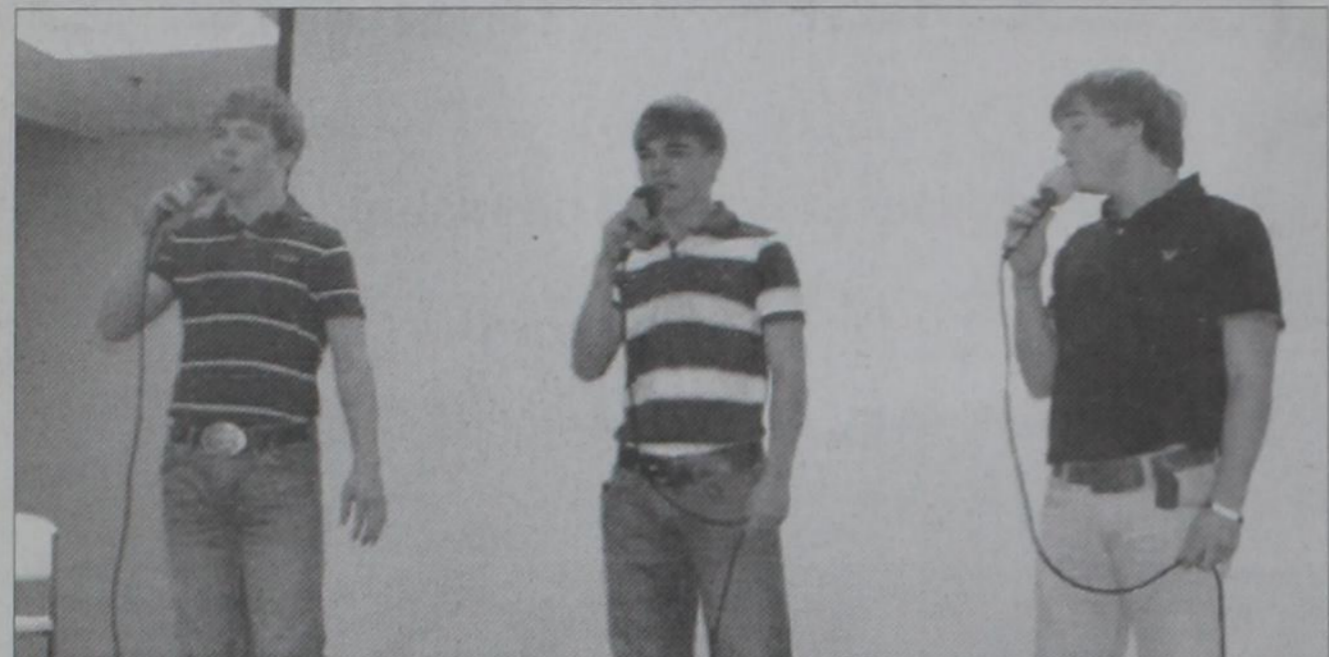
Sorry to hear that Ronnie Stuart of Lawton is still having so much trouble with migraines. They haven't found the magic combination for him yet.

