## District Court Has Busy No-jury Week

Setting of Docket and Hearings Occupy Time—Grand Jury Returns 16 Bills

Opening its first week, non-jury, of the April term on Monday, district court has been reasonably busy, but with little transacted of a general news nature.

Setting the docket and hearing motions and minor matters has occupied the time. Judge W. R. Ewing of Pampa is presiding as usual. The judge has a slight infection in his right hand, but otherwise is in good health.

When court convened Monday morning a grand jury of 12 men was selected from the venire of 16, and Floyd Pennington appointed as foreman. After a lecture by Judge Ewing on the responsibilities confronting them, the jurors retired for investigation of complaints brought before them. Continuing its labors until Wednesday evening, when recess was taken until later in the term, the grand jury returned 16 bills of indictment, most of which are felony charges.

In view of the number of indictments returned, much larger than customary for a spring term of court, indications point to a rather busy seven weeks. For the same period of court last April, only two indictments (both against the same party) were reported.

Judge Ewing informed a Times reporter late this afternoon that he expected to be in Wheeler tomorrow for the consideration of any matters that may properly come before the court.

## Lions Club Approves City Paving Project

When the city paving project, recently agitated here, was introduced at Tuesday's Lions club luncheon by Mayor R. H. Forrester, brief discussion was followed by hearty approval of the undertaking and a committee to investigate its possibility was named by Lion President Harry Woford.

Club members composing the committee are C. G. Miller, R. D. Holt and H. M. Wiley, and these were directed to solicit the aid of two or three non-club members to form a representative committee which is authorized to make a thorough canvass of the situation.

Mayor Forrester explained that a price of \$1.25 per front foot on a 36-foot slab, together with curb and gutter along each side, has been quoted on residential paving. This figure is contingent upon availability of sand and gravel within reasonable hauling distance. An ample supply, it is said, can be found well under a 10-mile limit mentioned by an engineer who inspected the proposed project.

Other business considered by the club was the securing of suitable quarters in Wheeler for a mattress making plant under federal-state patronage and a grasshopper poison mixing station. A committee consisting of Jake Tarter, C. G. Miller and R. D. Holt was appointed to arrange for these facilities.

Judge Newton P. Willis of Pampa, a pioneer resident of Wheeler county, was an honored guest at the luncheon.

### BANK DEPOSITS OF COUNTY TOP MILLION AND HALF

That financial affairs of Wheeler county people, generally speaking, are in a healthy condition is seen in figures released this week by the four county banks. Money reported on deposit tops a million and a half dollars by a comfortable margin, the exact amount being \$1,577,540.70. By institutions, this money is deposited as follows:

## Draftees Should Plan for Rejection Future

State Director Warns Registrants to Arrange to Avoid Undue Personal Hardship

Texas Selective Service local boards were urged this week by General J. Watt Page, state director, to warn every registrant ordered to report for induction under the Selective Service system to arrange his affairs so as to prevent undue personal hardship in the event he is rejected later at the army induction station.

General Page said there are instances where men sent to induction stations by local boards are rejected on physical or other grounds by army examiners, and that state headquarters is extremely anxious that any injustices suffered by registrants in such cases be reduced to the minimum.

"Probably more often than not," the director said, "when a registrant is ordered to report for induction, he disposes of his automobile at a sacrifice since he has been instructed that he cannot take it with him. He either sells or gives away his civilian clothes and gives up his lodging accommodations."

"But, more serious is the possibility of inequity to rejected registrants centering on the fact that they have severed their employment connections when ordered to report for induction. When a registrant is notified by his local board to report for induction, he should point out to his employer the possibility that he will not be accepted at the army induction station. The employer can then be prepared to replace the man if he is accepted," General Page said, "or to continue his employment if he is rejected."

"It is difficult to find an immediate cure-all for this problem, but it is hoped that through a closer coordination between the employer and the prospective inductee much of the hardship and suffering in these cases may be alleviated. Employers should feel a 'moral obligation' to hold a registrant's job for him until he has actually been accepted. Even though he is rejected, surely he has fulfilled his duty to his country by responding to the call for service."

