

**Registered** Jersey Heifers to County

#### Thirty-Two Young Animals Coming for Future Farmers and 4-H **Club Boys of Area**

As the first step in a proposed plan to add a number of registered Jersey cattle to the dairy herds of Wheeler county, purchase of 32 registered and tested Jersey heifers was made in Fort Worth recently.

The animals were purchased by Jake Tarter, county agent, and Claud Holley, secretary of the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce, and the transaction was temporarily financed by the Shamrock civic body, which will later be reimbursed by the Farm Security administration.

The yearling heifers are from the District Judge's Post well-known herd of J. L. Hodgins, and delivery will be made immediately.





# Tire Rationing Board Gives January Report

Raymon Holt, chairman of the Wheeler County Tire Rationing board, has released the following figures of quotas and tire equipment issued by the board during January. Passenger Cars and Light Trucks: Quota-27 tires and 23 tubes; issued -21 tires and 19 tubes.

Trucks and Busses: Quota-57 tires and 48 tubes; issued-17 tires and 10 tubes

Tractors: 13 tubes, 7 tires issued. Obsolete Sizes: 13 tubes, 8 tires.

The February quota for passenger cars and light trucks is 13 tires and 11 tubes, and truck and bus, 29 tires and 50 tubes. Tractor and obsolete tires are not included in the quota but are issued on proper showing of need.

#### SHOCKING SPECTACLE

Comparatively little attention was paid at the time to the congressional action which resulted in sending to President Roosevelt's desk a proposal to pension members of congress upon their retirement-voluntary or involuntary. But, here in Texas at least, the people are beginning to talk about it. No gift of prophecy is needed to forecast that congressional pensions will be one of the issues in our congressional campaigns this year.

Under the terms of this proposal a congressman or senator who can manage to hold his job for five years can qualify for some sort of pension, and if he holds on long enough he may draw \$4,000 a year on quitting or being defeated. Those members who voted for it justify it on the

theory that congressmen are just as Voter may take another view of it.

Civil service employes are under little or as much time to their jobs it. as may please them and fix their mentioned respect they have done rather well for themselves. Each congressman now has a salary of \$10,000 a year and receives up to \$15,000 for office expenses.
