# **USO** Drive To Be Staged

According to reports, Wheeler county is lagging behind its quota in the national USO drive and at a meeting of the local Lions club Monday night, a committee composed of Dr. H. E. Nicholson, Ansel Mc-Dowell, Harry Wofford and Glen Render were named to co-operate with the local Legion group in making plans for raising at least \$300 in the north part of the county for this cause. Most of Texas counties have completed their quotas.

USO, in this war, stands in the place of the great number of different organizations that handled the entertainment and comfort for the soldiers, sailors and marines in the last world war.

#### **42-43 Marketing Quota Penalty Set On Cotton**

Cotton marketing quota penalty rate is 8 cents per pound for the 1942-43 marketing year.

Under terms of amendments to the AAA Act, loans will be made by the Commodity Credit Corporation at 85 per cent of parity price on August 1, the beginning of the marketing year, and will be approximately 16 cents per pound.

While the cotton rate will not be set until August 1, early harvest in some sections of the state necessitates immediate announcement of penalty rate for cotton marketed in excess of the farm marketing quota, Fred Rennels, assistant administrative officer of AAA in Texas, said.

#### Penalty Rate On Wheat

Penalty rate for wheat raised in excess of farm marketing quotas is 57 cents per bushel this year.

National loan rate previously has been announced at \$1.14, according to P. C. Colgin, state AAA commodity loan specialist.

#### More Conservation Is Farmers Wartime Aim

At least three times as much soilbuilding work this year as in 1941 is one wartime aim of Texas farm-

Total soil-building assistance, esgram, is approximately three times as large as the 1941 allowance. The increase results from shifting a portion of AAA payments, which formerly were made for planting within of the Methodist church, took the special allotment acreage, to the soil-building allowance. Total assistance under the 1942 program, which may be used for carrying out approved practices, is approximately \$20,000,000 compared to \$9,000,000 under last year's program.

Faced with shortages of labor, materials and equipment, farmers must begin conservation work immediately if maximum payments are to be earned this year, Fred Ren- and persons eligible to receive them Lula Miller was a native Texan nels, assistant administrative officer

The conservation materials and services program, which now is operating in 150 counties, is a definite method by which farmers can offset shortages, he said.

Under this plan, winter legume seed, superphosphate and terraces are paid for by AAA, with costs deducted later from individual AAA payments. Approximately 25,000 miles of terraces, 3,000,000 pounds of Austrian winter pea and vetch seed, and 17,000 tons of superphosphate have been requested under this program.

Other positive conservation practices which may be carried out during the year include planting summer legumes and non-leguminous crops for green manure or cover in some sections of the state, contour listing, furrowing and chiseling noncrop posture, eliminating destructive plants, building earthen tanks and reservoirs, drilling wells and mowing

# Rural School **Scholastics** Same As '41

#### Same Number of Boys, Same Number of Girls

According to a report compiled by Jess Dyer, acting county school superintendent, Wheeler county common schools have identically the same number of scholastics as last year. And furthermore, there are the same number of boys and the same number of girls as included in last year's group.

This fact was revealed in a report recently sent to Austin and is the result of the census completed in March. One less white child and one more negro child was included in the report. 1,179 children of school age were listed in the common school

In the independent schools of the county the Wheeler schools listed 476 students, a gain of 13, while Shamrock's report showed 815, a loss of 54 over last year. Mobeetie reported 302, 1 less than last year; Briscoe 244, a gain of 15; Kelton 166, 7 more than last year; Lela 160 and Allison 127.

The census includes children between the ages of 6 and 17 inclusive, and is subject to the approval of the state department of education.

A total of 3,468 scholastics for the county were included in the report compared with 1941's total of 3,507.

The statistics show that farm income has risen substantially during the past year. What the statistics do not show is that the farmer's costs have also risen heavily-and that such problems as labor are getting steadily worse.

Dairy farming is a case in point. Cows must be milked twice a day, seven days a week. Expert experienced labor is necessary. But the farmers must pay several times as much for this kind of labor as he used to, even when he can get it. In many areas, it is virtually unobtainable at any price. Workers have gone to the cities, attracted by the high wages and relatively short hours of war industries.

The consumer wants cheap milk, and in many states milk is a public utility, with its price controlled by state boards. But the farmer can't sell milk at a fixed price if his labor cost steadily rises. As yet, no one seems to have any feasible solution to this problem. It simply illustrates that, contrary to the belief of many city people, everything isn't perfect down on the farm.

Even in these days, \$1,000,000,000 is a lot of money. One billion a month is a larger sum than the human mind can visualize. But the people of America must buy a minimum of \$1,000,000,000 a month worth of War Stamps and Bonds so long as the war lasts.


