Twenty-seven million Americans will soon be paying income taxes that as time goes on will become even heavier. To all but a mere fraction of this number, personal income taxes will be a new experience. In fact, according to recent surveys, a good porportion of these people do not yet realize they have been included in the taxable brackets. They are making no preparations to pay taxes. They are spending their money as fast as they earn it. The threat to government authority and solvency by a mass of potential tax delinquents, is serious.

A practical solution is the prompt adoption of a pay-as-you-go arrangement such as the Ruml plan. Mr. Ruml, former dean of social sciences at the University of Chicago, and Chairman of the Board of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, observes that: "Nothing can be gained by arguing that people ought to have saved the tax on last year's income out of last year's income. The fact is that they did not do it and now they cannot do it."

Every taxpayer must realize that we cannot survive war, and return to a system of individual freedom unless the government remains solvent. If it is to do that, the people will have to pay taxes and buy bonds on a devastating scale. Tax laws must be mercilessly farreaching pleasure to any American. They and efficient.





Orders for machine tools are being more rigidly checked for their war necessity. Industrial thermometers, pressure gauges, and other industrial types of instruments have been placed under strict control. The metal caps and tops for recapping health supplies, chemicals, beverages and household and industrial products-even metal and rubber for home canning-will be rigorously limited. Production of desk pencil sharpeners and file fasteners made of critical metals has been halted, and so has the manufacture of copper-engraved business stationery, greeting cards, and calling cards. But farmers who must have new farm machinery will be assured of an ample supply through the top priority given to the delivery of critical materials for the manufacture of agricultural equipment.

Effective January 18, a new order signed by Secretary of Agriculture Wickard, limits the number of varieties of bread sold during a given week, provides for the enrichment of all white bread according to approved nutritive standards, halts the sale of packaged sliced bread, stops the sale of bread on consignment, and offers other economies designed to prevent a rise in the price of bread to consumers. But in spite of all measures to keep down the cost of living, a comprehensive survey of nearly 900 lines of goods indicates a price index at the highest level for the past 16 years. It is evident. therefore, that we must continue the pattle against inflation unrelentingly during the new year.


