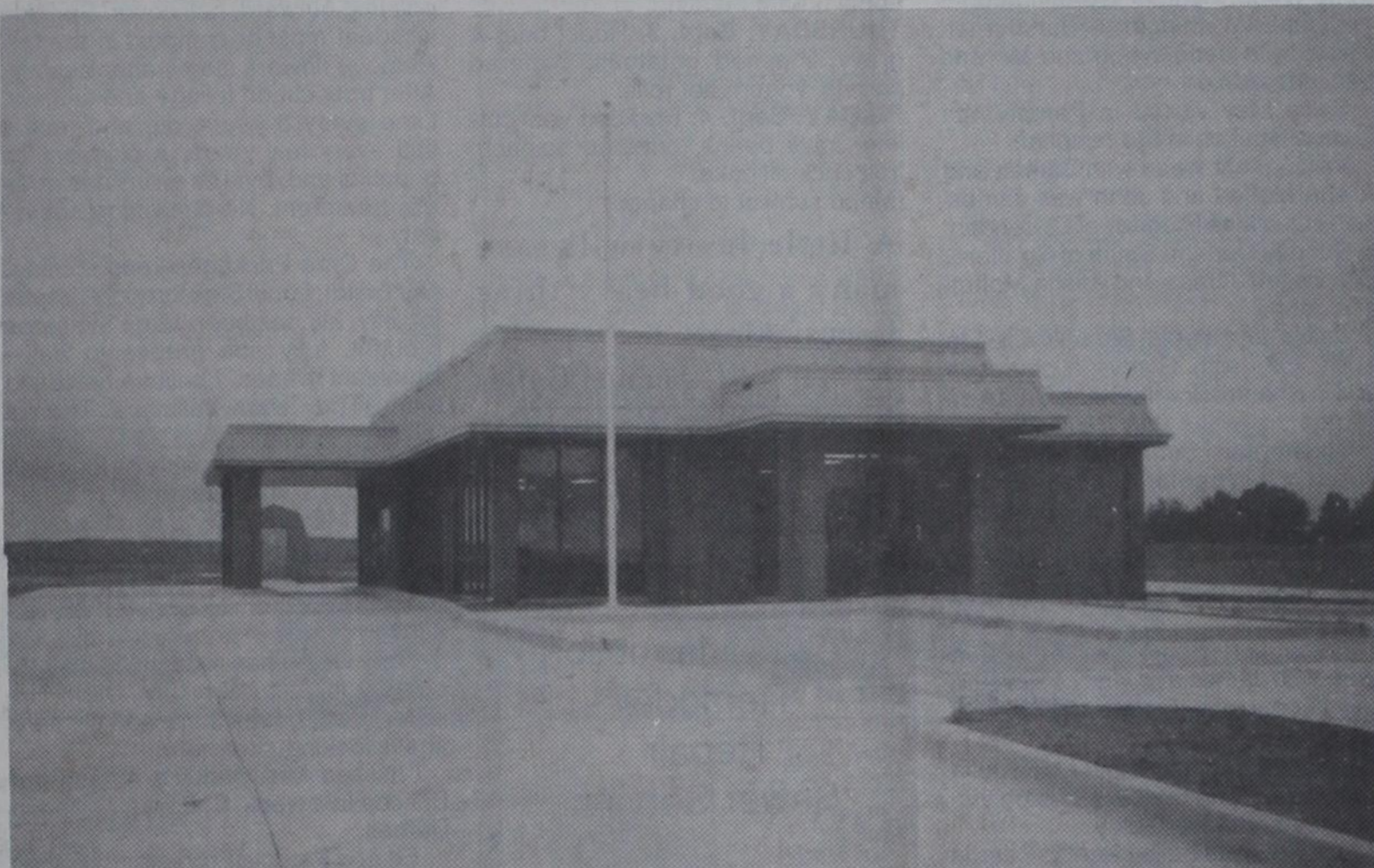

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital announced today that Bobby Blackburn will serve as coordinator for the Briscoe "Wheels For Life" Bike-A-Thon September 19, as the date of the Intersection of highways 83 & 1046 at 9:30 a.m. Contact Becky Blackburn 806-375-2209 for more information.

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, which was founded in 1962 by the late entertainer, Danny Thomas, is America's largest childhood cancer research, treatment and education center. The Memphis based hospital has a local impact because it freely provides area doctors and hospitals with assistance in diagnosis and the latest information for treatments and procedures.

