TREE LIGHTS STOLEN

The Christmas tree on the Courthouse lawn no longer shines; \$250 worth of lights were stripped from the tree in the early hours of the morning Saturday. The theft was discovered and a \$50 reward for information leading to the arrest of the individual or individuals responsible was announced at the "cash" drawing Saturday afternoon.

A string of lights at the very top of the tree and the lighted star remains on the tree. These were too high to be reached with out a ladder of some type. Also remain were two long, expensive extension cords. The cords were simply unplugged and pulled out of the way.

The exact time of the atrocity is unknown. The lights are known to have been in place shortly after midnight Friday.

The theft can not be classified as a sick prank; the strings of lights are believed to have been destroyed. The placing of the lights requires moving around the tree and draping the lights. From a portion of the lights found near the tree, indication are that the lights were cut into sections and removed from the tree.

The tree was put into place the first of December in 1984. The tree was lighted in a ceremony on December 8 of that year.

Chamber of Commerce president, Dan Kenney, reported the lights will not be replaced this year. A check on the cost of replacement of the cords and bulbs will be in the neighborhood of \$250. Kenney stated the cords could have been pulled apart, as opposed to having been cut.

The Mike Morgans reported having the wires cut to the lights around their home on Saturday night. The Morgans live at 1006 Red River.

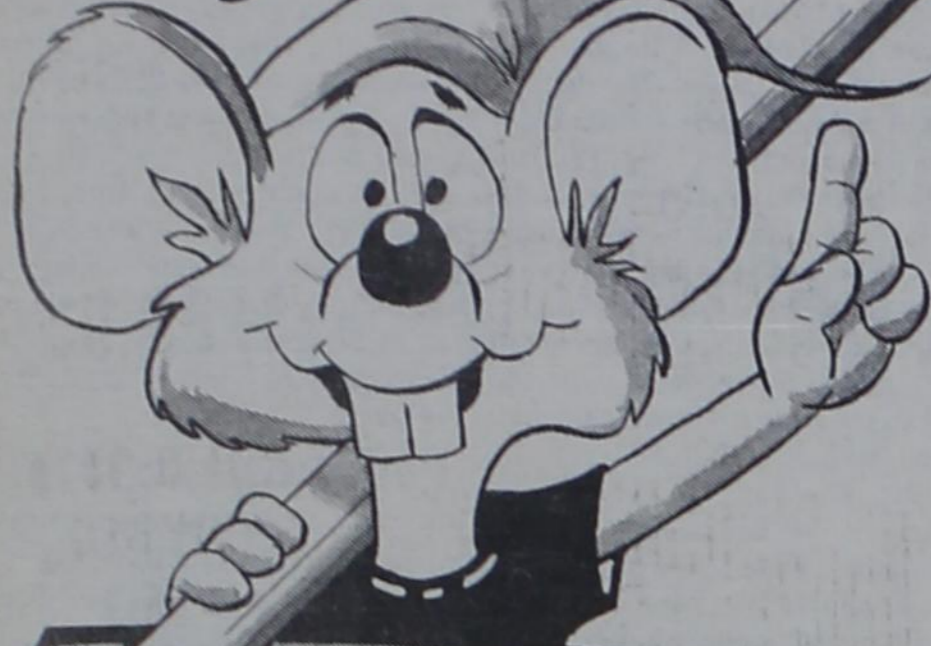

Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

The Mustangs scored a 21-7 victory over the Longhorns Friday night and now advance to the Class 1A semifinals against Munday. The Moguls defeated Paducah 17-14 Friday night in Region 2 quarterfinal action.

Benson, who continues to amaze and astound Wheeler football fans, finished the night with 205 yards on 15 carries. It was his first big gainer for the score that allowed the momentum to swing Wheeler's way. That momentum never found its way to the Vega sideline.

"That kind of set the tone," Wheeler head coach Preston Smith said. It helped our confidence level and deflated theirs."

And just when the crowd thought it had witnessed the best run of the night, so soon after the opening kickoff, Benson struck again.

With 2:52 left in the first half, Benson had what quite likely was the best run of the year, if not his high school career.

On first down, the 180-pound senior found a hole the middle, broke at least three tackles and sprinted 73 yards to the end zone.

It was a classic run. But, according to Benson, it was the offensive line that made it all possible.

"The line's been blocking real good for us," Benson said. "They've been picking up the stunts."

"We got (Vega's defenders) going one way. Everybody was going one way with the momentum and I just cut back across the grain."

As if two touchdown runs for a total of 142 yards weren't enough, Benson, doubling as a defensive back, positioned himself ideally and picked off a Bryan Wood pass on the Vega 30 and returned it 13 yards to set up another Wheeler score.

With 7:28 in the second quarter, running back Shane Guest broke right, found no hole and doubled back to score from 13 yards out over left end.

Wheeler led 21-0 at halftime. The theatrics for the Mustangs were over. After allowing the 'Stangs 237 rushing yards in the first half, a suddenly revitalized Longhorn defense held the Wheeler ground game to only 57 yards on the ground.

"The emotional thing wasn't there (in the second half)," Smith said. "(Vega) came out on defense and lined up with nine or 10 people on their defensive line. It's hard to run against that."

Vega's only moment of glory came through an impressive, clock-eating drive to open the third quarter.

Starting from their own 16 and using over eight-minutes to drive for the score, Vega finally struck when running back Dirk Harle scored from three-yards out.

The Longhorn drive took 17 plays, 13 of which were on short, har-

d-fought rushes of five-yards or less.

The Vega defense contained tailback Bubba Smith throughout the entire game.

Smith, who had been averaging 106 yards per game this season, was held to only 57 yards on 17 carries.

Smith's inability to chalk up another big game was due in part to the 'Horn defense keying on him and his own injury. After suffering a pinched nerve in his shoulder last week against Plains, Coach Smith said Bubba's injury "had him a little nervous" because it was "not completely well."

As has been the case all season, Wheeler's offense was 99-percent groundwork. Quarterback Shawn Bradstreet attempted only one pass, a fourth quarter incompletion intended for David Jones.

Benson has now amassed 1,498 rushing yards in 13 games, including

563 in the last three play-off games; Smith has 1,353 yards on the year.

The Mustang's season record now stands 11-2. Friday's victory, combined with Munday's win over Paducah, will likely allow Wheeler a chance to crawl up a notch in the rankings to the No. 2 spot in the state. Paducah had previously been ranked second.

The Mustangs and Moguls meet Friday night at 8 p.m. in Vernon for the Class 1A semifinals.

After the loss, Vega finishes the year with an 11-3 record.


