Another Milestone for Citizens Bank

Finishes Third of Century Service to Wheeler and Community on Monday, August 11

Regularly, as the swift seasons roll, the Citizens State Bank of Wheeler reaches another milestone and completes another year of service to its patrons and the community it so ably serves. The 33rd anniversary of its opening for business on August 11, 1908, was quietly observed on Monday of this week. The annual directors' meeting and election of officers was held that day, also.

Incidents connected with organization of the bank and the institution's early career have been chronicled upon anniversary occasions in recent years until only the repetition of pertinent facts remains.

It has been recounted how the late E. E. Holt of Wheeler was the institution's principal organizer and first president. It has also been mentioned that on the day before the new bank opened for business in temporary quarters at the old frame court house, D. E. Holt, nephew of the founder, arrived in Wheeler from Holt is now president of the bank and has associated with him two of his sons, Robert and Raymon.

CHARTER MEMBERS SCARCE

Speaking Monday of the changes occurring in the past 33 years, the senior Holt declared charter members of the institution are becoming very scarce. Only three, D. E. Holt, R. B. Holt and Clarence Lee, of the original 11 are holders of stock. One other charter member, J. W. Holt of Phoenix, Ariz., cousin of D. E. Holt and brother of Mrs. J. P. Green. Wheeler, survives but is no longer connected with the bank.

WHEELER FEELS BLIGHT OF WORLD WAR TRAGEDY

Wheeler's first-hand experience with World War II tragedies occurred early this week when a radio report stated that Capt. Hoyt R. Judy, Dallas aviator, had lost his life in a British flying accident. No details of the tragedy, which also claimed the lives of six other American flyers have been received here, other than meagre press dispatches supplementing the radio broadcast.

Capt. Judy, whose home town was Edmond, Okla., and Miss Texas Miller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Miller residing northeast of Wheeler, were married July 5, 1940. Dallas reports say the 23-year-old aviator and his wife left there May 15 for Montreal, Canada, where he joined the Royal Air Force to ferry bombers to Britain.

Judge Favors Call of Special Session

Explains How Legislative Neglect to Re-Enact Bond Assumption Law Burdens the County

Pointing out that Wheeler county taxpayers will have to raise an additional \$65,000 in the next two years if the state road bond assumption law or some similar measure is not passed by the state legislature, County Judge D. A. Hunt this week urged citizens to write Gov. Coke

If there is no called session of the during a call at this office Monday legislature, Wheeler county will have to raise the entire sum mentioned, of which about \$50,000 was paid by ersville will do the preaching in this the state under the bond assumption law out of the tax on gasoline.

Gov. Stevenson has indicated that he will not call an extra session unless he is reasonably sure some action will be taken. He has intimated that he will not call the session unless this action appears to be favorable toward the renewal of the appropriation, for otherwise the session would be of no value.

As the situation now stands, Wheeler countians will have to pay for the roads built in it-and, in addition, pay taxes on their gasoline just as other state citizens will pay. The gasoline tax money will not be returned to the county-as would be the case if the bond assumption law were re-enacted-but may be spent on roads elsewhere.

Judge Hunt explained that Wheeler county has a surplus in its road fund sufficient to meet the first payment on its share and, for that reason, he does not foresee an increase in the local rate for the coming year, but eventually it will have to be made up. It is immaterial whether the obligation is met from a surplus,





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