"Of course, registrants should be cautioned to notify their employers immediately whether they have been accepted or rejected by the army examiners," General Page said in conclusion.

## Action Delayed on Bone-Dry Election

Commissioners Take More Time to Study Petition; Eligibility of Some Signers in Doubt

Confronted with possible ineligibility of some signers' names found on the petition for a county-wide bone-dry election presented to them Tuesday, the Wheeler county commissioners court found it necessary to take more time for study of the list, it was announced late today. A decision, it is reported, will probably be rendered this week.

The question to be voted upon at the proposed election is: For prohibiting the sale (in Wheeler county) of all alcoholic beverages, and against prohibiting the sale of all alcoholic beverages.

The law requires names equalling 10 per cent of the number of votes cast in the last previous general election for governor upon a petition before an election may be called. On that basis, 316 such signers must be obtained, and eligible petitioners must be legally qualified electors.

With a narrower margin of excess names than usual on this petition and because some of the names could not be found on county poll tax rolls or other records, the court could do nothing less than delay action. If opponents to the measure should prove, after an election is held, that an insufficient number of eligible names appeared on the petition, results could be held void and cost of the election wasted.

Regardless of their personal attitude toward the question, the commissioners court is correct in safeguarding the taxpayers' money; there is too much need of county funds for relief and other legitimate demands to waste any uselessly at this time. They have consulted legal talent and made a diligent effort to determine validity of the petition.

If the present petition is found lacking, proponents of the bone-dry referendum may circulate another petition that will meet all requirements and put the question cleanly and without doubt before the electorate.

## Former Wheeler Man Dies In Fort Worth

Funeral services for Warren Veale, 65 years old, of Fort Worth, father of Winford Veale of Amarillo, were held Saturday in that city with Rev. Joseph I. Patterson, Meadowbrook Methodist church, officiating. The son, Winford, chief tariff clerk of the Panhandle & Santa Fe Railway, who resides at 3801 Harrison street, Amarillo, was in attendance.

The elder Veale died Thursday in a Fort Worth hospital. He is survived by his widow and two sons, W. T. of Fort Worth and Winford of Amarillo; one daughter, Mrs. Dale Wilson, San Diego, Calif.; and four sisters, Mrs. H. C. Casey, Mrs. C. E. Rutledge, Fort Worth; Mrs. W. L. Meadows, Olney, and Mrs. D. W. Brunson, Midland.

The Veale family resided in Wheeler at different periods, finally leaving here about four years ago. He was supervisor of the local WPA relief office when that program was introduced and for two or three years following.

## Progress Continues on Food Stamp Plan

Worley Wires Times Final Designation for County Secured—In Operation Soon

That excellent progress continues on the federal Food Stamp plan for Wheeler county is seen in a telegram received Tuesday by The Times from Congressman Gene Worley, which read:

"Have just secured final designation of Wheeler county for participation in Food Stamp Plan. The department says plan should be in operation there within a month."

Similar information was received from Cong. Worley by County Judge D. A. Hunt, who also had wires from other sources connected with introduction of the program in this county.

Among these was a message received yesterday from Tom Bolton, district supervisor at Oklahoma City. The communication stated that Robert Moss of the Surplus Marketing administration will arrive in this area the latter part of the week or first of next to begin organization work necessary to inauguration of the Food Stamp program. Moss, the message said, will communicate with the judge upon his arrival here.

In discussing the matter this morning, Judge Hunt was of the opinion that Moss would call a meeting here in the county seat, and possibly at other points, to discuss and study requirements of the program's installation. Each county, he believes, will be treated as a unit in this stage of preparations and sees little likelihood or need of district or area meetings similar to the one at Childress a short time ago.

So far as learned here, merchants and business men, county officials and other citizens besides those who will directly benefit, are anxious to see the plan installed and in operation.

## Farmers, Business Men Attend Dairy Exhibit

Sponsored by the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce, a group of Wheeler county farmers and business men attended the dairy products show at Fort Worth on April 9 and 10.