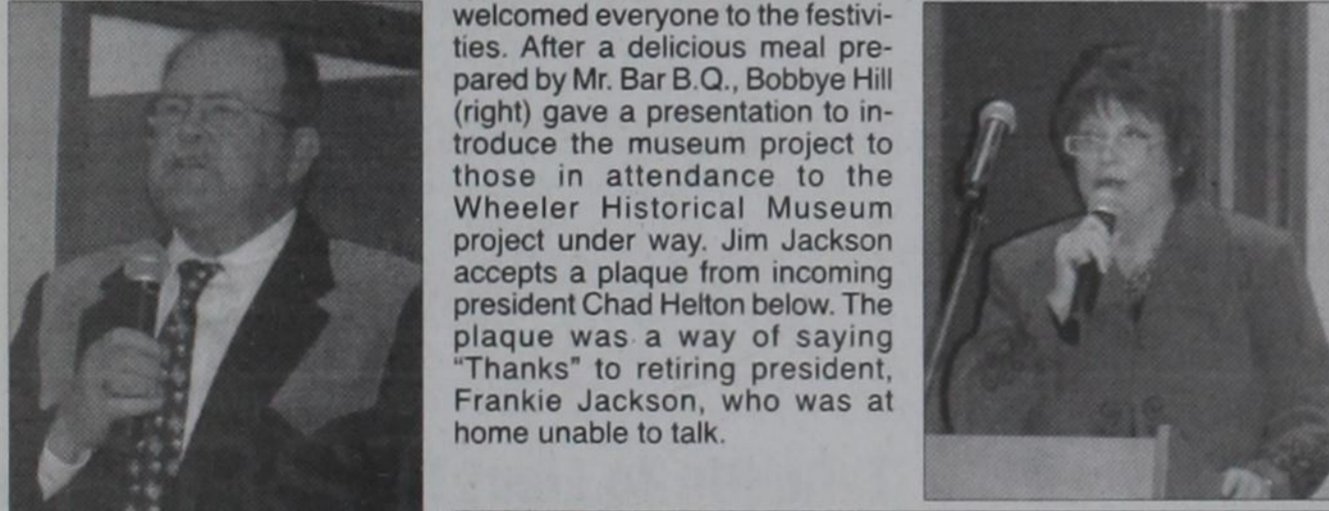

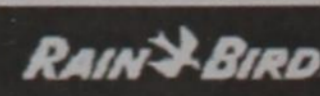

## POST-PILE HIDEOUTS, HOMEMADE CAVES AND SAND BABIES

Isn't it funny, how sometimes you can pass right by something sure-enough great, without even noticing it? That's the way it was with the post-pile.

Uncle Fat usually kept quite a few extra fence posts in stock, and if they were stood up, they sort of looked like a teepee. It occurred to us kids that by moving some of them to make a doorway, we could have our very own hideout. Right a first, there were a few

snakes, mice, frogs, spiders, and crickets, but they moved on out pretty quick when we moved in. Guess they couldn't stand all the giggling and hollering. It's pretty nice to have a post-pile to play in. You can pretend it's an Indian teepee, a club house, or an outlaw hideout.

After we got a little older, we spent less time in the post-pile, and more time digging. We decided what we needed was our own cave. I'd heard stories about people getting lost in caves and never seen again. That shouldn't be a problem for us, if we dug our own. We tried tunneling, but soon gave that up. Where we lived, it was so sandy it kept caving in. Fortunately, none of us got buried. We cured that problem by just digging a trench and covering it over with whatever we could find. This usually was just tree limbs or some of Uncle Fat's posts. Then we'd put small brush and weeds over the limbs and posts. In the summer, it was always nice and cool; a great place to get out of the heat and out of sight.

The same snakes, mice, frogs, spiders, and crickets that we'd run out of the post-pile, seemed to like our cave/trench, as much as we did. Every time we went in, they would be back, plus a few more.

While we were doing all that digging, we ran on to some "sand babies." These are insects that not many people ever see, unless they are in the habit of digging in the sand a lot. Sand babies, are usually found from about a foot down in the sand to as much as three feet. I don't think they ever come to the surface. They are almost colorless, have a big, round, bald head, with big powerful jaws, and a stout looking body. I guess digging every day for your living would sure build up your muscles. I think all they eat are roots, and what water they need comes from the roots as well.

Sometimes, we referred to them as "sand crickets." I think their correct name is "Child of the Earth." I even found it in a dictionary one time. No doubt, they are really interesting to look at. They're also a little ill-tempered when you dig them out. One bit my finger hard enough to make it bleed. It probably felt a sense of revenge had been dealt...

