#### **Briscoe Club Miss Awarded Gold Star**

LaDell Atherton Receives Highest County Honor in Girls' 4-H Club Work for 1941

Miss LaDell Atherton, 14-year-old Briscoe 4-H club girl, has been awarded the well-merited honor of Wheeler County Gold Star Girl for 1941. This is according to Miss Evelyn Plummer, assistant county home demonstration agent and leader in girls' club work. Miss Atherton is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Atherton, substantial citizens of the Briscoe community.

Miss Atherton is a seventh grade student of the Briscoe schools and has been in club work four years. During that time she has held office in the club and council and otherwise gained recognition for outstanding ability. In 1941 she was elected council delegate and is secretarytreasurer of that body now; also vice president of the Briscoe 4-H

Her hobby is making scrapbooks. One contains poems and another a complete record of her club work. She also keeps recipes after trying them out and proving their worth. On scrapbooks she won two second places at the county fair.

Story of Her Club Work The following story of her club activities has been submitted for publication by Miss Atherton:

"I became a member of the Briscoe 4-H club in 1938, at the age of 10. That year, as a beginner, I did not make a very great success.

"In 1937 my club work was more successful. I canned five quarts and four pints of vegetables and three quarts of fruit. #### Serving His Country | Figures On County Registration Given

Total of 773 Men from 20 to 44 Years Listed on Monday, February 16th

According to information released by the local Selective Service board, a change in governmental policy releases for publication figures on the registration for military service of men between the ages of 20 and 44, which was held on Monday of last week. Previously it had been stated that results of the registration would not be made public.

Wheeler county enrolled a total of 773 men; 729 of these being residents and the remainder from out of the county. Likewise, a number of residents of this county were enrolled elsewhere, their cards to be returned here. Late this afternoon net county figures were 717.

From Washington it is reported the nation's new draft lottery has been fixed for March 17, St. Patrick's day. Green capsules will hold the numbers that will decide the order in which between 8,000,000 and 9,000,000 more men will be subject to call as and when needed.

Completion of arrangements so quickly after the Feb. 16 registration indicates an official determination to have this new reservoir of manpower ready to meet war demands with the least possible delay.

#### Let's Stop Strikes on Defense Work Now; Here's a Remedy (By C. G. MILLER)

The writer is only a country editor of average patriotism—neither of which he need be ashamed. And reports by radio and press of strikes on defense-or war -work from one end of the country to the other, makes

his blood boil. We cannot win a war in that manner. It's easy to talk—there is far too much chin music already—but here's a plan the writer believes would end all strikes right now, and permanently.

Every mother and father of a son or daughter in service or connected with war activities otherwise, should write their congressman and senator demanding immediate enactment of the following law:

Whenever any man engaged in war work of any kind goes out on strike from any cause he shall, if physically fit, be inducted into the army at wages of \$21.00 per month for the duration-with no advancement nor increase of pay possible. If not physically fit for active service, then sent to a concentration camp and confined therein with Germans, Japs, wops, fifth columnists and other enemies of the United States for the duration.

Any man, regardless of nationality or place of birth, who of his own volition or permits himself to be persuaded to strike for any reason is no better than the riffraff seeking to overthrow our government.

All right, fathers and mothers, are you afraid to

act? If not, let's go!


