## G. W. Seitz Dies at Mobeetie Home

Geo. W. Seitz, 63 year old prominent Wheeler county pioneer, passed away at his home in Old Mobeetie, early Monday morning. His death came as shock to the entire community, as he was ill only a few hours.

George W. Seitz was born in Denton county, Texas, June 19, 1878 and passed away April 13, 1942. Mr. Seitz came to Mobeetie when a very young man and was engaged in the hardware business with Geo. B. Dunn and Earl Dunn a number of years. Later he was foreman for the Mathers Ranch several years, and later entered the filling station business in Old Mobeetie. At the time of his death his station was at the cross roads between Old and New Mobeetie.

Mr. Seitz was a member of the Mobeetie Masonic Lodge and the Order of the Eastern Star and was a charter member of each. He was married on November 9, 1909 to Miss Ruby Williams, and besides the widow, two brothers and two sisters survive.

The brothers are J. E. Seitz of Silina, Texas and Edgar Seitz of Pampa. The sisters are Mrs. W. W. Davis of Miami and Mrs. Will Evans of Sentinel, Okla.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon at the Baptist Church of Mobeetie with Rev. G. W. McLain, Methodist minister, in charge, assisted by Rev. Ted Ewing, Baptist minister.

## Best Record Book Wins Wheeler 4-H Boy \$12.50

Record books in the Northern Star Cotton Contest were judged Wednesday, April 8 by the Wheeler County 4-H Club committee. First prize of \$12.50 went to Jack Riley, age fifteen, of Wheeler. R. L. Zybach, 13, of Briscoe won the second place award of \$7.50 and the third place award of \$5.00 went to Edwin Watts, age 15, of Texola.

Jack Riley, using proper cultural methods and barnyard manure for fertilizer, produced as much cotton on his three acre tract as was produced on six acres of similar land in his community. Zybach increased the normal production by 41 per cent and made a net profit of \$38.56 per acre on his five acre patch. Edwin Watts' four acre tract averaged 369 pounds of lint per acre while the yield of cotton on surrounding farms was 263 pounds. He made a net profit of \$151.64 on the four acres.

## Candidates Required to File Affidavits

For the first time, all candidates for public office in Texas this year, including those running for precinct, county and district places, must file an affidavit, pledging loyalty to the government, in the office of the Secretary of State, according to information received by County Clerk Harry Wofford.

Form of the affidavit, provided for under the terms of House Bill No. 222 of the 47th Legislature, was prepared by the Attorney General of Texas. A copy is on file in the county clerk's office, from which each candidate must prepare his or her own statement for filing, as blank forms will not be provided for the purpose.

Heretofore, candidates for precinct county and district offices have been required to file only with county Democratic executive committees.

"I (name), of the County of (name of county), State of Texas, being a candidate for the office of (name of office), do solemnly swear that I believe in and approve of our present representative form of government, and if elected, I will support and defend our present representative form of government and will resist any effort or movement from any source which seeks to subvert or destroy the same or any part thereof, and I will support and defend the Constitution and Laws of the United States and of the State of Texas."

Candidates for precinct and county offices are required to make application to the county chairman not later than June 13 for their names to be placed on the ticket. State and district candidates must file not later than June 1.

## Car License Receipts Exceed Last Year's Amount \$4,100.21

The motor vehicle receipts in Wheeler county for this year show an increase of \$4,100.21 over the receipts for the year of 1941. The number of passenger cars registered in 1942, are 2,173; commercial, 216; farm, 242; motor buses, 5; motorcycles, 1; tractors, none; trailers, 31; dealers, 1; replacement plates, none; transfers, none; road tax, none; duplicate receipts, 7; making a total of 2,676, and amounting to \$36,863.47.

The 1941 receipts are as follows: passenger cars, 2,179; commercial, 190; farm, 237; motor buses, 5; motorcycles, 4; tractors, none; trailers, 23; dealers, 3; replacement plates, none; transfers, 12; road tax, 25; duplicate receipts, 2; making a total of 2,689, and amounting to \$32,763.26.