The non-sectarian hospital currently follows over 4,500 active patients. Because treatment is provided to all patients regardless of their family's ability to pay, it costs St. Jude Hospital over \$215,000 per day to keep its doors open. These funds come primarily from Public donations.

This year's Bike-A-Thon is dedicated to Ryan Martin of Waxhaw, NC. Ryan was diagnosed in June 1986 with a Wilms' tumor on his left kidney. The kidney was removed and Ryan was given 6 months of chemotherapy at St. Jude. When he was 2 1/2, he developed a Wilms' tumor on his right kidney. Ryan again received chemotherapy and his doctor discovered during surgery that nothing remained of the tumor but scar tissue. Today, Ryan is cancer free and only has annual checkups.

A regular meeting of the Wheeler Independent School district was held in the Board Room at 6:30 PM with all members present except Mr. Osborne. Mr. Bill Morrison presided with the following as guests: Mrs. Mickey Porter, Mrs. Judy Woollard, Mrs. Mary Ford, Mr. Clayton Neal, Mrs. Becky Hardcastle, Mrs. Donna Walser, and Supt. Glyndol Holland.

1. Motion by Mr. Ford, seconded by Mr. Kuehler to approve the minutes of the previous meetings. Motion carried unanimously.

A hearing on the American with Disabilities Act was held. Dwain McMahan of the Panhandle Action Center for Independent Living Skills acted as a consultant and surveyed the facilities at Wheeler ISD which resulted in a list of suggestions to comply with the ADA.

The 1992-93 Budget Hearing was held.

2. Motion by Mr. Wills, seconded by Mr. Kuehler to approve the 1992-93 Budget as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

3. Motion by Mr. Ledbetter, seconded by Mr. Ford to approve the the July accounts as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

A proposal was given by Coach Read concerning coaches salaries. No action was taken.

7. Motion by Mr. Ledbetter, seconded by Mr. Kuehler to hire the Ag Mechanics class to do routine maintenance on school vehicles for an annual fee of \$500.00. Motion carried unanimously.

8. Motion by Mr. Gill, seconded by Mr. Ford to restrict \$20,000.00 of Debt Service balance for permanent Interest and Sinking fund for future debt service payments. Motion carried unanimously.

Here & There

Do you remember how lovely the iris were last spring? Today as I was leafing through some notes that I jot down when the subject interests me, I found some lines on "Iris". Maybe the "Prime Time" for resetting iris is past, but it's not too late. In fact my notes say that it can be done any time from July until March. So here are some things to remember; dig soil deep, add manure, lime, and bonemeal. Moisture thoroughly. Set rhizomes with tips pointing outward, half cover. Sprinkle with leaf mold or compost in the fall. Remove flowers stems after blooms. After frost cut off foliage and destroy. Lime every 3 years, dig and repeat this every few years. A blossom as beautiful and royal as an iris deserves this treatment. No cultivation necessary.

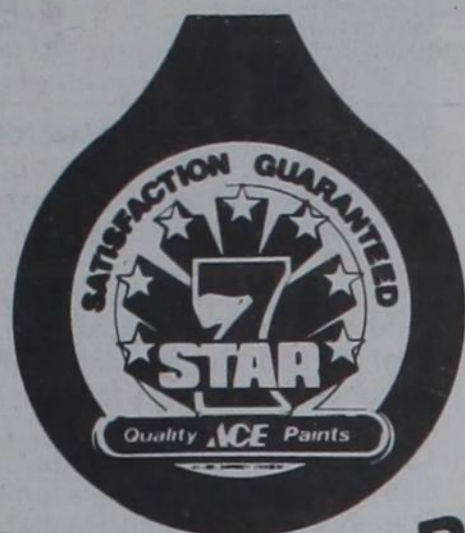

THREE WVFD MEMBERS ATTEND TEXAS FIREMEN'S SUMMER TRAINING SCHOOL

Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department members attending Texas Firemen's Training School, July 20-24 in College Station were Walter Simmons, Dell Ford and Russell Gaines.

Approximately 2,585 persons participated in fire prevention, control and safety classes from municipalities, industries and armed services, representing over 775 cities from approximately 25 states and numerous provinces and countries. In addition to a large number of Texas participants, there were representatives from as far away as Australia and Saudia Arabia.

