**A MAN NAMED LINCOLN**

Abraham Lincoln, whose birthday anniversary the world observes this week, is perhaps more typical of the American hero than any other. Born in a log cabin and beginning his life as a farm laborer, the lanky American nevertheless became one of the world's greatest champions of freedom and liberty.

Contrary to the belief of many, Lincoln was an outstanding man in his community

long before being elected President. His nomination by the Republican Party in 1860, instead of being the result of a comparative unknown, capped a brilliant career, which had begun when Lincoln was chosen captain of a company of volunteers in the Black Hawk Indian War.

When he returned from the campaign, he became a partner in a general store and was also postmaster and a deputy surveyor. He was elected to the State Legislature of Illinois, when he was twenty-five years old. He opened a law office when he was thirty, having been licensed only two years before. He was elected to Congress in 1846, when he was only thirty-seven years old. Three times he was a Presidential elector in Illinois and, he was nominated for the U. S. Senate by the Republicans to run against Stephen A. Douglas, the Democratic candidate. His series of speeches in this campaign lifted him into the national consciousness.

In February, 1860, he made an address in Cooper Union, New York, which speech was to play a large part in his nomination for the Presidency at the Convention at Chicago, 1860. He was elected President in 1860 and in 1864, but was shot down brutally in Ford's Theater, in Washington, in 1865.

His patience, gentle-manner and far-reaching vision enabled him to guide the country through the disastrous war of 1861-65. Though soft-spoken, Lincoln was nevertheless unmovable on matters of principle, never wavering in his courageous efforts to hold the Union together.

In the end, he not only succeeded, but succeeded with the admiration of all sections of the country and world, and his death brought genuine sorrow, not only in the North but in the South—which would have fared far better in the reconstruction days to come had Lincoln survived.

As a national figure, no one, with the exception of George Washington, has been able to equal his fame and hold on the hearts of the American public. No finer tribute can be paid to his memory than is being paid each day at the Lincoln Memorial, in Washington, D. C.—where humble visitors, at all hours of the day and night, silently read his immortal words on the freedom and dignity of man.

**RETAIL SALES OFF**

It appears that retail sales over the nation are stabilizing at about sixteen percent below 1951 levels. Informed sources indicate there is no reason to expect any immediate substantial change for the better in the comparative sales figures.

One of the explanations as to why retail sales are below last year's figures is the fact that last year, during January and February, there was considerable scare-buying as a result of the intervention of the Chinese Communists in the Korean war.

Speaking of spots—holiday parties usually leave some depressing stains on your Sunday-best table linen. To take out coffee or tea, rub the spots with glycerine. Let stand a few minutes and wash. Fruit stains may be removed by pouring boiling water over the spot from a height of two feet. All fruit stains must be removed before washing the linen or soap may set the stain.

Children's sweaters don't have the hand-me-down look when with all-purpose dye they're converted into a bright beautiful new color with a personal touch added. Simple embroidery down the front is a dainty finish for a young girl's sweater. A wool applique football is fine for a boy's.

Dry wet woollens in a warm room but not too near heat. That goes for wet leather shoes, too. When woollens are dry brush with a soft but firm-bristled clothes brush. When wet shoes are dry brush off dirt and give a thorough polishing with a good wax-liquid or paste polish.

