CROP TURNOUT IS EXCEEDING EXPECTATIONS

According to reports coming in from over the county, both cotton and feed crop yields are exceeding expectations as harvest gets into full swing. County agent Jake Tarter stated this week that many farmers are reporting yields of as much as one-third more than they had estimated their crops. This applies to both cotton and feed.

Some of the sub-irrigated land has cotton that will make a bale of cotton to the acre while some grain crops are making as much as a ton to the acre.
