



#### **Good Progress Made** on Magic City Road

With three and a half miles of the nine-mile Magic City road project completed, officials directing the work declare operations are running 20 per cent ahead schedule and making good progress. The strip of road under improvement extends northward from Highway 66 toward Magic City. Predictions are the project will be completed around the first of August if the present rate of progress continues.

When completed, it will be an allweather road. Grading and drainage was done last year and now gravel is being applied.

Vernon N. Shortt is the construction engineer under whose direction the rapid pace has been maintained There are 135 men on the WPA rolls now employed on the job, which started last month.

Cost of the work is reported as \$25,288 for the entire project. Of this sum the county is furnishing \$9,-208 and the federal government \$16,-

# Tall Wheat Prospects for good small grain



Christianity is a religion of contact with both God and man expressed, not in word only, but also in service. The words serve only as guides to full and final contact through service.

It was a sad day for Christianity when man began to think that it was fully expressed in words only. Have you not noticed that Christ is called the word (John 1:1; Rev. 19:13)? Because the Word of God cannot be separated from the Person, Christ. Christ not only spake, but He gave us an example of the "living word" (Heb. 4:12).

Brother or sister, if your religion can be fully expressed in words only, then you lack some very vital quality of having the Christ religion. Do you affirm thus and so of your religion? Well, let's see you act it also.

Despite the fact prohibition came to an end in this State more than three years ago, liquor inspectors, in the past 15 months, have seized and destroyed nearly 1,000 illegal stills, more than 6,000 gallons of contraband whiskey and over 235,000 gallons of mash

The liquor and mash represented a potential tax evasion of more than \$3,500,000.

Thousands of gallons of home-brewed beer, on which no accurate record is kept, also have been found and destroyed.

The Texas Liquor Control Board has two still squads which, with federal alcohol tax unit men and local officers, are kept on the run raiding moonshiners' lairs, which are found in about equal numbers in dry and wet territories.

With legally manufactured liquor and beer available over a large area in the State, many persist in drinking the rank bootleg variety which often is produced in an unbelievably filthy manner

But, liquor board authorities point out, many "with a thirst" can not afford even the cheapest of legal brands. And there are the profits of the illicit industry which still lure those hoping for quick riches despite the risk of imprisonment.

Officials report raiders seldom discover liquor-making equipment of the stationary variety. Practically all of it is portable and so built that it can be assembled and dismantled quickly. Often, they say, a ring of operators move a still from batch to batch of mash fermented at various locations.

Bootleg "hootch" prices are said to range from 15 cents up a pint.

Comparatively little "corn likker" is made illicitly, officials say, because rye and fruits ferment more rapidly, sometimes taking less than five days.

In one instance, an elaborate still was discovered in a large underground room with a trap door concealed near a tree. At another place a drum which had contained arsenic was being used and once a dead turtle, weighing 30 pounds, was found in putrid, fermenting mash.-Amarillo Daily News.

We call your special attention to paragraph five above, in which it states that:

ABOUT AN EQUAL NUMBER OF STILLS ARE FOUND IN DRY AND WET TERRITORY."

Paragraph three states that the confiscations present a potential tax evasion of THREE MIL-LION FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS, while paragraph four states that the THOUSANDS OF GALLONS OF HOME BREW WERE NOT taken into consideration.

Well informed persons state that the confiscations represent only ONE-TENTH of the actual production of moonshine whiskey in our state, and over half of this production is sold by "nice" liquor dealers, holding either a beer or whiskey license. If this information is correct, then our "nice" liquor folks, together with the bootlegger, have stolen from us THIRTY-FIVE MILLION DOL-LARS during the last fifteen months.

Does this explain why we have paid our old folks only a small pittance of the debt we owe them? (Exact figures showing percentage from liquor revenue applied on old-age pensions are not available here at this time).

It is alleged that practically all the licensed beer places in Wheeler county have handled beer which tested far above the legal limit, thus becoming bootleggers from a legal standpoint.

The excuse offered by the juries in the two revolting criminal cases in our recent District Court where light sentences were imposed, was that the perpetrators thereof were drunk at the time the crime was committed. And the undisputed testimony in one of the cases was that the

crime was committed after visits to certain licensed beer places. The details in one of these cases are so revolting and obscene that we could be arrested for telling them to you through the mails.

As a voter you should investigate such affairs and find out just what terrible things a man can do and go practically unpunished when he has drank too much high test beer.

Doesn't this resolve itself back to the age-old contention that the liquor traffic is at heart an outlaw, and any good citizen who allows himself or herself to become entangled in this business WILL SOONER OR LATER, FOR THE SAKE OF ADDITIONAL GAIN, violate those laws which as citizens they should respect?

Were it not for the millions of dollars now being spent by the liquor interests for national advertising, this THIRTY-FIVE MILLION DOL-LAR THEFT from our state would have been front page news, instead of occupying the inconspicuous place it occupied in our papers. A Panhandle newspaper man recently made the statement: "WE ARE PAID FOR WHAT WE DO NOT PRINT, not for what we print." To secure this large volume of whiskey and beer advertising, our newspapers and magazines must omit or soft pedal the part this merchandise is playing in our daily crime picture.

During the "recession" we can hardly ask our newspaper friends to kill the goose which lays such nice large golden eggs, but it is certainly time that we as citizens should ask ourselves what we are going to do about it.

We have given beer an honest trial in Wheeler County. TWENTY of TWENTY-SIX Panhandle counties have rejected beer; let us take our place with the twenty. If such towns as McLean, Wellington, Childress, Quanah, Canyon and Plainview can get along without the so-called beer revenue, can't we do it? Think the matter over seriously, and do your duty as a citizen.