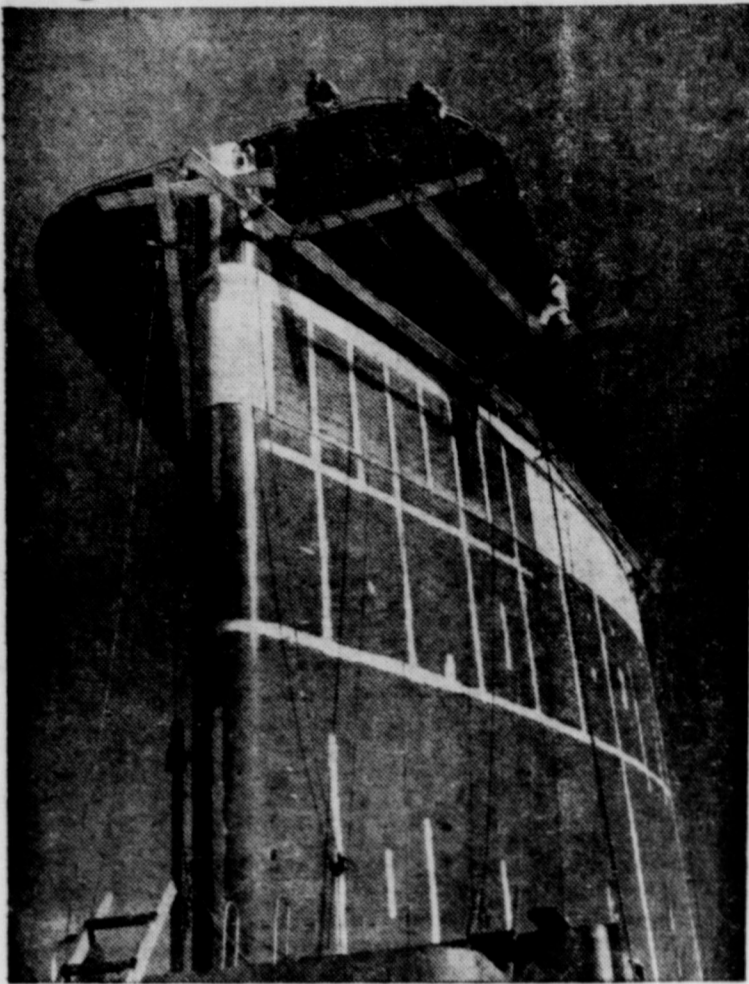

### Largest Stacks In World Get a Grooming



Painters working 175 feet above the keel of the new superliner United States looked dwarfed by one of the two giant stacks which are 60 feet long and 55 feet high. The "sampan" top which serves to deflect exhaust up and away from the sun and sports decks is a distinctive feature of both the United States and the America, present flagship of the United States Lines. The stacks are made entirely of aluminum and sections are held together by 65,000 aluminum rivets. The 990 foot liner, the largest ever built in America and the most modern passenger ship in the world, will compete in speed with the fastest foreign flagships now in service. More than 85% complete, the United States, being built at the Newport News (Va.) Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company yard, will make her maiden voyage from New York to Havre and Southampton July 3 in the United States Lines' transatlantic service.

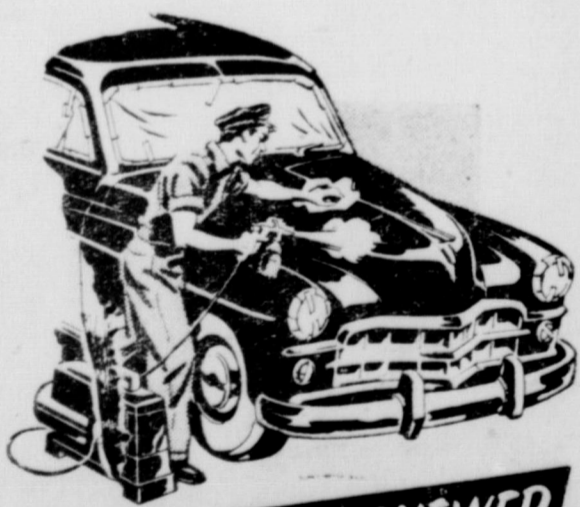

### CANCER DEATH RATE IS HIGH

"While the span of human life has been lengthened 10 years during the last four decades, the disturbing fact remains that there has been a marked rise in death from cancer during the same period," declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, and urged that the public be on the alert to detect this disease.

"Cancer is not a hopeless, incurable disease. It is not contagious or in itself hereditary. There are thousands of men and women in this country who have been successfully treated for cancer. The great hope of cancer patients lies in their having treatment during the first stages of the disease. Cancer announces itself by symptoms that the frequently painless and apparently trivial, thus giving the disease an unseemly advantage. Early diagnosis is the one

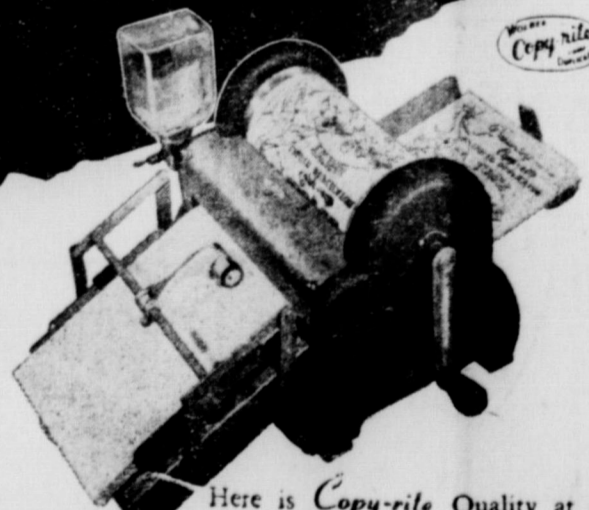

3 to 5 tablespoons cold water

Sift together flour and salt. Cut or rub in shortening. Add water. Mix into a dry, crumbly dough. Toss on floured pastry cloth. Roll and fold until smooth. Roll about 1/8 inch thick. Cut with 3-inch biscuit cutter. Place one pastry round on bottom of each 3-inch muffin cup. Line sides of muffin cup by overlapping 5 pastry rounds around each muffin cup, setting the rounds on edge. Press edges of pastry on sides firmly to edges of pastry on bottom. Prick with fork. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) 8 to 10 minutes. Cool. Fill with Cherry Filling. Makes 6 Cherry Baskets.

