SHORT STAPLE COTTON LISTED AS ESSENTIAL AMONG WAR CROPS

Short staple cotton has been de-+ signed as an essential war crop by the department of agriculture, Jake Tarter, county agriculture agent, announced this week.

Under the original plan, short staple cotton of the type which is raised almost entirely in this county, was omitted. It was immediately realized that this omission would make it practically impossible for small farm operators of this county to make the 16 war units required in order for them to be classified as essential farmers under the war pro-

It is their ability to produce these 16 units that will determine whether or not the draft board will retain a man as an essential farm worker or classify him for service in the armed

A change has also been made in the grain sorghum acreage required for one unit. Ten acres are now required, whereas 15 acres were required before the revision.

The acreage or number of animals equal to one war unit is given as fol-

By a vote of 116 to 4 the house has passed and sent to the senate a bill removing the present lid of \$1,750,000 a month on state old age assistance spending and substituting a new and more liberal restriction.

The bill, by Rep. Ennis Favors of transportation by the Army and Navy this district, would allot to each qualified applicant each month one half of the amount of assistance to which each was entitled. The remaining half would come from federal matching funds.

It has been decided that registration for War Ration Book No. Two will be held at the public schools over the county from 3:30 p. m. to 10:00 p. m., on Wednesday, February 24, and from 9 a. m. to 10 p. m. on Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Lee Guthrie, Fred Ashley, Blaine Puckett, L. E. McCauley, Mrs. Helen Hise Blake and Helen Green, all of the Wheeler county rationing board, together with several school heads from over the county, attended a meeting in Borger Tuesday to learn of the complexities of the point system on foods effective March 1.

While other states are taking a whole week for the second lineup and signur en ration becks, only four days are set for Texas.

Copies of the consumer declaration sheets that must be signed by some authoritative member of the household will be distributed in advance to all the larger grocery stores over the county and reproductions are to be run in newspapers. Board members are being instructed to accept any actual or reproduction copies of the sheet properly filled out. These blanks will also be available at registration points over the county. A list of the schools used for the sign up will be published in The Times next week.

The new ration system will be even more complicated than the controversial rationing of gasoline, oil and other

products. Canned goods rationing will, in fact, involve a dual currency system. Starting March 1, every time the housewife goes to the store for canned goods she will have to pay not only the usual money price, but also

a value in coupon points. For March, the first ration period. she will have 48 points for every rationed goods. She will have to budget herself on canned goods according to her family's likes and dis-

For instance, a medium can of peas may require 10 points while a can as long as she stays within the family's point budget-and also has the money to pay for the cans, as usual.

The eight days between February 20 and March 1 will be used by grocers to stock their stores, mark point values, on either cans or counters. (Continued on Last Page)







USE OF MEATS THAT WILL NOT BE RATIONED

Fresh fish, poultry, liver, heart,+ tongue and kidney and sweetbreads cannot be sent to our fighting men because of the danger of spoilage during the long voyage. So these meats will not be rationed. The American people must eat more of these meats to take the place of the rationed meats.

Liver, one of these non-rationed meats, is particularily rich in those food elements which prevent anemia and should be included in the menu at least once a week.

Liver has a delicate flavor if properly handled, but becomes tough and hard when over cooked, or cooked at a high temperature.


