

Producers Warned Of FmHA 1995 Deadline

Producers who are participating in the government programs will need to have a plan developed on everything which is leased, owned or operated by the producer. This also applies to FmHA borrowers who are actively engaging in farming. Producers will need to have started on all of their schedule practices. All schedule practices must be completed by December 31, 1994. There are producers who are doing their very best to have all of their schedule practices in before 1995. But their are some producers who will wait until the last day to do anything. If the producer refused to comply with the Food Security of 1985 he or she could lose all government payments and government loans.

These are list of practices that are scheduled to go in 1993. For example: Terraces System, Diversion Terraces, Waterways, Critical Area Planting, and Pasture Planning. Many of the producers, who are scheduled to do one or more of these practices were fully informed. Your local Soil Conservation Service urge all producers to put in those needed practices to remain in compliance throughout the 1990's.

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IS THERE A DIFFERENCE **BETWEEN JENNIFER AND GENNIFER?**

After the Super Bowl last January 26, Gov. Bill Clinton and his wife appeared on a CBS "60 Minutes" program. At that time, Mr. Clinton was one of several Democratic candidates for President. Perhaps it is just my opinion, but it appears to me that he was questioned a little more vigorously before sewing up the nomination than he is nowadays. He was endeavoring to put the issue behind him about his alleged affair with Gennifer

Recently, the New York Post ran a story about an allegation that George Bush had a sexual relationship with a former aide, Jennifer Fitzgerald. Mr. Bush was Vice-President at the time of the supposed episode. The rumor about President Bush centers around a suspicion of a man named Louis Fields, an ambassador to the nuclear disarmament talks held in Geneva in 1984. He is dead now and therefore cannot give any answers to questions. He is said to have suspected that Bush and Fitzgerald were "romantically involved". He is supposed to have said that he had arranged for Bush and Fitzgerald to use "adjoining bedrooms" at a guest house in Geneva. This whole story involves quite a bit of assumption and speculation. What I find to be very interesting is that Mr. Clinton was quick to deny taking any pleasure in the story about Mr. Bush. That is certainly a clear implication that "Bush's Jennifer cancels Clinton's Gennifer". Therefore, the character issue is of no consequence.

The problem, as I see it, is that Mr. Bush categorically denies the whole story about him while Mr. Clinton quite clearly let it be known in the "60 Minutes" interview that he had been unfaithful to his wife. The reporter for the program said to Mr. Clinton, "You've been saying all week that you've got to put this issue behind you. Are you prepared to say that you've never had an extramarital affair?' He wasn't and didn't Why not? Could it be due to the fact that he has been unfaithful? He says that he did not have a sexual relationship with Gennifer Flowers, but when the reporter insisted on into the interview that he wasn't denying that he had ever had an extramarital affair, Mr. Clinton said, "Of course, it's not (a denial)."

In summary, Bill Clinton told the national television audience that he did not have an affair with Flowers, but he virtually acknowledged that he had had an extramarital affair with someone else. Since Flowers has tapes of conversations they had, discussing their relationship, I don't see that he improved his image by admitting to another affair. Bill Clinton believes that character doesn't matter in the leader of the country. I guess we'll find out in November if the American people agree with him.



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



Helping Youth Improve Their Knowledge

Knowledge could be one of the most valuable resources a youth can develop. It takes knowledge for almost everything we do. The more knowledge youth have, the more things they can do. The more a person learns about something, the better he or she will be able to do it.

To help children learn the power of knowledge in resourceful living, ask them to tell you five things they know how to do today that they did not know how to do one year ago. Ask them to share how their life would be different if they had not learned how to do these things.

Allow children time and opportunities to learn about things they want to learn. The school year is a time when their learning is directed almost daily. Ask them what they would like most to learn to do during the weekend or school breaks. Guide them to practical sources for learning, sources that do not have to cost a lot of money. A few examples are the local library, the county Extension office, people you know who have the knowledge and would share a little time with them to mentor their development, or people your children know who could teach

Help them to develop the feeling that learning can be fun and is within their reach. By setting their own goals for building their knowledge resource and seeking manageable ways to do this, children develop competence and motivation for continuing this impor-

The second quarter failed to produce any scoring action as both defenses tightened. The Mustang highlight was a 40 yard punt with a 15 yard roll by Bradley after a bobbled snap.

The Stangs kicked off to Wellington to open the second half. After a Francis kick off rolled through the end zone, Wellington took possession on the 20 yard line but promptly turned the ball over as Darby Dorman recovered a Rocket fumble. Three plays later, Francis fumbled for a 13 yard TD. Once again, the PAT was no good. With 8:07 left in the third period, Wheeler led their guests from Collingsworth county 18 to 0. Turnovers continued to plaque the Rockets as two plays after the kick-off defensive end Kris Rarden intercepted a tipped pass and outraced the Wellington quarterback to the end zone for a 51 yard score. The PAT was again stopped. With just over six minutes remaining, the JV Stangs held a commanding 24 to 0 lead.

Late in the fourth quarter it looked as though Wheeler would record a whitewashing of the Skyrockets; however, that old nemesis the long pass was utilized. The scoring throw by Wellington covered 70 yards. The PAT failed but Wheeler lead was cut to 24 to 6. With under five minutes to play, Hefley recovered the obvious onside kick attempt. The Mustang offense began their final drive intending to run out the clock, but Francis found a seam in the Rocket defense on a quick pitch and covered 38 yards for his third score of the night. The 'Stangs could do nothing after the ensuing kickoff and punted after three plays. Spearman then went on


another drive. The Lynx pushed the ball deep into Mustang territory before

for the Ponies.




