#### Further Improvement Seen on Highway 152

State Highway 152, which starts at the Oklahoma line east of Wheeler and ends at Dumas, passing through Pampa, Borger and Stinnett, will be "out of the mud" at the close of the 1940 Texas highway building program, Judge Norman Coffee of Hutchinson county announced at the joint luncheon of the Pampa Chambers of Commerce yesterday noon, states Wednesday's issue of the Pampa Daily News.

Judge Coffee presented a message from Judge Noel McDade of Dumas, who was unable to be present, that the 30-mile stretch between Stinnett and Dumas had been placed on the 1940 program for both grade and drainage structure and topping and that contracts would probably a convenient elevated spot, beginning be let during May or June of 1939. The 1940 program begins in July of

Word that the program had been advanced was revealed in a letter from Julian Montgomery of Austin, state highway engineer.

The highway was formerly known as Oil Field Highway 41 and was started in 1927 by the late F. P. Reid and friends along the route. An unpaved stretch between the Wheeler county line and a point 12 miles east of Pampa was completed last summer. The stretch between the Carson county line and Borger is under construction now.

A short distance east of Wheeler to the Oklahoma line is unpaved but it will be completed under the pro-

County Producers Favor Continuing Quota Plan, 921 to 99, in **Election Saturday** 

Balloting at 11 polling places Saturday, Wheeler county cotton producers scored another heavy majority in favor of a cotton marketing quota to govern the 1939 crop. This information was obtained from the county agent's office here.

In a total of 1,025 votes cast the following division is found: 921 for the plan, 99 against, 1 challenged 4 mutilated. Tabulations by

Thus, producers of the county, along with the remainder of the cotton-South, have approved the marketing quota to apply on the coming year's crop This is the second ballot on the question this year, the other being on March 8 for the 1938 crop. With the quota fixed sooner this time a much earlier election was

Last year's vote in the county stood 1,003 for the plan to 81 against, with three votes challenged and three mutilated.

On the same date as the cotton vote, last Saturday, a similar regionwide ballot was taken on rice and tobacco, both of which lost. Many classed anything the tournament had ed in opposition majorities to the cotton quota, but as a whole it carried by a good margin.






