Ambulance Makes 282 Runs In 1987

Once again the Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance Service books were tallied. 1987 was a record setter with 282 calls answered. This is compared to 272 calls last year. There were 115 transfers, 95 to Amarillo hospitals, 11 to Pampa, 2 to Oklahoma City, 1 to Tulsa, and 5 to Elk City. The longest distance was to Brownfield, Texas.

The individual calls were credited to the following: M.K. Christner 207 calls, Louis Stas 70 calls, Mark Frankenberg 111, Lee Hibler 92, Pam Hibler 13, Jon Sullivan 54, Dwight Tipps 20, Mark Gill 5, Joel Finsterwald 12, Betty Chapman 5, Elaine Rodgers 3, Jim Caulderon 6, Larry Jones 13, Lyndon Loyd 3, Kyndal Murray 22, Kristie Sullivan 5.

Since the ambulance service began, June 1, 1976, 2,432 calls have been answered. This far exceeds the projected figures of about 70 per year!

Heart attacks and associated heart disease are still our number one killer. In our area 45% of the calls deal with cardiac problems. One in four heart attack deaths occur before the age of 65. Almost 50% of those who suffer a myocardial infarction (heart attack) die within the first hour. This is why

we push for CPR training in our local school systems, as well as public training. If you do not know CPR and the Heimlich Maneuver, please take the time to learn. 10% of all heart attack victims could be saved if enough people care. DO YOU CARE ENOUGH?

CRP PROVISIONS OF THE FOOD SECURITY AFFECTS ALL FARMERS

The Conservation Compliance, Sodbuster and Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) provisions of the Food Security Act of 1985 have affected all farmers in some way, according to Joe Don King, County Extension Agent.

A meeting has been scheduled for Tuesday, January 12 to explain the various programs and to answer producer questions. The meeting will begin at 7:00 p.m. and will be held in the District Courtroom of the Wheeler County Courthouse. Personnel from the local offices of the Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service, the Soil Conservation Service, Farmer's Home Administration, and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will present the program.

Producers should be making a decision now about participation in CRP. The next CRP sign-up period will begin in late February. About 54,000 acres of Wheeler County farm land have been put into CRP. Another 8,000 - 10,000 acres can be put in before Wheeler County reaches its limit.

To meet the requirements of Conservation Compliance, all farmers participating in any USDA programs must have a conservation plan developed for their farm by the Soil Conservation Service by 1990 and they must be following that plan by 1995. In some cases, this will mean that producers must change some of their farming practices to reduce erosion of their soil.

Sodbuster requirements prohibit farmers from plowing up grass on highly erodible soil.

Farmers who put land in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) sign a contract that requires them to establish a grass cover and maintain the grass for 10 years. Landowners then receive an annual payment for the 10 years the land is in CRP.

These programs will be covered in more detail and questions will be answered at the meeting January 12. Producers will then have a better idea how the provisions affect their operation and can plan accordingly.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve veterans and people of all ages without regard to socio-economic level, race, color, sex, handicap, religion, or national origin.

I have decided to become a candidate for the Congress because I am concerned about the direction of our nation and our local economy. 



SPS Approves Fuel-Cost Credit

Southwestern Public Service Company's (SPS) Texas retail customers will begin receiving in their January bills a one-time \$11.2 million fuel-cost credit. The refund was approved Thursday by the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT).

The "average" residential customer, based on monthly consumption of 600 kilowatt-hours, will

receive about a \$10 credit, said Sam Hunter, SPS vice president of rates and economic research. The refund will include interest at an annual rate of 11.7 percent.

Hunter said lower costs for coal and natural gas, which are major expenses in generating electricity, and mild summer temperatures, which allowed the company to operate only its most efficient power plants, made the refund possible.


