inty-Wide Beer **Election Ordered**

County Commissioners Set July 31 as Date for Referendum to Legalize Sale of 4%

Upon presentation to them Monday, by advocates of the "wet" side of the question, of a petition bearing a liberal margin of names above the legal requirements, the Wheeler county commissioners court ordered a county-wide beer referendum which asks legalized sale of 4 per cent beer. The court fixed Thursday, July 31, as the date for this election.

Slightly more than 400 names are said to have been on the petition. Widely Known County On the basis of 10 per cent of the total number of votes cast in Wheeler county for governor in the last general election, a minimum of 316 petition.

Therefore, under the law, when a petition meeting the requirements is presented, the commissioners court no alternative but to call an election.

Lake Projects May **Resume Activities**

Panhandle Water Authority Report Indicates this County Has Chance to Get Lake

An announcement released by the Panhandle Water Conservation authority at a meeting last week in Amarillo indicating "there is strong possibility of securing one or more for Benefit of USO lakes in the Pannancie revives hopes of Wheeler county residents that such lakes in the Panhandle" revives hopes a project may be obtained here. One of the best lake sites in the eastern Panhandle, which has received favorable consideration by officials of the authority, is on Sweetwater creek, about three miles southeast of Mobeetie and eight miles northwest of

Wheeler. This location has been kept before those who select sites for the past three or four years and was inspected by Marvin Jones while he was congressman from this district; also Carl Hinton and others. It has been tentatively approved-but nothing accomplished so far.
