

MUSTANGS PLAY HAPPY IN ZONE PLAYOFFS

The long road to the state finals in Texas schoolboy football begins this week and the Wheeler Mustangs and Happy Cowboys meet at River Road Friday night on the first leg of the journey.

Wheeler reaches the 7:30 kickoff by virtue of winning District 1-1A North for the fifth straight time and Happy got into the playoffs by being second place team in District 1-1A South.

The Mustangs sport a 7-2 season record and a perfect 4-0 in district play and have had two weeks to prepare for this first encounter. The Vega

Longhorns, whom the Mustangs defeated early in the year are district champs of the south zone and will play the Follett Panthers, also a victim of the Black Machine, Friday night in Sunray.

Happy will be the second wishbone team the Mustangs have faced recently as the Booker Kiowas also ran this ground eating offense. Most wishbone teams don't have a very good passing attack but head coach Preston Smith said this week, "Happy will lull you to sleep and then hit you with a big pass play."

It has been a long time since the Mustangs and Cowboys have faced each other. Back in the early 70's, these two clubs were district rivals. Happy has to take a beat seat to Wheeler when it comes to playoff experience as the Mustangs have been in a lot of playoff wars in the past decade.

The Mustangs should be in great shape injury wise but they have been bothered the past week with minor sickness that seems to be traveling through the area.

"Happy is a well coached ball club with big linemen and good quick backs that can hurt you out of the wishbone," Smith said. "they will be tough because any time you get into the state playoffs, you have to be pretty good."

The Cowboys will use a 4-3 Pro type defense that is quite similar to the Mustangs defensive alignment. The Mustangs scouts say that when Happy wants to or is forced to put the ball in the air that most of the time they will break the 'bone to throw.

A lot of people didn't think that the Mustangs would be where they are now early in the season but this team just bowed it's neck and continued the great traditions of Wheeler Mustangs football.

"Our kids worked hard and they deserve to be where they are and are anxious to get the playoffs underway," Smith said during midweek preparations for the Cowboys.

Postal Service Issues Quarterly Ser. Report

Express Mail on-time delivery performance for the fourth quarter of Fiscal Year 1987 was 97.4 percent, the Postal Service reported here today.

"This performance establishes a new all-time high for Express Mail service for any recorded quarter," said John G. Mulligan, Senior Assistant Postmaster General for Operations Support, in a report to the Postal Service's Board of Governors. The report covered the period from June 6 to September 25, 1987.

"In addition to this excellent record," added Mulligan, "for the final accounting period of the year, from August 29 through September 25, we reached 97.8 percent on-time delivery of Express Mail, a record for any four-week accounting period."

In the overnight category for stamped First-Class Mail, on-time service levels during Quarter V remained at 96 percent for the seventh consecutive year. Overnight metered mail was delivered within standards 93 percent of the time, higher than the fourth quarter of any previous year. First-Class metered mail performance has shown a one point improvement each year over the past five years.

There was a slight decline for the quarter in two-day and three-day delivery of stamped First-Class Mail, Mulligan reported.

