1-A Registrants Are Subject To Call After **90 Days From Physical**

Registrants, under new regulations just released, who have had and passed their pre-induction physical examinations will not be required to take another, even though 90 days have passed. If they are in Class 1-A, and subject to call, they will next receive an order to report for induction, when the board has calls which will include them. They will receive a physical checkup and go immediately into service if found acceptable, and not return home for another 21 days. Men who have not had the preinduction physical examination will, if accepted for service after such examination, be permitted to return home for the minimum of 21 days at least, before induction. This has not changed. Present calls have been low and, for the most part, have been filled with volunteers.

All Dogs In City Not Licensed By June 15 Will Be Kiiled

At the regular monthly meeting of the City Council last Thursday night the group directed the mayor to enforce the city ordinance prohibiting stray dogs from running at large in Wheeeler.

The City Council has been getting a great many complaints about the large number of stray dogs within the city which are a nuisance to the citizens and a constant potential source of a serious epidemic of rabies which is prevalent in some of the cities in this part of the state.

All dog owners are asked to take notice that after June 15 the City Marshall will proceed to kill all dogs that do not have a tax paid on them and are runnnig at large on the streets and alleys of Wheeler. The tax is \$1.00 per annum and may be paid at the office of the City Secretary. A tag will be issued and must be attached to a collar or harness

D-Day No Holiday For Wheelerites

No screeching sirens or steam whistles announced the beginning of the invasion to Wheelerites Monday night. Only a few who happened to have their radios on knew before morning that the liberation of Europe had begun. Most of the residents first heard the news when they turned on their radios at the regular time Tuesday morning.

When the news did get around all ears were turned to the radio. Most of the business houses that did not already have a radio brought one in that everyone might keep up with the progress made by Allied landing troops. Maps of the invasion coast were spread out on tables or tacked up on walls. Folks began to learn the correct pronunciation of Cherbourgh, Caen and Le Havre.

Most noticeable was the serene sobriety of expression on the faces of the people. Everyone was mostly concerned about the welfare of the men taking part in the invasion now that it had at long last begun. Many Wheeler county young men have been based in England for months and several of them, no doubt, were among the group that manned the mighty armada of four thousand ships and eleven thousand

planes across the English Channel. No holiday was declared in Wheeler, no stores were closed, no farmers took off from the very busy season of crop planting. Everyone seemed of the opinion that there was a messy job to be taken care of and now that the time had come, the sooner to get it over with the better.

5th War Loan To Be Launched With Free Show Monday

In Wheeler, as in the rest of the communities throughout the United States, the Fifth War Loan campaign will get under way Monday, June 12, and will continue for four weeks. Opening the local drive a motion picture with 50 minutes of battle action will be shown at the Wheeler High School Gymnasium at 8:30 next Monday, June 12.

Recuperating veterans who will appear here for the Fifth War Loan Show next Monday night are T Sgt. Richard F. Shepardson, radio operator and gunner with a bomber group. He saw action in the South Pacific and went on two previous missions, one over Wewak, met the enemy May 21 over Gasmate and was wounded that day, receiving wounds in the left thigh by two bullets and a flesh wound in the right leg. He is 23, married and lives at Springfield, Mass. His decorations include Silver Star, Purple Heart, Good Conduct and Southwest Pacific ribbon. With him will be Pfc. Clifford L. Collins of the Infantry. Many people who are buying property from or through loan companies are under the impression that the Loan Company renders their taxes for them. This is incorrect. Unless you have made the rendition yourself your taxes are unrendered.

The law states that your property must be rendered this month or such property will be placed on the UNREN-DERED ROLL and you will not be entitled to the HOME-STEAD privilege and will have to pay the STATE TAX.

The tax assessor office will try to see you, but if you are missed please call by the office, and the Tax Assessor-Collector will see that you are placed on the rendered roll.

NOTICE To Dog Owners

At the regular June meeting of the City Council, held June 1st, 1944, the Mayor was directed to enforce the ordinance duly enacted by the City in July 1925.

NOW, THEREFORE the interested citizens will take notice that from and after June 15th, 1944 the City Marshall will proceed to kill all dogs running at large on the streets and alleys of Wheeler that do not have a tax paid upon such dog as is required by the ordinance.

The tax is \$1.00 per annum. It may be paid at the office of the City Secretary. A tag will be issued which tag must be attached to collar or harness on the dog.
