## Wheeler County Gets Ready For United War Chest Drive

#### Wheeler County Quotat Is Set at \$4,641.00

Organization was going forward in Wheeler county this week in making preparation for the county's part of the United War Chest campaign to get under way locally October 25. The drive will extend through November 5.

Wheeler county's quota is \$4,641. Dr. H. E. Nicholson, Wheeler physician, and Clayton Heare, Shamrock attorney, are co-chairmen of the drive in this county that will merge various money raising organizations, ordinarily scattered throughout the year, into one big other relatives. drive, along with the United War Chest of Texas campaign.

Though pledges are to be made some time during the above mentioned date, those participating in the drive may extend the actual payment of their pledges over into 1944 if they so desire.


65 percent of the amount raised in the United War Chest drive will go to men in the armed forces, or, if a donor so desires, he may specify just which agency he wishes to make his contribution to.

### **Program to Get** Under Way Nov. 1

J. B. Johnston, secretary-manager of the Wheeler County Rural Health Service, announces that a federal grant has been approved for the continuance of the program in this area.

Under the set up there will be three participating units, 1 for Wheeler area, 1 for the Shamrock area and 1 for Collingsworth county. The new grant is based on a total participating membership of 2,000 families.

Mr. Johnston states that the maximum family contribution will be lowered and services will differ in that dental care and prescribed drugs will not be included in the benefits as formerly. The benefits under the new program will include surgery, hospitalization and general medical attention.

Anticipated date for the program to again be in effect in Wheeler county is November 1, while it is expected to begin in Collingsworth county December 1. The service is available for the areas in which the farm folk and doctors agree to participate.

Any one whose chief source of income is from the farm may participate in the program.

The board of directors plan to meet tonight to work out plans to get the program back in operation.



R. H. Forrester, secretary-treas urer of the Wheeler National Farm formation that the Board of Directors of the Federal Land Bank of Houston has authorized the lowering of the interest rate to 4 perterest rate at above 4 percent per annum, effective July 1, 1944.

This reduction in the contract rate of interest will effect about 80 percent of the Land Bank borrowers in this area, according to Mr. Forrester. Prior to 1935, he said, loans were closed at 4 1-4 to 6 percent, depending upon the cost of money in the bond markets at that time. All Land Bank loans have been made at a contract rate of 4 percent since March 1935.

"The action of the Board of Directors of the bank in effect guarantees that the rate will not go contract rate of interest is made possible by the successful operation of the Land Bank System of co-operative credit which is designed to make available necessary farm credit at low rates and on long terms.'

The fourth annual National Newspeper Week is observed from October 1 to 8 and finds groups and organizations, both inside and outside the Fourth Estate, celebrating the occasion. The slogan adopted is a tried and true statement of fact and stands for the weeks through the past years and for the years to come: "A Free Press And A Free People-An Unbeatable Team!"

The idea, back four years ago when this week was first named, hoped to promote the relationship between the publishers and the public for, since the newspaper profession is probably more concerned in the affairs of the nation's people than any other privately owned business, it follows that the people should understand it's press.
