For the grasshopper and cutworm, fore they wing and start flying." Goule recommends:

25 pounds course wheat bran 1 pound paris green or white ar-

3 lemons ground through food chopper

2 quarts sorghum syrup Add enough water to make moist mixture. Mix the poison together thoroughly. Mix the molasses and lemons in about two gallons of water and pour over the poison bran. Stir this mixture until every particle is moist; a little more water may be added if necessary. For the cutworms this poison should be put out in small pills at the base of each departments. Mrs. J. L. Gilmore and plant or spread thin along the row late in the afternoon. For the grasshopper put the poison out late in afternoon or early morning along fence rows and places of festation. The Raney and Miss Helen Flynt. poison bran should be scattered very thin over the ground. County Agent Gives Extension Service **Local Situation**

Repert sistant to Jake Tarter, county agent, was here in the early part of April to

"From all indications the infestation of grasshoppers will be the greatest of any year in the past,' Tarter stated. "They are appearing baits very successful in controlling in millions at the present, and the proper time to get the hoppers is be-

Only a portion of the eggs are hatching now, it is reported. This fact indicates that there will be hoppers throughout the year, the county agent states.

Tarter advises the planting of traps around fields, especially those that join pasture lands. Two or three rows of cane or sudan are reccommended for the planting, and then the hoppers can be poisoned as they cross

the trap. There is a possibility of getting poison furnished by the government, Tarter stated, as the appropriation has been made. Farmers from all parts of the county are urged to attend the meeting so that officials may know the seriousness of the grasshopper problem here. A bid will be put in at this time for poison to be used in this county.

W. O. Puett, county judge, has volunteered to distribute the grasshopper poison to the various rural localities, G. O. McCrohan of the Wheeler Cotton Oil Co. has offered use of his truck for the work.

Collection Of **Delinquent Taxes Is** Studied by Court

At the regular second meeting of the month of the Wheeler county commissioner's court Monday the main topic of discussion was the delinquent taxes in this county, according to W. O. Puett, county judge.

Members of the court discussed starting a campaign for the collection of the delinquent taxes. No definite plans were made at this time, but it is expected to begin a concert-

ed effort at an early date. The program will probably be affected by the new law recently passed whereby taxes may be paid in installments.

The oil and gas schedule will likely be completed by the next meeting of the commissioners court on June 7, according to Puett.

The delinquent taxes in this county from 1919 to 1935 inclusive are as follows: state, \$36,954.03; state poll tax, \$41,021.84; county ad valorem, \$70,403.86; road, \$4,262.00; county poll taxes \$692.18, and common school, \$18,665.30, making a grand total of \$135,099.21.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

Section 1. That Article III, Section 52, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as Section 52d, which shall read as

"Section 52d: Upon the vote of majority of the resident qualified elec-tors owning rendered taxable property therein so authorizing, a county or road district may collect an annual tax for a period not exceeding five (5) years to create a fund for con-structing lasting and permanent roads and bridges or both. No contract involving the expenditure of any of such fund shall be valid unless, when it is made, money shall be on hand in such fund.

"At such election, the Commission-ers' Court shall submit for adoption of special tax to be levied; the number of years said tax is to be levied; the location, description, and character of the roads and bridges; and the estimated cost thereof. The funds raised by such taxes shall not be used for purposes other than those specified in the plan submitted to the voters. Elections may be held from time to time to extend or discontinue said plan or to increase or diminish said tax. The Legislature shall enact laws prescribing the procedure here-

"The provision of this section shall aply only to Harris County and road

districts therein. Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State on the fourth Monday in August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution providing that Harris County and any road district therein may upon a vote of the people therein adopt a road plan and levy taxes for road and bridge construction in lieu of the issuance of bonds"; those voters oposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution providing that Harris County and any road disthat Harris County and any road dis-trict therein may upon a vote of the people therein adopt a road plan and levy taxes for road and bridge con-struction in lieu of the issuance of