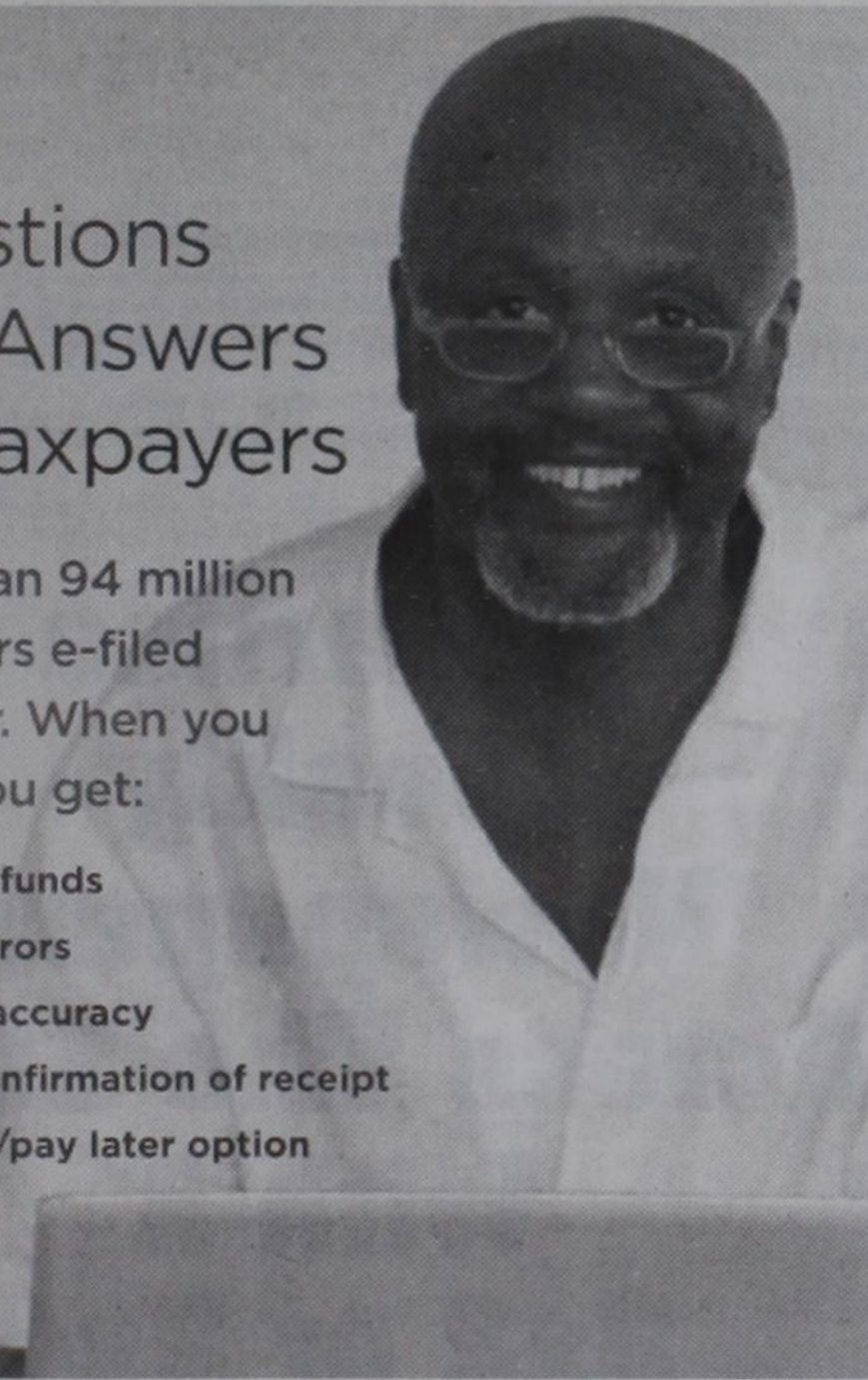

The award for Farmer/Rancher went to Fat Childress. He was born in Briscoe, TX in 1930 to Lloyd and Clara Childress and was raised with 3 brothers and 4 sisters. L.D. better known as "Fat" Childress and Wanda Swift married in 1949. L.D. and Wanda has resided in Briscoe their entire married life, and raised 1 son and 3 daughters.

