Property Owners Are In Favor Of Needed Hardsurfacing

The city council in their regular monthly meeting last Thursday evening authorized Mayor R. H. Forrester to borrow locally an amount up to \$3,000 for paying for the city's part of paving down town streets in Wheeler.

All members of the county commissioner's court in their regular monthly session Monday signed an order for the paving of streets adjacent to the court house property. Expense of paving 4,029 square yards would be paid for by the county under the order with the total expenditure not to exceed \$2,000.

The Uvalde Construction Company, contractors now in charge of rebuilding highway 152 from the Wheeler-Gray county line to five miles east of Wheeler, has offered to pave the down town streets at a cost of approximately 47 cents per square yard. Type of paving would be similar to that being used on the highway.

Business property owners, who would pay for having their side of the street paved have manifested considerable enthusiasm over the prospects of at last getting the streets hardsurfaced.

In addition to paving around the court house, present plans indicate that the street running west from the southwest corner of the town square will be paved for a distance of one block and the street running south from the same intersection will be paved to the alley.
