Because of the infantile paralysis epidemic last summer and fall, people are more conscious of the disease. Around 12,000 cases were reported last year. These cases will require treatment for months and in many instances for years, national headquarters reports.

Climax of the national campaign was the birthday of President Roosevelt on Jan. 30 as usual. The president is the nation's most important victim of the disease, having been stricken about 20 years ago.

If inflation is kept down and we can reasonably concentrate upon winning the war as soon as possible in order to get back to a more normal living, then it will take ALL of us to put the thing across. Labor conscripted means more of sacrifice, but how little we really have sacrificed in comparison to other nations at war. The National Service Act is a drastic measure, but those boys who are anxious to get back home can tell you that war is a drastic business itself! If only the factions would stop name-calling and decide to work together on what is best for the American people, it would shorten the war and save lives. We stress "equality" in our land but shy away from it when it comes to bearing the burdens and sacrifices of the fight

Eighty per cent live in the rural districts and are crowded into one-third the area have probably felt that all was rice in China when, as a matter of fact she used and produces more wheat than do we with soybeans, sweet potatoes and cabbages more than rice. Rich in minerals and ores, still its greatest asset along this line is its intelligent, industrious and democratic man-power. We have felt China was backward because its culture did not keep up with the rapid pace of the rest of the world. Through the outside. English has now found second place in the language of the country. Chinese women are taking their place with men in business. Newspapers, radios and movies are making them more social conscious. China is a rich country in its system of waterways but in order to develop them for modern usage it will take millions of dollars. Railroads could reach into the heavily populated territory and improve the opportunities of the people and of capital. It is a vast subject, this China, with such possibilities for greatness that the whole future history of the world may have a bearing upon the Chinese influence. It is a country to be developed, helped, understood and above all-respected.

Assistant Agent Advises To Treat Now For Heal Flies

Peace Declared

There will be peace next spring at heel fly time if you treat your cattle now for grubs. This may seem to be a very small matter but did you Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Mayfield.

Approximately 840,000 animals slaughtered in Texas each year are infested with grubs. An average of two pounds of meat is trimmed from each grubby carcass, and after trimming, the loins and ribs are devalued two cents per pound. This trimming causes a loss of 1,680,000 pounds of Texas beef, enough to feed 4,600 soldiers for one year. Cattle grubs cuts holes through the thickest, best part of the hide, causing a reduction of one cent per pound and the loss of enough leather to furnish shoes for 1,000,000 soldiers one year. Grubs cause an average loss of \$3.86 per 'grubby animal" in the packing plant alone, and as a result these animals

In addition to meat and leather losses, heel flies and grubs cause as production in dairy cows and other estimate. The total loss to cattle pro-

Treatment

Sulphur-rotenone dust-Mix equal parts of sulphur and either derris or cube containing 5 per cent rotenone. Apply with a quart fruit jar having about 25 quarter-inch holes in the lid. The holes should be punched from the inside so that the dust mixture will flow freely without shaking. Shaking creates a dust cloud that is irritating to the eyes and nose of the operator. One pound of the mixture will treat about 15 head of cattle. The first treatment should be made when the oldest grubs are about mature and dark brown in color. Applications should be repeated every 30 days as long as grubs are present. Three treatments are usually necessary. Practical for any size herd.

Wash - Mix three-fourths of a pound derris or cube containing 5 per cent rotenone with one-half pound of wettable sulphur. Add one gallon of water and mix thoroughly. Apply with sprinkler jar and scrub thoroughly with a stiff bristled brush. Repeat applications as for dust. Practical for 100 animals or less.

Spray - Mix 5 pounds derris or cube containing 5 per cent rotenone with 10 pounds of wettable sulphur. Add to 100 gallons of water and mix thoroughly. Apply with a power sprayer at 250 to 300 pounds pressure. Repeat applications as for dust. Practical for any number of animals.




