

Church of Christ To Have Weekend Family Seminar



Mrs. Renfro, born in Missouri, moved to Texas in 1906. She married Neal Renfro in 1939 at Yuma, Ariz. He died in 1976. She was a lifetime rancher. She was a member of the Assembly of God Church in Briscoe, the Briscoe Home Demonstration Club and Order of the Eastern Star. She was named homemaker of the year in 1991 by the Hemphill County Soil Conservation Service.

The word tragedy comes from the Greek word tragos meaning "goat.




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COUNTY FARMERS EROSION

in the worst condition for wind erosion However a farmer must do all that is damage in many years. Due to extremely dry conditions, a lot of wheat farmers have their land prepared for wheat but has yet to be planted until we get a rain. What wheat has been planted has a poor stand. This has caused a lot of bare fields subject to wind erosion.

This creates a problem with the Food and Security Act of 1985 plans. A farmer must have a FSA plan and be actively applying it each year, to be eligible to receive government payments.

These FSA plans have a practice called Surface Roughening set up to be done when lack of cover is present to control wind erosion. This is the case on many of our wheat fields. We have already observed some wind erosion damage. It is hard to make the Holds Training Meeting decision as to when to apply this practice. Everyone is hoping for a rain so that, they would be able to plant their wheat. However if you are spot checked or turned in by someone and your field is blowing and you have not tried to stop it from blowing, you would be

Wheeler County wheat farmers are nature and we can not control this. possible to control wind erosion. This may mean destroying a potential wheat crop. Our deep sands are hard to control with surface roughening. Listing is probably the most effective. This dry weather will also effect over-seeding wheat in cotton.

We are mandated to spot-check at least 5% of the farms in Wheeler County or any that has had a whistle blower on
