Official Press Release from the Office of War Information

Home Front morale in the Southwest has been put to the test increasingly in the last week. But gasoline mileage rationing, coffee rationing, milk and meat shortages, and serious prospects of shortages in butter and other commodities are not as bad as some of the discomforts and restrictions we may have to undergo to win the war.

Discomforts, restrictions and even severe dislocation of business are necessary to the realization of our war aim-the destruction of those forces that threaten the very foundations of civilization, our homes and

Gasoline rationing in the heart of the oil country to preserve our precious rubber supply is one of the minor inconveniences of war. Southwesterners should be thankful—and sympathetic-because we do have our huge oil supplies. In the East, where there is an addition factor of transportation, gasoline rations have been cut to three gallons a week, instead of the four gallons to be allowed in the favor of Southwest. On top of that, while Southwestern homes remain comfortably heated with natural gas, Eastern homes will be cold and uncomfortable this winter because of the transportation shortage.

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Quail Hunters Warned That Poison Bait Has Been Put Out In Area

Bird season opens December 1, and as in former years it is expected that local hunters as well as those from neighboring towns are making preparations to use several dogs in the

County agent Jake Tarter has issued a warning to all dog owners that 1,670 pounds of poisoned horse meat has been put out for poisoning crows and hawks. The bait contains Strychnine Suphate, the most deadly known poison for dogs.

It is reported that crows are destroying a large part of the feed over the county.

In a telegram received by The Times yesterday from Donald M. Nelson, chairman of war production, he states that the government is asking American farmers to dedicate the remaining weeks of 1942 to an intensified scrap hunt. Steel mills need more heavy scrap and the farms are one of the best sources of this type metal. He requested further help of The Times in the farm drive and in aiding our salvage committee to continue this effort throughout the next few weeks.

All salvage committees are being instructed to continue to make available to the farmer all their transportation facilities and man power to cooperate in every possible way. Mr. Nelson concluded by stating that the nation is looking to the American farmer and he is sure they will come through.

Jeffers Says Mileage Rationing to Start Dec. 1

William M. Jeffers, federal rubber administrator, reiterated before a congressional committee this week his determination to make gasoline rationing nation-wide as scheduled on Dec. 1, as a rubber conservation

"If those who are determined to freeze the press, succeed in achieving their objective, we may have freedom of speech, but be deprived of freedom to speak, because the facilities and a Disciple.
