## Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

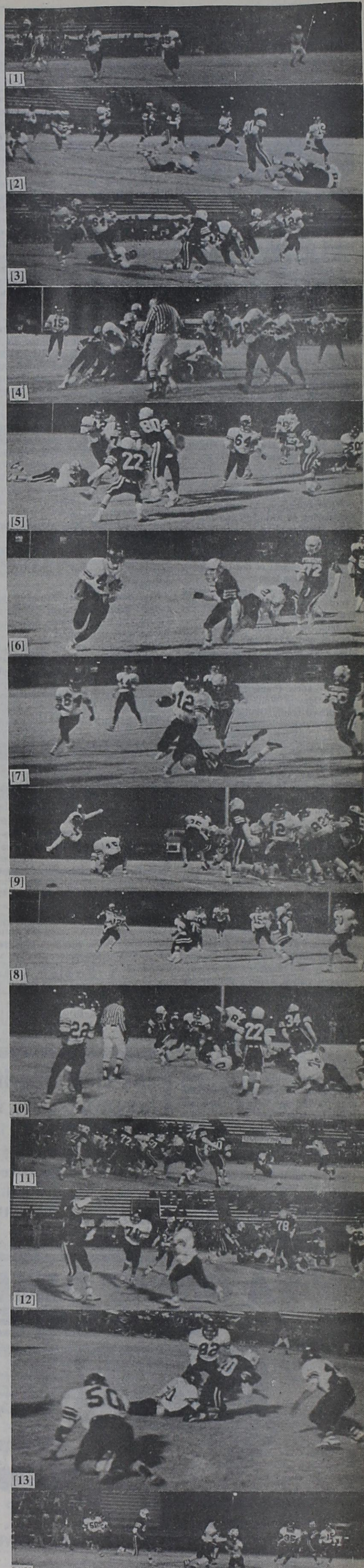

Smith finished the game with 22 carries for 104 yards and one touchdown—a three yard carry on the second play of the second quarter.

Wheeler held a shaky 15-6 half time lead, and the score remained the same as the two teams entered the fourth quarter.

When Benson scored on a two yard run over the left side with 10:53 left in the game, the Mustangs led 21-6, but 2½ minutes later, Plains closed the margin.

When the Cowboys drove 76 yards, McMinn's passing prowess made itself obvious. Seventy-three of the yards on the Plains' drive were achieved through the air and when McMinn popped over from the one on the second of his two quarterback sneaks, Plains had pulled to within nine. Receiver Scott Lowrey made a leaping grab in the corner of the end zone for the two-point conversion and Plains trailed by only a touchdown, 21-14, with 8:08 left to play.

"They played pretty well," Smith said. "I thought they did a good job executing their passing game."

McMinn finished the game having completed 16-of-26 for 242 yards. Shane Guest and Benson each grabbed an interception for the Mustangs. Guest's pickoff was his fifth in three playoff games.

Ashburn, the intended receiver, fell to the ground also, hands covering face, showing obvious disappointment.

When Wheeler special teams player

Chad Bentley recovered the Cowboys' inside kick, the game was all but over and all the Mustangs had to do was fall on the ball twice to run out the clock.

As for the closeness of the contest, Smith said he felt his team was not mentally ready to appropriately meet the challenge.

"I don't think we were as emotional as we needed to be," he said. "I don't think we came out as fired up as we had in earlier games. The kids just didn't seem to have the intensity. I was disappointed with the ups and downs of the ball game. We seemed to