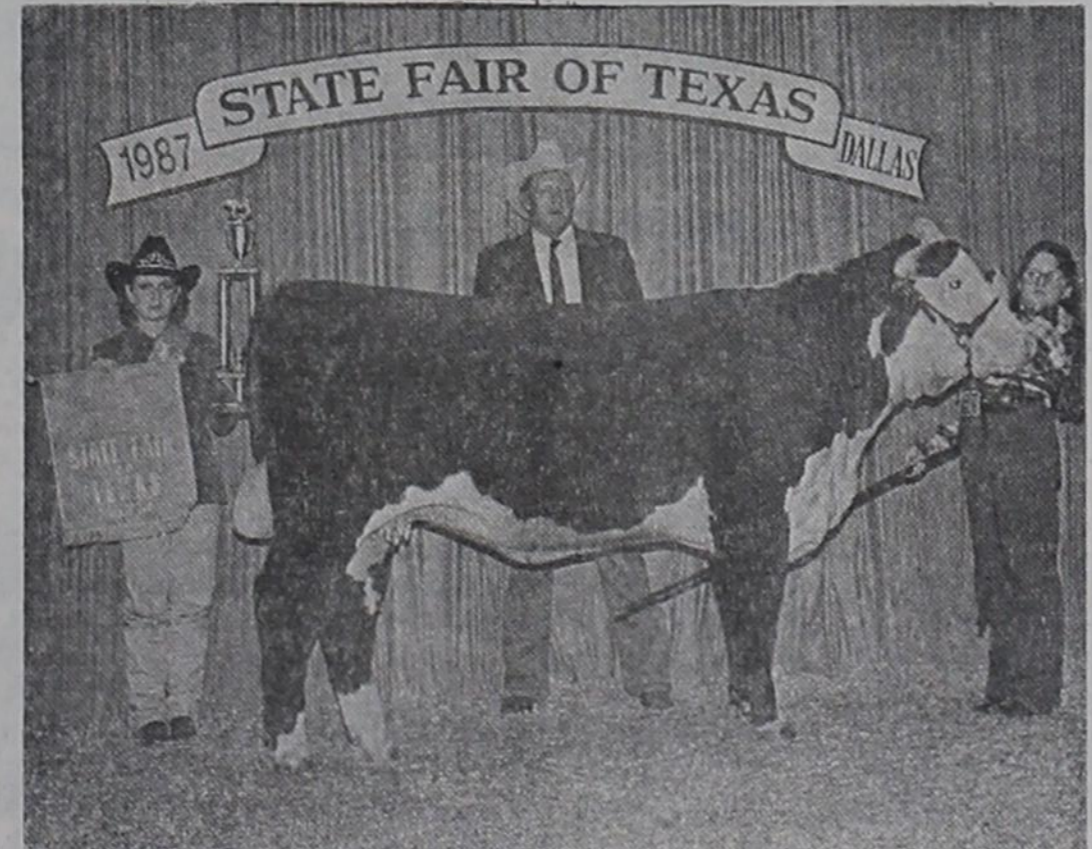
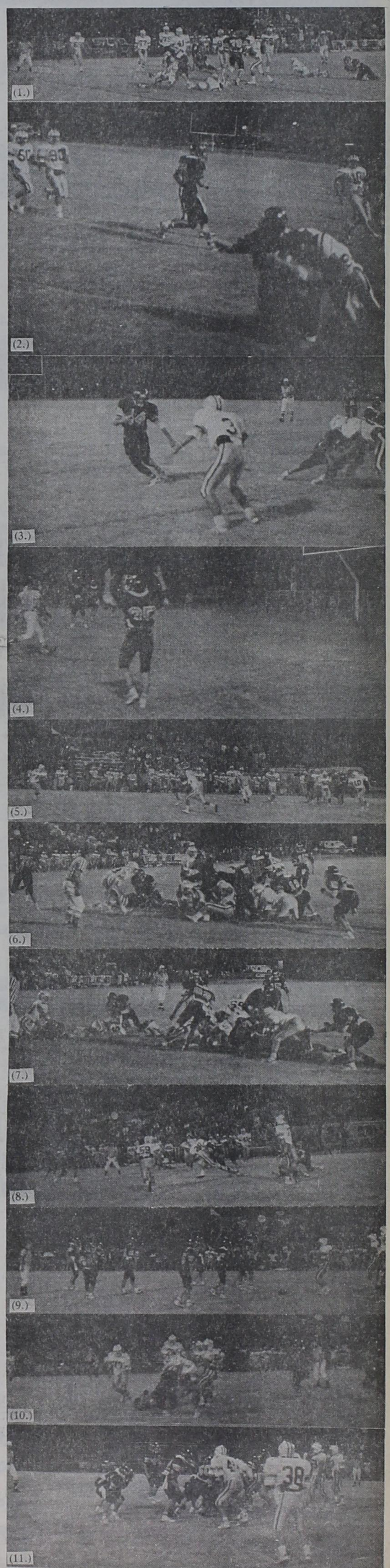