The exhibit was closely examined, with special study of proper dairy breeds in an effort to determine which breed should prove most profitable for this area. Production of milk and butterfat was the main item considered from a profit standpoint, as all farmers cannot expect appreciable revenue from the sale of breeding stock, but may from dairy products. Keeping good bulls and foundation females to yield good producers within the herd, was stressed.

Lectures on the proper care of milk and dairy products were attended, proving both interesting and instructive to the practical dairymen attending the show. The group returned with renewed interest in their work and a stronger determination to keep better milk stock and take better care of milk and dairy products.

A committee was appointed to work with a similar group representing the Home Demonstration council regarding a fruit festival this summer. After the danger period to fruit from freeze has passed and safety of the crop is assured, and if the ladies wish to have a fruit festival, committees from both bodies will meet and decide the matter.

Primary committee named by the agricultural council includes J. H. Gordon, M. L. Clark and Lee Black. An arrangements committee to work with the ladies consists of R. C. Hawk, Gordon Whitener and Tom E. Laman.

The council voted to exhibit an agricultural display at both the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo and the State Fair at Dallas this fall, under direction of the county agent and exhibit committee, whose membership is I. M. Passons, Pete Morgan and C. H. Riley.

Preliminary arrangements and assembling of products for this display have just been started and will be completed as rapidly as development of articles will permit.

Hopes were expressed by the council that another colt show will be held in Wheeler this fall, since those still using work stock should strive to have the best, and such a show, it is believed, greatly encourages the production of better work animals. The committee appointed for this event includes R. Irons, G. W. Mason and J. C. Bradstreet.

The council voted to comply with the wishes of those attending the annual farmers' barbecue last fall that it be held during the light of the moon in August. A committee on arrangements for the barbecue will be appointed at the next council meeting. All farmers wanting the barbecue, and who have not already done so, will be asked to make contributions to the supervisors when their land is measured under the AAA this summer.

Approval was voiced by the council on the manner in which all parts of the extension program have progressed, especially those of soil conservation and seed treatment.

## April 30th Announced as Mattress Deadline

April 30 has been set as the final date for Texas farm and ranch families to make application for cotton and ticking under the Department of Agriculture's 1941 cotton mattress demonstration program.

This announcement has been made by B. F. Vance, administrative officer in charge of the Triple-A in Texas. Since the extension service is charged with supervision of the program, Vice Directors Mildred Horton and G. E. Adams are urging all county extension agents to be certain every eligible family in Texas has opportunity to make application before the deadline.

On March 24, more than a quarter of a million mattresses had been made in community centers in the state.

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## FILLING A VACANCY

The fact that Texas must now fill a senate vacancy appears against a political background that was already complicated.

Under the law, an election must be held in 60 to 90 days. The governor must appoint someone to hold the office in the meanwhile. The governor himself had been regarded as a likely—and a very formidable—contender in the 1942 senatorial election. Many observers had noted the possibility of his becoming a candidate for a third term as governor. He might make use of his appointive power in such a way as to further either of these presumed ambitions. On the other hand, his foes may seize the opportunity to thwart his desires, whatever they may be.

A short time ago there was an account of a plan to bring Attorney General Gerald Mann, a potential aspirant for the governorship, into the race for governor. The name of Lieut. Gov. Coke Stevenson was also figured in the speculation. The effect of the vacancy is perhaps to hasten a contest that had been scheduled for 1942. If that happens, Texas is in for an interesting time.

In most states, the governor has the power to fill a senatorial vacancy until the next regular election.

In 1913, at a called session, the Texas legislature enacted the law under which the election must be held within 90 days. Back of that action was an incident which had left considerable soreness.

When Senator Joseph W. Bailey decided not to seek re-election in 1912, Morris Sheppard and J. F. Wolters were the principal candidates for the seat, the former winning. Bailey, with several months yet to serve, resigned to resume his law practice. Governor Colquitt named R. M. Johnston, publisher of the Houston Post, for the unexpired term, by way of paying a well-deserved compliment to a stalwart and able individual.