The above figures cover the period from February 1 to April 4, inclusive, for both years.

## 500 Wheeler Registrants Are Mailed Questionnaires

Late Thursday five hundred of Wheeler county's February 16th registrants had been mailed their questionnaires as local boards over the nation have been instructed to start classification at once of the several million men who enrolled on that date.

729 men, an unusually large number for counties of this population, were registered in the third draft in Wheeler county. This issue of The Times lists the order numbers for all men in the county. Serial numbers are consecutive so any one may find their order number by referring to the serial number column.

Order numbers indicate the sequence in which the men will be called, but, of course, the classification of each man will depend on each individual case. Questionnaires now being sent out will determine that.

## James O'Gorman Is County Candidate

James O'Gorman, resident of Wheeler county for the past 14 years, this week authorized the Times to announce his candidacy for the office of County Treasurer.

Young O'Gorman's statement to the voters of Wheeler county, pointed out his qualifications and ambition, follows:

"I am asking for the office of County Treasurer. I know that the people do not have time, under the present conditions, to fool with much politics but still it is necessary to select and elect some one to carry on the different jobs in our government and our National Government advocates, as never before, the placing of men and women where they can perform the best service and be of the most benefit to the county.

"I believe that I could fly a bomber or fighting plane, as well as the average man of my age, and, if it were possible, I would be engaged at this very thing right now but the physical requirements are rigid and I could not pass for any kind of military service, and though I am of the right age for the best service, and have the will to give it, I am forced to make my plans in another direction.

"I have lived on a farm in Wheeler county for the past 14 years, attended high school at Shamrock one year and attended high school at Wheeler two years, where I graduated in 1939.

"Since my graduation I have continued my studies in the hope of qualifying myself so that I could perform some kind of work, as well as anyone else. From what I understand to be the duties of the office of county treasurer, it would seem that I am qualified to give satisfactory service.

"It would mean a great deal to me to be honored with this position at this time. It would enable me to go further in school, and qualify myself for some worth-while position in life. No one could appreciate your vote any more than I would. I shall try to see you all in person and in the meantime I ask you, if you do not know me, to make investigation as to my character and qualification, and help me to get this job, if you will."

## MORE PRODUCTION

By the new building stop order, the order streamlining women's fashions, and by other limitations, the WPB continues to emphasize that we have just one project now—and that project is to produce, to smash our enemies beneath the metals and materials we are transforming into weapons.

Last month, we spent more than three billion dollars on the war program, and of that amount, more than two and a half billion went into munitions and war construction.

Thus, the United States is now producing weapons at a rate of about 30 billion dollars a year—or almost as much as the total national income was in 1932, the bottom year of the Depression.

All of this means that we shall have to accept a lower standard of living in America, for the time being. But no American is in any mood to quibble about these sacrifices, so long as we get the planes and tanks and guns and ammunition to our fighting men in Australia, in Ireland—or wherever they may be in this vast, world-wide war.

## PEANUTS VITAL

With peanut planting underway in most of the state, the Texas USDA war board issued a last-minute appeal this week to growers not to fall short on the production of that vital warcrop.

"Texas farmers have promised the nation that they will plant the more than a billion acres asked of them. We must make good on that promise," B. F. Vance, board chairman, declared.

The board's appeal came on the heels of an agricultural marketing service report to the effect that indications were that Texas farmers would plant only 776,000 acres, nearly 300,000 acres short of the 1,056,000 acre food for victory goal.

Peanuts, which supply badly-needed oils, are considered one of the most important warcrops being produced in Texas.

The USDA war board is awaiting a report from the South Texas peanut area, where planting is practically complete, to determine whether goals for that area were met. At the same time county USDA war boards in other areas are being asked to re-emphasize the importance of meeting peanut production goals.

