CROP CONDITIONS CONSIDERED GOOD

General crop conditions over Wheeler County are the best in three years. Both cotton and feed crops are up to a good stand over most of the entire county. Between 104,000 and 105,000 acres has been planted to feed this year by Wheeler County farmers and some 5,000 additional acres will be planted to these crops as it is normal for about this much cotton to result in a poor stand and be planted to feed crops.

In addition to this large acreage of feed stuffs, some 49,000 to 50,000 acres of cotton will be left unless something unforseen happens. This is about 70 percent of the annual cotton acreage for this county and is less than normal because of the stress being placed on growing feed.

It will be remembered that a year ago last Sunday torrential rains amounting to from six to eight inches fell over Wheeler County destroying about 60 percent of the newly planted crops. Farmers are hoping that vices in Mobeetie beginning Thursno such ill luck results with this year's crop. At this time last year prospects were for only a 20 percent cotton crop-and that was about all that was harvested. Little cotton is yet to be planted over the county but it is considered that there is still plenty of time to plant grain

Generally speaking, the fruit crop in Wheeler County will be light this year with only the grape and apple crop reported to be near 100 percent normal. The peach crop will only be about 5 percent of the normal yield. The cherry crop is about 20 percent normal and the plum and apricot crops are also very light.



Some localities have established regular headquarters where those seeking agriculture work and farmers needing help may register. In any case your County Agent will know the best course of action."

"With an estimated demand for 50,000 pressure cookers and an authorized production up-to-date of only 150,000 compared to 250,000 in pre-war days annually, it means that many, many persons will have to share the same cooker," OPA officials said. About 12,000 pressure cookers have already been made and sent into the South and West where the canning season is early.

This plan will go into effect on June 22 and after that time, both motorists and bicyclists should begin picking up their appli-
