WHEELER RALLY NETS \$28,300 LAST NIGHT

Wheeler county folks have done it again. Going over the top in every drive for victory that has been undertaken during the past few months, including USO, Scrap Metal and Rubber, and Red Cross War Fund drives, people over the county have again proved themselves to be as near 100 per cent Americans as can be found in the nation by oversubscribing by some \$50,000 the \$210,-000 quota set for this county in the Second War Loan drive. It is expected that several thousands dollars worth of bonds are yet to be reported before the drive is concluded Saturday.

Climaxing the three-week's drive locally, \$28,300 were invested in bonds at a rally held at the school gymnasium last night.

Cal Farley and his group of entertainers including Stuttering Sam, from Amarillo, staged an interesting program of songs, dances, music, war pictures and talks before a large crowd who turned out for the patriotic meeting.

Farley reported that the rally here netted several thousand dollars more in bonds than in other towns visited by his group.

> > Two hundred theological students from Protestant and Jewish seminaries at a recent meeting in Union Theological Seminary, New York City, urged that the United States, England and other of the United Nations withdraw their immigration barriers for the duration of the war and open their doors to refugees from Europe. This they thought, would help solve the policies of the Nazis to exterminate the Jews of They urged also that the United Nations relax the blockade so as to provide food for the starving peoples of Europe. The Jewish Institute of Religion joined in the declarations of eleven theological seminaries including Union, Biblical, General Moravian, Drew, Princeton, Jewish, New Brunswick, Yeshiva, and

> > The Church of India-which has ties with the Church of England and with the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States-is organizing the Diocese of Bhagalpur which is to be set off from the very large diocese of Calcutta. It will include most of the Province of Bihar. It will be 18,000 square miles in area. Here nine million people live, of whom 13,000 are members of the Church of India. The Venerable Thomas Lenman, archdeacon of Bhagalpur, will be consecrated as the first bishop of the new diocese.

A Gallup poll of a cross-section of America, made at the request of the American Bible Society, reveals that 8,500,000 adults read their Bibles every day, while 35,000,000 have not read the Book within a year. Somewhat more than 4,000,-000 are reading the Bible more often today than they did before the war. It indicates that about twice as many women as men read the Bible daily, and that residents of small and farm communities read it more than do residents of cities. The New Testament was voted the section of the Bible found most interesting; the Gospels the most interesting part of the New Testament.