## PROSPECTS BRIGHT

Wheeler county farmers and those over the Panhandle face the most favorable farm and livestock prospects in several years. The abundant supply of moisture from the big snow and recent rains coupled with the comparative mild weather for the past several days have put farm and range land in excellent condition. Stock prices are the best in years and have every indication of going higher.

Although cream and egg prices could be better, there is still a margin of profit in these products with prospects for a good market during the summer. Unless a severe freeze strikes, Wheeler fruit growers are assured a good start of their crops even though some of the peaches are said to be cut short compared to last year's crop. Other type trees are loaded with blossoms turning into fruit. All in all it looks like farmers are going to get off to a good start during the 1942 crop year.

For the first time in the history of Hansford county a man was sentenced to DIE! Orrin J. Brown, killer of Mrs. Leota Frances Murphy, March 20, 1941, was apprehended by Chicago police April 25, 1941. A special term of district court was called for June 10, 1941. He was found guilty by a jury of God-fearing, law-abiding Hansford county citizens on June 14th. The verdict of this court was appealed to the Court of Criminal Appeals and on Feb. 18th, 1942, this high court of Texas upheld the verdict of the 84th District Court. Brown was returned to Spearman to hear sentence spoken by Judge Jack Allen, who was the trial judge in June. Judge Allen said "On the 16th day of May, 1942, before the hour of sunrise, the warden of the State Prison at Huntsville, shall cause a current of electricity of

sufficient intensity to cause death, and may God have mercy on your soul." Brown made no statement.—Spearman Reporter.

## No New Tires For Farm Passenger Cars

The local county rationing board has received the following message from Mark McGee, Texas Ration administrator, relative to who may be eligible for new and recapped tires under the rationing system. The letter is as follows:

"This office can see no possibility in the near future of supplying new tires for farm passenger cars due to the very large number of vehicles involved. However, such vehicles, if applicant does not have a truck and must use a passenger car for transportation of produce and supplies, are eligible for recapping under List B. Due to low annual mileages and slow speeds, farm cars are especially well suited to recapping.

Allotment of camelback for passenger car tire recapping in April should greatly relieve the problem of keeping essential farm passenger cars in operation.

Light trucks of the type known as "pick-ups," regardless of whether equipped with passenger-type tires or truck-type tires, are considered as trucks for eligibility purposes. However, cars which were manufactured as passenger cars do not become trucks because of any addition or alteration made to the car after its purchase.


The regulations provide clearly that no tires are to be released for the purpose of changing over a farm tractor from steel wheels to rubber. In cases where steel wheels are locally available and can be put into service, certificates for tires should be denied.

It has been reported that some vehicles which are ineligible for new tires but which can qualify under list B are changing wheels and rims to use "obsolete" sizes of tires and are applying to the local boards for such tires.

As long as the supply of "obsolete" sizes meets the needs of present List A and List B eligibles, this office can see no reason to oppose such "changeovers" or to refuse certificates. However, administrators or boards may well point out to such applicants that there is considerable risk incurred in these changeover expenditures, since the available tire supply is limited to those obsolete sizes now on hand.

Americans who are holding tires worn to the point where they are no longer usable can help relieve the rubber shortage situation by turning them in immediately to a scrap or junk dealer or a local collecting charity. Leon Henderson, administrator of the Office of Price Administration said today.

Mr. Henderson emphasized that it is a mistake to believe that casings worn or damaged beyond repair are acceptable as "basic carcasses" for retreading or recapping. The tires sought as scrap are those that are completely worn out or have suffered damage which makes them unfit for recapping.

"There is pressing demand for scrap rubber to augment the nation's drastically restricted crude rubber supply," the OPA administrator said. "Old tires are the main source of scrap rubber supply. Those tires that we are urging be turned over for scrap purposes no longer have any service value."

Farmers, particularly, Mr. Henderson pointed out, are likely to have accumulations of old tires, as they frequently mount new tires on the farm and discard the old.
