Wheeler Red Cross Wins Gold Star Award Quota Set at \$2900

Liberal Contributions Needed To Meet Goal

Announcing that the Wheeler chapter had accepted a quota of \$2900 in the Red Cross War Fund drive that gets under way over the nation next week, Dr. H. E. Nicholson, chapter chairman, announced today the complete plans for the drive will be announced soon. Plans for a thorough canvas of Wheeler and surrounding communities will be outlined and chapter officials point out that regular "memberships" will be a thing of the past this year. It will take generous contributions from every citizen to insure that the Wheeler chapter meets its quota and in turn continues to carry its share of the local Red Cross burden, in addition to helping pay for the many valuable services offered by Red Cross on the war fronts.

As the global conflict grows in intensity, and the crucial stage of the war is at hand, the American Red Cross is "stepping up" its activities to keep pace with the growing needs of the Armed Forces.

The American Red Cross now has men and women workers with troops in fifty-three strategic continental and insular areas. In Europe, Africa, and the fronts of the Far East, Red Cross workers either went into the theatres with invasion forces or else followed within a short time.

Service to the armed forces are not confined to the activities of Red Cross workers abroad, for practically every chapter in America is engaged Home Service assistance, in collecting blood, or in some activity for members of the Armed Forces.

Meek, Wheeler insurance man, announced this week that he had been informed by the State Fire Furman Voil Green, William Ray Insurance Commissioner that Wheeler will retain its good fire record credit of 25 per cent to apply to fire insurance premiums written in Wheeler for 12 months beginning good for buying processed foods run March 1.

This will result in a direct saving on fire insurance as 25 per cent of the normal premium will be deducted on policies written during the coming year.

DR. HAROLD G. COOKE, president of McMurry College of Abilene, announces that no campaign in the history of the Methodist church in West Texas and New Mexico has ever met with such approval and general response as has the \$1,750,000 Endowment and Building Fund Campaign for the college which is now under way in this area.

To ask an Endowment Fund of \$1,000,000.00 for a college and at the same time to build four great new buildings at a cost of \$750,-000.00 is unprecedented in both magnitude and vision for the possibilities of a Christian educational institution, the college president states.

Both the importance and magnitude of the program caught the imagination of the Methodist people of West Texas and New Mexico. The annual conferences and district meetings endorsed the program, and conference allotments. district quotas, and church goals were voluntarily set to cover the entire amount.

A number of churches have already reached or exceeded their goals in the campaign and many others are just about "over the top." Quota placed on the Clarendon district is \$60,000. Last week Kelton and Wheeler Methodists had pledged \$1,289.50 in support of the fund.

It is suggested that Series "F" and "G" bonds be given to the fund in lieu of cash or subscriptions, thus enabling the donors to serve both their country and their church at one and the same time.



County Voters Are Fewer This Year

Both Local Precincts Will Have More Votes

According to figures released this week from the office of T. L. Gunter, county tax assessor and collector, 1943 poll tax collections are slightly under the usual state and national election year.

Comparison of figures reveals a net loss of 197 electors this year compared with 1941. Of these 155 are of the poll tax group and 42 in exemptions

This, of course, is not unexpected after taking in consideration the large number of men from this county in the armed forces and those who have moved out of the county to seek other employment.

Though there are less paid polls in the county, both Wheeler boxes show substantial increases over two years





Sugar stamp No. 40 in War Ration Book IV, good for five pounds of sugar for home canning became valid February 1, and will remain good through February 28, 1945 according to an announcement made by the Office of Price Administration.

OPA officials state that the allow ance will be a part of the total allowance for 1944 canning season. At present, it is contemplated, that the maximum allowance will be twentyfive pounds with stamp No. 40 good for five pounds and the remaining twenty pounds will be obtainable by application at the local War Price and Rationing Board.

Gasoline - In 17 East Coast states A-9 coupons are good through May 8. In states outside the East Coast area, A-10 coupons are good through March 21.

Tire Inspection Deadlines - For A-coupon holders, March 31, and for B and C coupon holders, February 28

Fuel Oil - Period 3 coupons are good through March 13 in all areas except the South. Period 4 coupons are good in all areas through September 30. Period 5 coupons are good in the Middle West and South and remain good through September 30. Shoes - Stamp No. 18 in book one and No. 1 on the airplane sheet in book three are each good for one pair.

Income Tax --- March 15 is deadline filing returns. Earlier filing is desirable



DON'T PLOW UP YOUR GAS LINE

The gas company is responsible only for the delivery of gas at "the mouth of the meter."

Paragraph nine, of our contract with you, provides that, "The consumer is liable to pay for all gas passing through the meter, whether used or wasted, through leaks in pipes, apparatus or otherwise."

We have heretofore been very tolerant in cases of this kind, and expect to continue so. But on account of labor shortage, you are going to find it hard to get your line repaired just when you want it, in case you plow it up, it is not our responsibility, and we have more than we can do most of the time.

If you own your own premises, see that your gas line is buried at least 18 to 24 inches, otherwise, heat and cold causing contraction and expansion, will gradually work your gas line to the top of the ground.

In many cases where lines were buried deep, wind and water have shifted the top soil and exposed them.

Since starting our victory garden program, we are plowing up patches around our houses which were never plowed before. Few of the gas lines in Wheeler are buried deep enough.

If you have recently moved to a rented place, or bought a new home, don't turn a man or boy loose on your premises with a plow, without showing him where the gas line is. If you do not know where it is, have him take a shovel and locate it before he starts plowing.

If the line is buried shallow, have it buried deep, or never plow across the line.



Speed Pressure Cooker Repairs Start now, before March if possible, to have any repairs done on a steam pressure cooker and have the gauge tested so it will be in order for home canning season. At the recent National Food Preservation Conference in Chicago, pressure canner manufacturers stated that they can handle such jobs much faster right now before production of canners gets into full swing. Canners put in order now will be ready for the first spring vegetables.

The national conference went on record as recommending the steam pressure method for home canning all the low-acid vegetables, that is all common vegetables except tomatoes and the vegetables pickled before canning. The War Production Board has authorized the manufacture of 400,000 new pressure cookers this year. But every old pressure cooker that can be put into good shape to preserve food for civilians will be needed also on the food front.

Repair parts will be obtainable for all standard make of pressure canners, manufacturers state. Before sending a gauge to a manufacturer because it seems inaccurate, check to see that the opening of the gauge is clean. A toothpick can be used. Also, check to see that the safety ley, Franklin J. Allen and Theodore valve is working right. Many gauges register inaccurately because the safety valve of the cooker is clogged Pampa, Texas. with grease or food. This can be rem-
