Plan Extension Of **Power Service To** Wheeler Farms

Applications Being Taken By Greenbelt Coop.

Extension of electric power service to the farms of Wheeler and Gray counties during the period immediately following the winning of the war was announced today by Orval Couch, manager of the Greenbelt Electric Co-op. Inc., with headquarters in Wellington.

Although no farm homes are now being served in Wheeler and Gray counties by this co-operative, applications are now being taken for electric service and lines will be built if sufficient interest is shown, Mr. Couch said.

In outlining the program now under way he pointed out that in addition to providing electric power for the two counties not now served by the rural electrification program, it will mean long extensions in the three Texas counties already receiv- the action of the Democratic Priming Greenbelt service.

HIGHWAY WORKERS DUE PRAISE FOR WORK DONE DURING SNOW BLIZZARD

State highway workers of Wheeler county deserve a bit of praise for their untiring efforts in keeping the county's highways open during the blizzard Friday, Friday night and Saturday.

The crew "stuck to their guns" despite the near zero temperatures and howling wind storm that drove the powdery snow drifting across the pavement. Working with trucks, trucks equipped with snow plows and maintainers, the crew of men began their patrol Friday when roads started to become blocked and kept up their vigil until into the night Saturday, when highways were cleared and the crew was sure that no lives were being endangered by cars being stalled along the roadways. One employe told of the gasoline line of his truck freezing, the battery running down and having to shovel out after getting in snow banks.

1943 One Of Best Years For Local **Farmers From Finance Viewpoint**

Indicating that 1943 was one of the best years that Wheeler farmers have experienced from a financial viewpoint, records in county clerk Harry Wofford's office show that farmers paid off 56 Federal Land Bank loans, 21 Land Bank Commissioners loans and 15 Home Owners Loans and obtained deeds of trust to their property last year. These and several other important statistics pertaining to the clerk's office were revealed in a speech made by Wofford to the Shamrock Men's Booster Club Wednesday of last

1,396 instruments were recorded in the deed and deeds of trust records during the year. There were only 30 criminal cases filed compared to 73 in 1942; civil cases filed numbered 16; marriage licenses issued, 107; 378 current birth certificates were recorded; 87 death certificates recorded; 199 corrected birth certificates recorded; 168 brands recorded; 1,200 chattel mortgages were filed and recorded; 289 delayed birth certificates were filed; 24 estates probated; 19 discharges from this war and 2

from the last war were recorded. The files in the clerk's office consist of 108 volumes of deed records, 26 volumes of deeds of trusts, 3 volumes of abstract of judgment records, 2 volumes of Lis Pendens notices, 21 volumes of chattel mortgage records, 3 volumes of bills of sale, 8 volumes of probate minutes, 3 volumes of county court proceedings and 7 of commissioners court proceedings.

An average of 200 warrants are issued monthly by the clerk. The monthly payroll, excluding the tax collectors office and county superintendent, is \$2,426.63. In addition to this approximately \$1,000 is paid monthly to precinct workers.

Each Person Asked To Purchase At Least Extra \$100 Bond

On next Tuesday, the 18th of January, America's Fourth War Loan

Wheeler county's quota in the 14billion dollar nation-wide drive is \$363,000. Of this amount, small buyers are asked to subscribe \$173,000 worth of E Series, R. J. Holt, county war bond chairman, announces. Wheeler county fell \$168,000 short of buying its assessed quota of \$488,000 worth of bonds in the Third War Loan in September. The First and Second War Loans were over subscribed. Announcement of county committees and perfection of an organization to put the county drive into motion had not been made yesterday but is expected to be announced

The Fourth War Loan is the largest of all war loans in terms of individual participation.

And - it is, perhaps the most important of all War Loans. For it comes at a time when the eyes of all the world are upon us; the eyes of our friends, the eyes of our enemies, the eyes of our own fighting men.