L.D. owned his own hay baling business for several years before he and Kenneth Douthit partnered in feeding out steers. Later he leased what is known as Kemp "Camp" County and started a cow calf operation. In the early 70's he purchased 2 sections of the Kemp County School Land. Still operating a cow calf operation and farming, he also owned a trucking company hauling grain, lumber and cattle, and was a partner in Briscoe Grain Co.

L.D. was a director of the First State Bank of Mobeetie for many years and also a member of the Briscoe School Board.

L.D. retired 2 years ago leaving his land to his daughters and spouses, but still can be found in the hay field loading hay trailers. Although their girls don't always do things like he would have done it, he still checks to make sure things are in order and hands out advice.

L.D. and Wanda's children are Cathy and Melvin Hunt, Kay and Scott Luttrell, Jane and Clyde Dukes, and daughter-in-law Pat Childress, 9 grandchildren, 21 great-grandchildren most of all who reside in Wheeler Co.

**Pioneer Award**  
Wanda Herd graduated from Wheeler High School in the 1950's and later attended Draughtons Business College in Amarillo. She then married her high school sweetheart and traveled extensively as her husband helped defend our country. After the children were born, she resided mostly in San Angelo, Texas, where she was the editor of the Sheep and Goat Raisers Magazine for many years. Not only did she work, but was the primary caregiver of the children, because her husband was away on assignment much of the time.

Her daughter said, "Mother got up early every morning, early to walk for miles and miles. My family always ate dinner at home and also breakfast was on the table every morning. She made all of my clothes and worked extra jobs to put me through college. She has always loved unconditionally and taught her children the meaning of joy and laughter."

Later, after retiring from the military, she and Maxey opened Maxey's Steakhouse in Wheeler, where she continues to serve others.

In 1986, she became the Mayor of Wheeler. Under her guidance, the city has accomplished many things: Namely: \$75,000.00 grant for a sewer lift station located on N. Canadian Street; \$50,000.00 grant for a wood chipper; \$250,000.00 grant for 2 new water wells; \$50,000.00 grants from Texas Parks and Wildlife to revitalize our city park.

She is now taking us a step forward into the future. We are going "Green". The city has recently received a grant to purchase a cardboard baler, scales, and skid loader to enable the city to recycle the cardboard.

Wanda has accomplished many things. She has served on many boards both at local, regional, and state levels. She has

It was also during her tenure as Mayor that the City of Wheeler received the highest award a city can receive from the Texas Municipal League the "Municipal of Excellence" award.

**Contribution to Agriculture**  
The 2009 award for Contribution to Agriculture went to the Britt Ranch—and the entire Britt Family. They are life-long residents of Wheeler County. Their family's ranch was established in the early 1900's and has been a working cattle ranch since. The ranch is one of the largest contiguous ranches in Wheeler County. Through the years, the ranch has practiced conservative grazing and stocking rates to protect the land and maintain good forage quality and ground cover regardless of the available moisture. Hay cut from the sub-irrigated meadows on the ranch has helped to provide winter forage and lower grazing pressure on the pastures.

Wildlife abundant on the ranch, and hunters from around the country have come to Wheeler to harvest the abundant supply of deer, quail and turkey found there. Wildlife conservation is important to maintain the high wildlife populations found on the ranch to ensure that hunting there will continue to be some of the best in the country.

While the recipients' contributions to Agriculture have been impressive, their contributions to the community are amazing. Our recipients are staunch supporters of the Wheeler schools. They support every project that goes on at the Wheeler ISD. From buying animals at the livestock show to furnishing lights for the stage in the auditorium, and everything in between, our recipients have supported Wheeler's Youth, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts have benefited from their generosity. After gaining experience, troopers can compete for a variety of assignments including criminal investigative agents involved in organized criminal investigations, intelligence and counter terrorism, protective services; and Texas Rangers.

While attending the advance school, officers will earn \$2,982.25 per month. Upon graduation, they will receive \$3,258.08 per month, and that salary increases to \$3,935.08 per month after one year with DPS. Troopers, who speak Spanish, have college degrees and higher law enforcement certifications beyond basic are eligible for additional incentive pay.