1/2 cup sugar  
2 tablespoons cornstarch  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 cups cherry juice or water

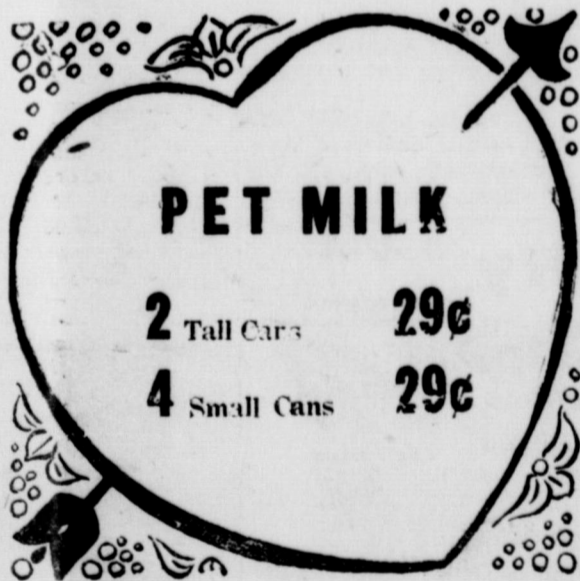

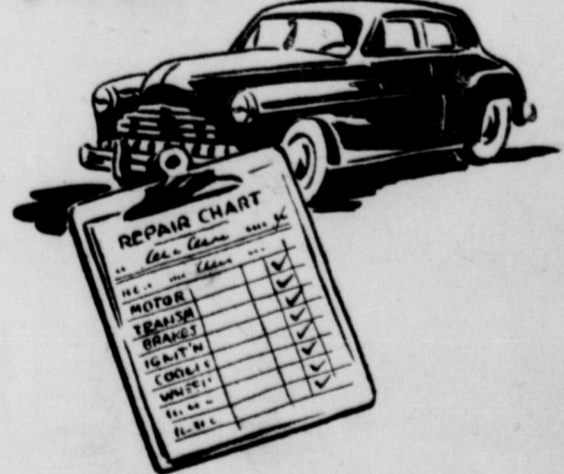

**What Do You Know About Your Local Soil C. S. District**

Do you know what the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District is? Many people do not understand the working of the district. The soil conservation district in Wheeler County offers the best way yet devised to help farmers conserve their land and water resources. The soil conservation districts are organized and operated by farmers within the district.

This organization also means dollars in the pockets of the farmer and prosperity to his community as well as stimulate community initiative, which is the key to successful conservation. Soil conservation districts are made possible by your own state laws, Bill no. 444 of 1941, and are farmer voted, farmer organized, and administered by farmers. They

also operate independently of any federal law or regulation and are strictly non-political. Soil conservation districts do not handle such federal agricultural programs as marketing agreements, marketing quotas, acreage allotments, and crop insurance. The above programs are administered locally by your county PMA committee.

Lots of people would be interested in how a soil conservation district is organized. First off, a petition is drawn up by at least twenty-five land owners and operators asking the State Soil Conservation Committee to approve the organization of a district under the State Soil Conservation Law. Then the State Committee holds a hearing within the proposed district so that anyone interested may say what he thinks about the organization of a district. Each land owner is entitled to vote "yes" or "no." If the district is approved by a majority vote, the State issues a certificate of organization. The State Committee then holds an election of district governing body.

Soil Conservation districts are a practical device through which farmers and ranchers are taking the initiative to conserve our soil and water resources. At one time, demonstration projects were set up over the country to show the farmer the advantages of soil and water conservation. It soon became obvious, however, that some method other than demonstration projects would have to be used. Each farmer was different and presented individual erosion control problems. Many of you found difficulty in knowing what conservation measures you needed, and then how to apply them and maintain them. The demonstrational approach was not enough. A device was needed to place the primary responsibility for soil and water conservation where it belonged—with the farmers and ranchers. Even though the government and others could support the work, the actual job has to be done by you farmers and ranchers on your own land.