When the legislature met in 1913, it elected Sheppard for the brief unexpired term instead of permitting Johnston to serve until March 4. That was in a day when the liquor question was dominant in Texas affairs and Johnston had been an ardent wet. Later in that year, the 17th amendment to the federal constitution meanwhile having been ratified by the states, the legislature enacted the law under which the governor's appointive power is exercised only in a very temporary way.

Assuming that the governor would like to go to the senate, his course might be to name some not-too-conspicuous individual for the temporary appointment and become a candidate himself in the special election.

In some states under analogous conditions, there has been witnessed the shabby procedure under which the governor resigns and is appointed to the senatorship by the lieutenant governor when the latter becomes governor.

The Texas law makes such a course inexpedient since the voters would shortly have an opportunity to upset it. A factor in the situation is that some Texans, while they are

opposed to O'Daniel, would rather see him in Washington than in the governor's chair for a third term.

Texas politics, which is never dull for very long, is due to become livelier than usual as a result of the situation created by the vacancy.

## AN UGLY STORY

It ought not to be necessary for labor spokesmen to defend the action of the union in charging initiation fees and collecting reasonable dues. And it never would have been necessary if a reasonable fee had been collected and then taken from none except those who were perfectly willing to join the union.

The defense has been made necessary by the collection of initiation fees that are so exorbitant that they take their place in the lists of hijacking enterprises. And it has been made necessary by the action of organizers in forcing unwilling citizens to submit to extortion in order to obtain employment on a defense project.

That the laborers have a right to organize for the protection and advancement of their own interests is denied by no reasonable citizen. That they take their place in the lists of hijacking enterprises. By no law ever enacted by congress or legislature is an organizer authorized to force a farmer to pay \$80 for permission to work on an army cantonment. Without any legal authority whatsoever that extortion has been practiced.

And the shame of it all is that the government has silently acquiesced if it has not actually sympathized while this nationwide extortion has been under way.

The government has provided hundreds of millions of dollars for cantonment construction. It has authorized the building of cantonments all over the country. It has called for hundreds of thousands of citizens to help build those cantonments.

And then it has coolly turned its collective back while a brood of vultures have practically hijacked every American who asked for the privilege of helping to prepare his country to fight for its very life.

While the extortion itself is in-fensible, the action of the government in permitting the extortion is positively reprehensible. When the story of our government's acquiescence in this callous pillage comes to be told it is going to be an ugly story—an exceedingly ugly story.—Oklahoman.

## THAT HOUSE RESOLUTION

Several of the glamorous figures that have represented southern states in the senate in recent times—Bilbo, Heflin, Blease, for example—are said to have won their togas largely because many of the voters in their respective states felt that they would be less troublesome in Washington than at home.

They were elected to the senate because those who feared or disliked them felt that it was the expedient thing to do.

There may have been something of that feeling in the house at Austin recently when a resolution was adopted urging the governor to become a candidate for the senate.

If there were those in the house who felt that W. Lee O'Daniel would be less potent a factor in Texas' internal affairs if he went to the senate and who were thus motivated to support the resolution, their state of mind was not exactly complimentary to the governor. Whatever may have prompted the house action, it reflects no credit on that body.

The choice of a successor to Sen-

ator Sheppard belongs to the people, not to the legislature. Whether the house was sincere or cynical in adopting the resolution, it erred in doing so.

The appointment which the governor makes is not of great importance, since the appointee can serve only about three months. It is of tremendous importance whom the people choose in the special election for the unexpired term and in the election next year for the full term.

Seldom in the state's history has there been a time when the voters' responsibility in such a matter was greater. The federal government is not the remote thing that it was not many years ago. It touches the life of the average individual in countless ways that affect his welfare.

Texas should send a man who understands its needs in both the little things and the big ones. If Texas errs in its choice of a governor, it has the opportunity to mend matters two years later. But the senator whom it elects next year will remain in office six years—and the senator whom it elects this year will of course be in favored position for the regular term.

