City Scrap Drive Here Last Tuesday Is Definite Success

Virtually every office and business house in Wheeler was closed at 4 p.m. Tuesday afternoon as citizens locked their doors to take time off to dig out more scrap metal for Uncle Sam's steel mills.

Places of business, homes, alleys and back yards were searched. In some instances business men took their employees as a crew and used their pickups and cars to bring in thousands of pounds of old stoves, washing machines, cast iron wash kettles, iron bedsteads, lawn mowers and a hundred and one other items. A large per cent of the scrap was brought in Tuesday evening to the local salvage depot, a large "axis coffin" that has been erected on the southwest corner of the court house lawn. Other scrap heaps were stacked and delivered to the salvage depot Wednesday.

One local service station operator donated the use of his time and his truck and brought in 1660 pounds of scrap from one farm.

Sugar Users Warned to Not Let Purchase **Certificates Lapse**

Sugar users were cautioned today by R. D. Holt, Chairman of the Wheeler County War Price and Rationing Board, against allowing their sugar purchase certificate to lapse. The individual consumer's sugar stamps are not affected.

Light Balloting Predicted for **General Election**

General election balloting next Tuesday is expected to be light in Wheeler county as is generally expected in other counties of the state. There are 3,241 paid poll taxes in the county and 105 exemptions, but it is doubted if voting will exceed a fourth of this amount since it is generally conceded that in Texas the second Democratic primary "tells the tale" so far as the election of officials is concerned.

There are, however, five amendments to be voted upon and the importance of these should attract the attention of the voters' responsibility.

There are two parts to the official ballot, which measurers 13 inches wide by 22 inches long. Upper portion is divided into five columns, one each for Democratic, Republican, and Peoples Unity parties, the fourth marked "independent candidate" and the fifth blank, reading from left to right.

Bottom part of the ballot has space for voting on five proposed amendments stating pro and con in each case.

An explaination of the wording of amendments:

John Tarleton appropriation-this refers to the amendment authorizing the legislature to pay for building constructed by John Tarleton college. Military instructors-which amendment would permit accounting officers of the state to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States army and navy who are assigned to duties in state institutions of higher education.

Anti-deficit-this refers to the amendment requiring appropriation bills passed by the legislature to be presented to and certified by the comptroller of public accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off state obligations outstanding September 1. 1943 and fixing the duties of the legislature and comptroller of public accounts with reference thereto.

Probate jurisdiction-this amendment would provide that the legislature may be in certain counties exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal, or probate mat-
