Red Cross Roll Call **Period Draws Near**

Membership Campaign Starts Next Tuesday, Nov. 11-Has Place in National Defense

America's national defense efforts require a great expansion of all American Red Cross activities, C. J. Meek, roll call chairman of the Wheeler Red Cross Chapter, declared today in urging "all-out" support of the greatest membership roll call in Red Cross history, to be held from Nov. 11 to 27.

Meek said the Wheeler chapter has a definite part in the national appeal. "We must go over the top in this roll call," he added, "because the continuance of the national Red Cross program depends upon the success of the local chapters in appealing for members."

Funds realized during the roll call period, he pointed out, will be used to enable the American Red Cross and its chapters to carry on its expanded services to the army and navy and to widen its national defense program for the civilian popu-

> Place water hose near opening of silage cutter and fan will draw the probable induction. All registrants crops. liquid into the cutter, giving a uniform mixture of water and silage. Spoiled or mouldy bundles need water added, even if they are wet, in order to get uniform moisture.

silo is being filled. Fill silo its full length. Don't wait until wet, mouldy or

damaged bundles dry out. If good or fresh bundles are used, little water is required.

It is practical to partly fill a silo and wait a few days before finishing the job, but all silage should be well packed as it is put in.