Courses were conducted by some 450 qualified and experienced instructors and speakers made available by municipalities, industries, manufacturers, state and federal agencies, and the armed services. Training was accomplished through operational classes, student participation, class discussion and field exercises. Conference sessions were conducted at J. Rudder Conference Tower at Texas A&M University. Field exercises were held at Brayton Firemen Training Field in College Station.

Credit for attendance at the Annual Texas Firemen's Training School at Texas A&M University, sponsored by the State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association, is a 3, 4, or 5 percent Key Rate for eligible cities and towns, depending on the attendance in creditable courses.

Wheeler received a 5 percent Key Rate Credit as a result of the courses completed by WVFD participants: Russell Gaines completed 30 hours of Fire Fighting II, Dell Ford completed 30 hours in Fire Fighting II and Walter Simmons completed 30 hours in Fire Prevention III.

FIREMEN INSTRUCT AT AGRO-RESCUE SCHOOL

Four Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department members served as instructors at the Ninth Annual Floydada Agro-Rescue School, August 15, 1992.

Gary Davis, Ken Daughtry and K.D. Ford were instructors for Combine Rescue classes in which some 60 participants learned how to extricate victims from combine accidents. Walter Simmons served as an instructor for the Rappelling II class. This class taught participants how to rescue victims from tall structures.

Floydada's Agro-rescue school is sponsored by the Floydada Fire Department, State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association of Texas and the Panhandle Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association. Fire Protection Training Classes included Rappelling I, II, III, Grain rescue, Pesticide Challenge, Electrical Safety and Rescue classes for Combines, Cotton Strippers, Hay Balers, Tractors and Equipment and Heavy Equipment and Corn Headers.

Some 250 attended the Agro-Rescue School, including persons from the fire service, emergency medical personnel and industrial safety personnel. Approximately 80 instructors, from throughout Texas, conducted the classes.

You don't have to be a seminary graduate to read. Read it. Believe what you read, and enjoy the blessings in life that God has for you. When you learn the truth about the 2 kinds of suffering, you can rejoice when you suffer shame for His name's sake, and also rejoice that Satan can't bind your life with things Christ took away from our lives through His sacrificial death.

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NOTICE OF COMPARIBLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes the tax rate for last year provides \$4,727.00 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute that same rate now provides \$4,961.00 per student in state and local revenue.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.82/\$100 for County Education Districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the Wheeler Independent School District hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of \$.30/\$100 that will provide \$4,939.54 per student in state and local revenue.