We shall not find another Morris Sheppard for the place, but we have a right to hope that someone will be named who can grow to the Sheppard stature and pattern. That cannot be done by choosing someone for no reason except that it seems desirable to move him from Austin to Washington.

## WRONG SLANT

By inserting an amendment in the new driver's license law which makes court action necessary to suspend a driver's privilege to operate a car, the Texas senate demonstrated that it is still thinking of the problem from the standpoint of the driver rather than the general public.

It seems to be eternally afraid that it will trample on the toes of the reckless driver, who, according to the senate view, should be allowed to go ahead and operate his car even after a flagrant violation until some state law enforcement agency goes into court and proves his unworthiness.

It should be the other way about, of course, as it is in most states which have tackled the problem realistically. The driver should be made to prove his worthiness and responsibility, by going into court and obtaining—if he can—the right to drive after it has been suspended by the law enforcement agency.

The legislature has for years dodged the plain issue of the day; that is, just who is to rule the roads of Texas, the law or the reckless drivers. Every inch of progress that has been made in writing a sensible code has been forced upon the legislature by public sentiment.

Lately some progress has been made in breaking down this legislative reluctance, but the senate's action in placing the law at a disadvantage in the matter of suspending the driving license of reckless violators proves conclusively that the senate at least, is still sorely in need of enlightenment.

The roads belong to the state and the general public, not to drivers who are a law unto themselves. The privilege of driving should be granted or withdrawn at the state's pleasure, not at the driver's.

Until the legislature wakes up and begins to legislate against rather than for the negligent and the incompetent, our traffic toll will continue to rise. The job can never be done as long as the law-makers persist in approaching the problem from the wrong angle.—Abilene Reporter News.

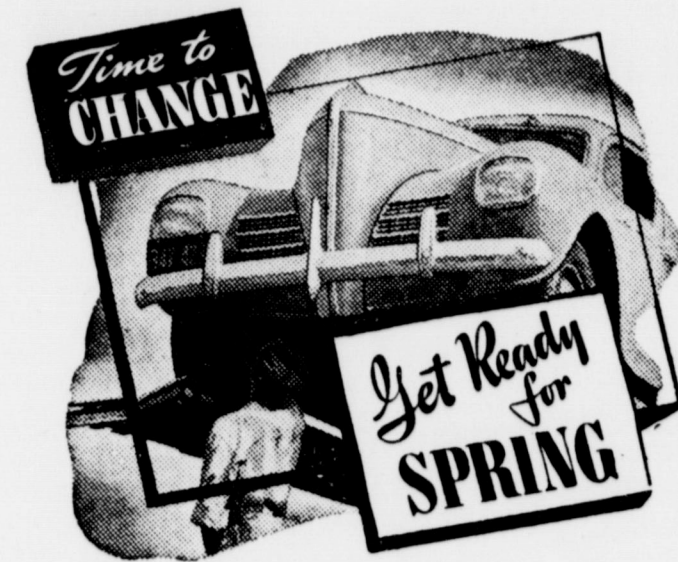

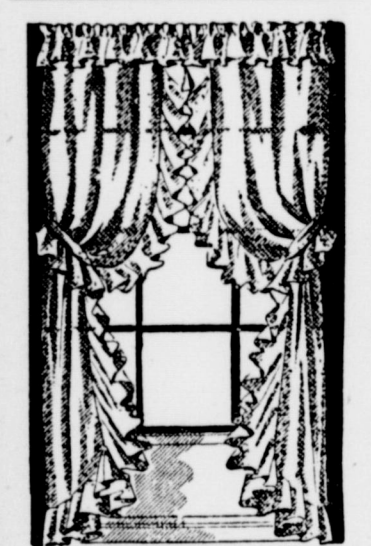

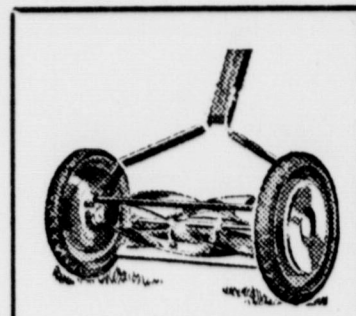
