INDUSTRIAL FOOD USERS TO RE-REGISTER DECEMBER 15 TO JANUARY 5

of rationed foods will be asked to reported sunk by a Jap sub. re-register with their local War Price and Rationing Boards, J. Doyle Settle, district rationing executive, announced today. This registration will be made on the new form R-1200, which is a consolidation of the former sugar form R-130, the processed foods form R-1308, and the meats form R-1605.

The purpose of this re-registration is to combine the allocations of all rationed foods on one form rather than on the three forms heretofore used. This will permit uniform application of the Regulations to all industrial users of rationed foods. will permit the issuance of all allocations of rationed foods at one time instead of at three times as heretofore has been the case, Settle said.

After this initial re-registration between Dec. 15 and Jan. 5, allocations will be granted for three months at a time on all rationed foods, the rationing executive pointed out. This will eliminate trips to the Board at different dates, and will enable the industrial user to plan his purchases and use of rationed foods

on a uniform basis. Engineers were here Tuesday to begin installation of equipment but are waiting until Monday when sufficient material is expected to arrive.



KEEPING YOUR WASHER "ON THE JOB"

Don't let your laundry problem get out of hand. If you are the fortunate owner of an electric washer in good condition, keep it that way. You can't buy a new one these days and repair parts are so scarce that a major repair may require weeks of waiting.

CHECK YOURSELF ON THESE POINTS

- 1 Don't overload the washer. Fill the tub only to the water line and add clothes to the washer's capacity, and no more.
- When you finish washing, fill tub with clear water, remove the agitator, then drain tub and wipe inside clean with a soft cloth. Don't let dirty water stand in tub overnight.
- 3 Don't overload the wringer. The rolls are rubber, and doubledup blankets, buckles, and heavy buttons may damage the rolls.
- 4 Clean and dry wringer after use and leave in neutral position so pressure is off the rolls.
- 5 Empty drain hose thoroughly after each use. Avoid sharp bends.
- 6 A noisy washer may be a washer in need of expert attention. Call a qualified service man if washer does not operate properly.

Doubling up on lamps conserves light!



By arranging furniture, one lamp can often serve two or more people effectively. But be sure that the lamp isn't too far away from either person.

OTHER WAYS TO CONSERVE EYESIGHT AND LIGHT

- 1 Clean lamp bowls and lamp bulbs regularly. Dry thoroughly before using.
- 2 Keep shade linings light. Clean or brush regularly. Repaint or reline dark-colored paper or parchment shades.
- 3 Sit close enough to the lamp to get all the help it can give
- 4 Avoid direct glare from lamp bulbs or bowl by using shades deep enough and big enough.
- 5 Have eyes examined regu-larly by a competent eyesight





According to statistical information gathered by A. E. Tomhave, head of the poultry and animal industry department of the University of Delaware, poultry leads all live stock in efficiency as regards gain in meat per pound of grain feed. Prof. Tomhave's recent report shows that a 2-lb. broiler consumes 3.25 pounds of feed per pound of gain, whereas a 200-lb. hog consumes 4 pounds, and an 85-lb. cattle takes 6.60 pounds. Ducks are said to come second to small broilers, with large broilers third. Four-pound roasters consume 4.25 pounds of feed per pound of gain, turkeys 4.50 pounds, 530lb. hogs 4.75 pounds, sheep 6.50 pounds of grain for each pound of gain to attain a weight of 84 pounds, and an 8-lb. capon 7.50 pounds. Varying factors to be considered in any such estimates are the quality of the feed, health and vigor of the animals, and weather conditions.