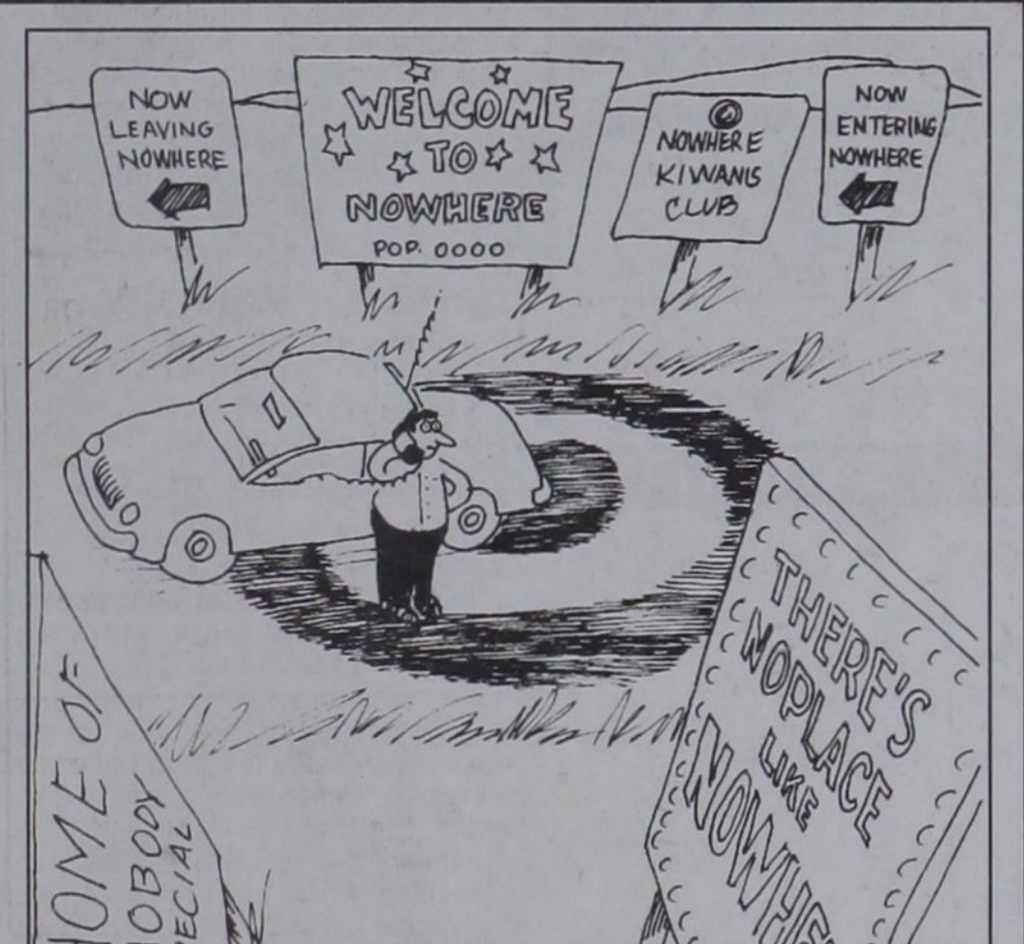

Driving Safety

Bells will be ringing shortly, as thousands of Texas children return from summer break. This means making adjustments in their routines. It's also time for Texas motorists to make some adjustments in their driving habits. The first few weeks of school are the most dangerous, according to Major Vernon Cawthon, Regional Commander for the Texas Department of Public Safety. "This time of year presents safety problems for both the school children and the drivers," Major Cawthon explained. "Many kids are attending school for the first time and others might be going to a different school where they are unfamiliar with the local traffic conditions."

Another problem is that during the summer recess many drivers have gotten out of the habit of being alert for both school zones and school buses. Drivers must remember that children have many things on their minds as they go to and from school. They are also easily distracted from important things like remembering to watch for traffic. This is an ideal time for parents to remind their children about school bus safety rules, since many school bus accident victims are struck by vehicles while waiting for the bus. Major Cawthon gave several safety tips concerning this, children should be reminded to:

- Line up away from the road and wait for the approaching bus to come to a stop before entering the roadway to board.
- Avoid pushing and shoving.
- Use the grab handle when boarding and move directly to a seat. While the bus is in motion, children should:
- Avoid horseplay.
- Refrain from shouting or making loud noises that could distract the driver.
- Remain seated for the entire trip, even when the bus is approaching its destination.

Upon arrival at the bus's destination, children should:

- Exit the bus in a quiet and orderly manner.
- Walk to where the driver can see them if they must cross the street, and wait until the driver signals them before attempting to cross.
- Remember that although it is against the law for vehicle to pass a school bus that is loading or unloading passengers, some drivers still do. Students should always check both ways on any street before crossing.

By observing the speed limits in school zones, being alert for increased pedestrian traffic, and watching for school bus activities, we can make this a safe school year for all.

From The Minister's Desk:

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus describes His disciples by saying: "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do men light a lamp, and put it under the peck-measure, but on the lampstand; and it gives light to all who are in the house." (Matthew 5:14-15)

This description contains two sentences which emphasize two important truths about disciples of Jesus. These two sentences are:—

1. "You are the light of the world." Notice that Jesus did not say: "You should be—." Rather He said: "You are—." The verb "are" is the simple present which suggests the relevance of disciples of Jesus.

Notice also that Jesus includes every one of His disciples when He said: "You are the light of the world." He includes those disciples whose hair is white with age and experience. He includes those disciples whose children are grown or almost grown. He includes those disciples who are raising children. Every disciple of Jesus is "—the light of the

world."

2. "—It gives light to all who are in the house." With this sentence, Jesus emphasized an important function that His disciples have. What a light is to a darkened room, disciples of Jesus are to a darkened world.

Perhaps this function can best be illustrated by an incident that once occurred in a large metropolitan city. This incident involved more than 60,000 people who had assembled in an large outdoor stadium for a worship service. Without warning, the lights of the stadium suddenly went out, engulfing the entire stadium in darkness. Then, over the public address system, the voice of the speaker said: "Please stay calm. I am going to light a match."

The audience soon saw the faint gleam of a tiny yellow flame. Again the speaker spoke: "Now will each of you please light a match." Before long the entire stadium was aglow with light from the glistening flames of thousands of matches.

Jesus describes His disciples by saying: "You are the light of the world." As "—the light of the world—" their light will help those people who are in darkness find the light of God's love.
