

**Hopper Poison Being Given Out Here** With 50,000 pounds of mixed grass-

hopper poison distributed over the entire county by noon Thursday, A. B. Zorns, assistant to the county agent, said there would be about 30,000 pounds more of the mixture to be spread over county farms.

By Tuesday evening, on the first day the bran arrived, approximately 9,000 pounds of poison had been given out in Wheeler, while 10,400 pounds had been distributed at Shamrock, and 4,700 at Mobeetie, according to Zorns.

The poison is being mixed and distributed in the Ernest Lee building, next to Ernest Lee hardware in Wheeler, and Lee is giving the building to the farmers until the work has been finished.

Zorns said that farmers should get their poison as soon as possible since the supply is limited, and it should be used while there is time to make headway against the hoppers.

Beginning Thursday, many farmers were using banana oil, after the supply of molasses had been depleted. Everything required in the mixture was donated by the government except molasses or banana oil, onions, cottonseed hulls which have been Girl Aims, Attains cottonseed hulls which have been purchased and are paid for by the farmers, and lemons.