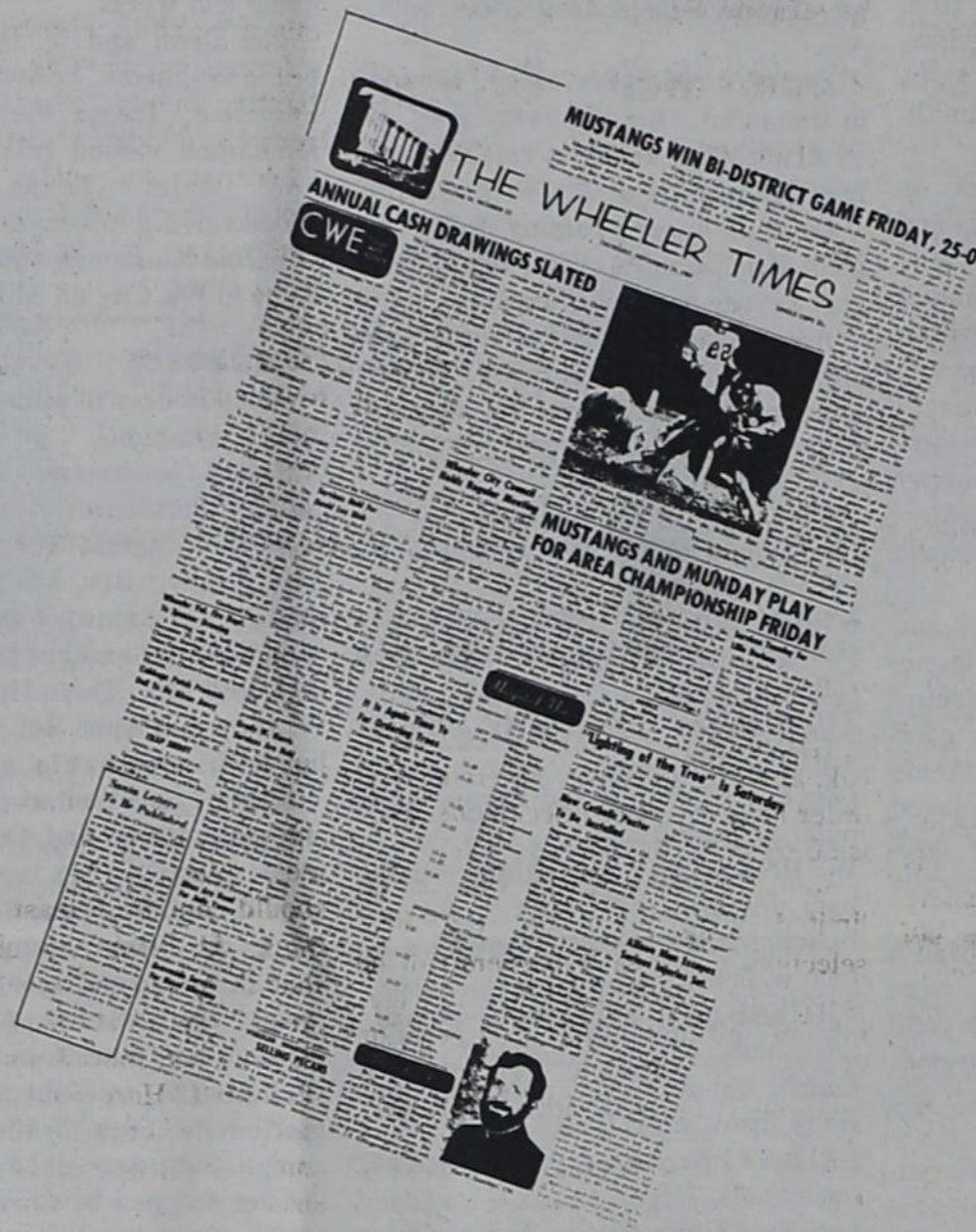

## LAMBS AND HOGS FOR 4-H AND FFA NEED TO BE TAGGED

All lambs and hogs that 4-H and FFA members plan to show in the 1988 Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show must be tagged on Saturday, December 5, 1987, according to County Extension agent, Don King. The validation committee will be at the Wheeler County Show Barn from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. to supervise the tagging. Animals must be tagged at this time to be eligible to enter the county show. Steers that will be entered in the show, were tagged in June or October, King said.

A sheep shearer will be at the show barn on December 5, during the tagging, to shear lambs. Shearing at this time will make the lambs easier to wash and clip at show time.

Entries for the county livestock show are due in the county Extension office by Friday, December 18. The Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show is scheduled for January 22-25, 1988. Lambs and hogs will be weighed in from 4:00-6:00 p.m. Friday, January 22. The market hog show will begin at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, and will be followed by the market lamb show at 6:00 p.m. Steers will be weighed and measured at 2:00 p.m. on Monday and the steers and heifers will be shown at 5:00 p.m. on Monday, January 25. The auction sale for steers, lambs, and hogs will begin at 7:00 p.m. Monday.

## Windbreak Trees Species Being Offered

The Wheeler County SWCD is once again offering windbreak trees to Wheeler County residents. Evergreen seedlings available this year include Afghan pine, Arborvitae, Arizona Cypress, Austrian pine, Eastern redcedar, Ponderosa pine, Scotch pine, and Spruce. The minimum order for evergreens is 30 trees for \$37.50 plus tax.

In addition to evergreens, there is a wide variety of bare-rooted deciduous trees. Deciduous species include Arizona ash, Bur oak, Cottonwood cuttings, Desert willow, Flameleaf sumac, Green ash, Little walnut, Osage orange, Pecan, Redbud, Red oak, and Russian olive. The minimum order for bare-rooted deciduous trees is 50 trees for \$18.75 plus tax.

Some of these trees will be in limited supply; so for the best selection, order early. Orders can be placed by contacting the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District at 826-5640. Payment is required at the time order is placed.

## Voters To Receive Registration Cards

Wheeler County voters should be getting new voter registration cards soon.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Jerry Hefley said the office will begin mailing out the new cards to all registered voters in the first week of December.

The new white card will replace the present yellow card for voters.

Hefley said if any changes need to be made on information recorded on the registration cards, voters should contact her office. He said registered voters not receiving their cards by the end of December also should contact the office at the Wheeler County Courthouse.

## Windbreak Planting Valuable Asset

Windbreak trees can be a valuable asset to a farm or homestead, but only if planning is considered before ordering or planting a windbreak. Planting method and location of the trees are important considerations.

Location and width of plantings should be considered in planning a windbreak. Windbreaks for winter protection are generally placed to the north, west, and southwest sides of the area to be protected. The inside row should be no closer than 100 ft. or more than 300 ft. from the area to be protected. This will guard against snow pile-up. Avoid creating blind corners at road intersections. Plantings made on the windward side of a road should be no closer than 150 ft. from the right-of-way. Avoid plantings under or adjacent to power lines. Windbreaks should be extended beyond the area to be protected.

Species location is another consideration in planting windbreaks. For most effective results, a windbreak should contain at least three rows of trees. At least two of these rows should consist of evergreens. Evergreens are the backbone of the planting as they keep their leaves year-round. Hardwood trees are generally faster growing than evergreens and provide windbreak protection at an earlier age. If a windbreak consists of less than three rows, only evergreens should be used. Mixing hardwoods and evergreens within the same row is not recommended.

Planting method is also important for windbreak seedlings. A hole should be dug large enough to insert the roots without bending or crowding. The hole should be 2 to 4 inches deeper than the root length. The top of the root collar should be 1 to 2 inches below ground level. Topsoil should be added, and water added to settle the soil around the roots. The hole should be filled with topsoil and firmed around the roots.

The Wheeler County SWCD will again offer windbreak trees to anyone that wants them. For additional information about windbreak trees, contact the Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler.