We have just entered the crucial year of the war, a year of destiny, a year that promises to decide how good or bad a world we'll have to live in all the rest of our lives. And the world is wondering how deeply we mean it when we promise our men we'll back their attack, and when we promise our Allies we'll stick with them not only through the winning of the war but through

the winning of the peace as well.

The Fourth War Loan is the home front's first big test of this new and vital year. It will take unity and determination of will of all the people to make the Loan succeed.

DAIRY PRODUCTION **PAYMENT EXTENDED**

The War Food Administration has announced the continuance of dairy production payment through January to help farmers maintain the output of milk and other dairy products at high wartime levels. The payments, in effect since October, are designated to offset the rising production cost since September 1942, and to effect a more favorable price ration for the Doing away with all post-induction production of milk and dairy pro-

The dairy payments on October production started November 1. Through December 18, Texas producers have received \$475,130 for a total production of 93,944,600 pounds of milk and 1,067,505 pounds of butter fat. The number of producers who received payments totaled 34,-

Wheeler county producers received \$2,101.84 in dairy feed payments for the month of October and drafts have been issued to date for \$1,747.63 for the months of November and December and applications are being received daily.

Producers are asked to keep records for January as they have in the past three months, and payment will be made at the same rate as it has been in previous months.

Directors Of Canadian Valley Production Credit Association Plan For 10th Anniversary Jan.22

The tenth anniversary of the Canadian Valley Production Credit Association will be celebrated at the association's annual stockholders' meeting to be held on January 22, at the High School Auditorium, in Canadian, Texas, C. W. Allen, Secretary-Treasurer announced following a meeting of the board of directors.

During the past ten years, approximately 2,000 loans plus numerous advances have been made and the total amount loaned during this time is over nine million dollars, made to finance sound farm and ranch operations in the six counties served by the association.

At this tenth anniversary meeting, which will begin at 11 a. m., the stockholders will hear reports on the Deferments for students who will progress and financial position of their association. They will learn cuss further improvements needed. They will also elect a director.

The farmer and rancher members will be celebrating the building in ten years, of a special credit institution of their own, which has a local capital structure of over \$156,000.00,

Nationwide Drive To Smash Gasoline Black Market Started

The aid of banks in the Lubbock district of the Office of Price Administration is being enlisted in a new nationwide drive to smash the black market in gasoline, it was disclosed today by Owen W. McWhorter, chief OPA enforcement attorney.

He reported a strong appeal has been directed to all banks where gasoline ration coupons are deposited by suppliers of gasoline who collect gummed sheets of gas ration coupons from filling station oper-

"The gasoline rationing program, for a number of reasons, has recently attracted the attention of a sizable number of racketeers and petty chiselers," OPA's appeal to the banks

Thefts and counterfeiting of coupons in some areas have reached alarming proportions. In an eastern city, for example, a counterfeit ring was recently uncovered; it had passed enough counterfeit coupons to supply gasoline to take 1,000 bombers over Berlin in five raids. "We are now engaged in a drive to stamp out these practices."

The Lubbock district's ration bank executive, Oscar J. Walker, disclosed simultaneously that all banks in this district have been called on to observe strictly two simple rules to strengthen gasoline ration enforcement. He listed the rules as follows:

Few Food Retailers Have Filed Applications For Ration Tokens

Most banks in the Lubbock OPA District have reported that only a small percentage of food retailers has filed applications necessary for the issuance of new ration tokens, which will be supplied by OPA and Mrs. J. C. Adams. through the banks next February, it was reported today by J. Doyle Settle, rationing executive for this dis-

"It is very necessary that the banks have these applications so that they will be able to secure and supply all tokens to consumers through the retailers," said the rationing executive, adding "The manufacture and distribution of two billion tokens are tasks that stagger the imagniation, and unless all retailers file their requests in sufficient time, there is danger that when the token plan is put into effect, many retailers will e without these necessary means to carry on their business. Retailers, therefore, are urged to fill in these forms immediately and to present them to their banks.'

While the original deadline for filing these applications was December 15, retailers may obtain necessary forms through wholesalers and submit them immediately in order not to be left out of the new program, Settle pointed out.
