Bearrow Arraigned; **Pleads Not Guilty**

Trial Date for Young Shamrock Man, Charged with Murder, Set for Dec. 13

When district court opened Monday morning, Eugene (Stubby) Bearrow of Shamrock was arraigned before Judge W. R. Ewing and entered a plea of not guilty to the charge of murder returned against him in a grand jury indictment last Wednesday. The charge resulted from investigations made by the grand jury into the death of Wilburn Nixson, young Dozier community farmer, whose battered body was found on the highway east of Shamrock early Sunday morning, Nov. 21.

The court set Monday, Dec. 13, as the trial date of Bearrow, who is confined in the county jail here. Judge Ewing instructed Holt Green, court clerk, to draw a special venire of 140 names from the current petit jury list. From this venire it is expected a trial jury can be secured.





and has been in use only two years Besides being a school for the children, the buildings are also used as a community center for adults. They are to be seen in the library, reading; in the laundry, using electric machines; in the kitchen, canning meat and vegetables, and in the shop, making various articles of wood and

Most of the teachers were white: however, the vocational teacher and several of the assistants were Indians

In connection with the school was a government owned and operated hospital. The doctor in charge and three of the nurses were white persons, the other employees were Indian men and women.

Both the hospital and school were well supplied with modern equip-ment, and the superintendent said that the Indians were delighted with the work the government is doing for

Supt. Blankinship expressed his appreciation of the good teaching he saw in the school and the wonderful spirit of co-operation that the In-dians showed toward their superintendent and other white officials