The government had to start the work of water and soil conservation, but when you as farmers and ranchers become aware of your needs, the district was born. The soil conservation district—farmer organized and farmers operated—is the device that you farmers and ranchers are using to accept your responsibilities in soil and water conservation. As you accept these responsibilities the government accepts the position of assistant to you, and provides you with such technical help and guidance as you needed to do the job right.

The soil conservation district provides for a partnership between farmers and ranchers and those public and private agencies concerned with the conservation of our land and water resources.

Soil conservation districts are in business to help land owners and operators plan, apply, and maintain conservation on their land. The districts request and receive help from public agencies—local, state, and federal—and from private sources.

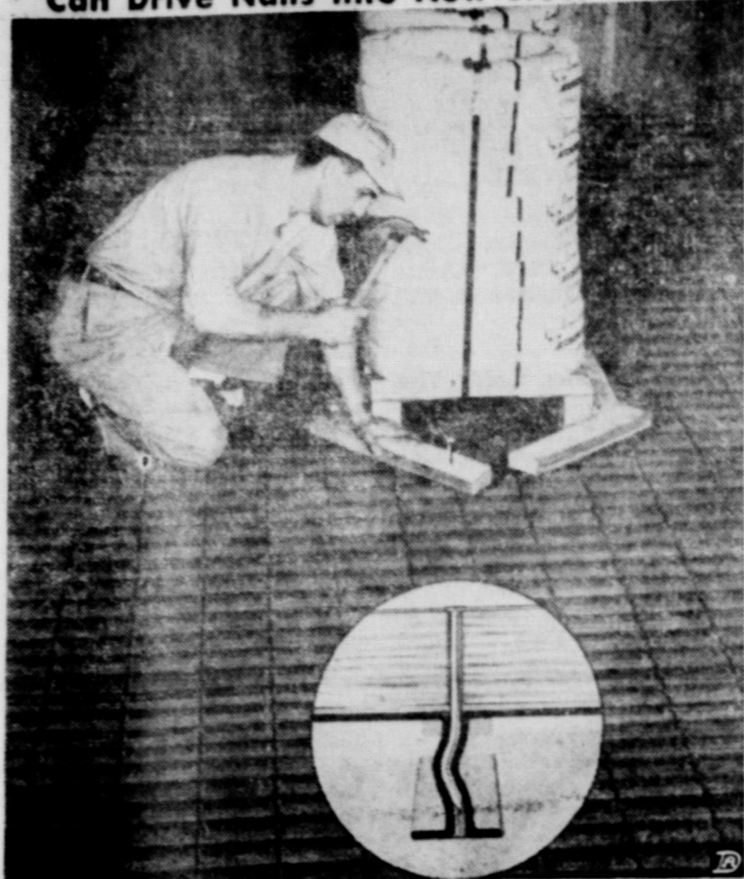
How do you get help from your soil conservation district? Well, first you contact any of the Wheeler County District 141 supervisors, who are Willard Rogers, Clarence Zybach, Dusan Pakan, Clifford Waiser, and Billy Cantrell. If you can't locate any of these fellows, come by the county agent's office or the local soil conservation office to get help. Also, the PMA office. Then state your problem. This problem will be put down and will be acted on by the district supervisors. After it is approved, the application goes to the Soil Conservation Service technicians, who will assist the district to make a capability map or recommendation of your land. This inventory is an acre by acre analysis of the capability of the land for safe, permanent production. This capability is determined by such factors as the kind of soil, slope of land, depth of topsoil, degree of erosion and climate. These findings are charted on a map of the farm and this information is used to determine the best use that can be made of each acre and the conservation practices each acre needs to keep it permanently productive.

At this stage, you farmers, with assistance of a technician, have

the facts to work out a conservation plan for your farm. You decide what acres you want to use for different crops as well as what crops you want to grow. You may find that some of your cropland would grow grass or legumes better. In many cases, you find that more livestock and less crops would be better for the land and still make you a profit. You also determine the conservation measures each acre needs, and then when and how to apply them. In other words, the conservation plan should serve as a blueprint for your farming operations. This plan can't be put into effect in a single year, so you will then schedule the year-by-year application of its various parts as you are willing.

The Wheeler County Soil Conservation District 141 owns the following equipment: six grass and legume drills, five brush beaters, five carry-alls and one land-leveler. This equipment may be used by the cooperators at a fee that is intended to pay for repairs and depreciation. Since there is about three hundred cooperators with governing body has agreed to

Any farmer or rancher can be a member of the organization, by agreeing to save his soil to the best of his ability and treating it according to its needs. You can be a member of the soil conservation district by signing an initial agreement which means that you can do any single practice during any year such as sow or seeding one, or more acres to grass.

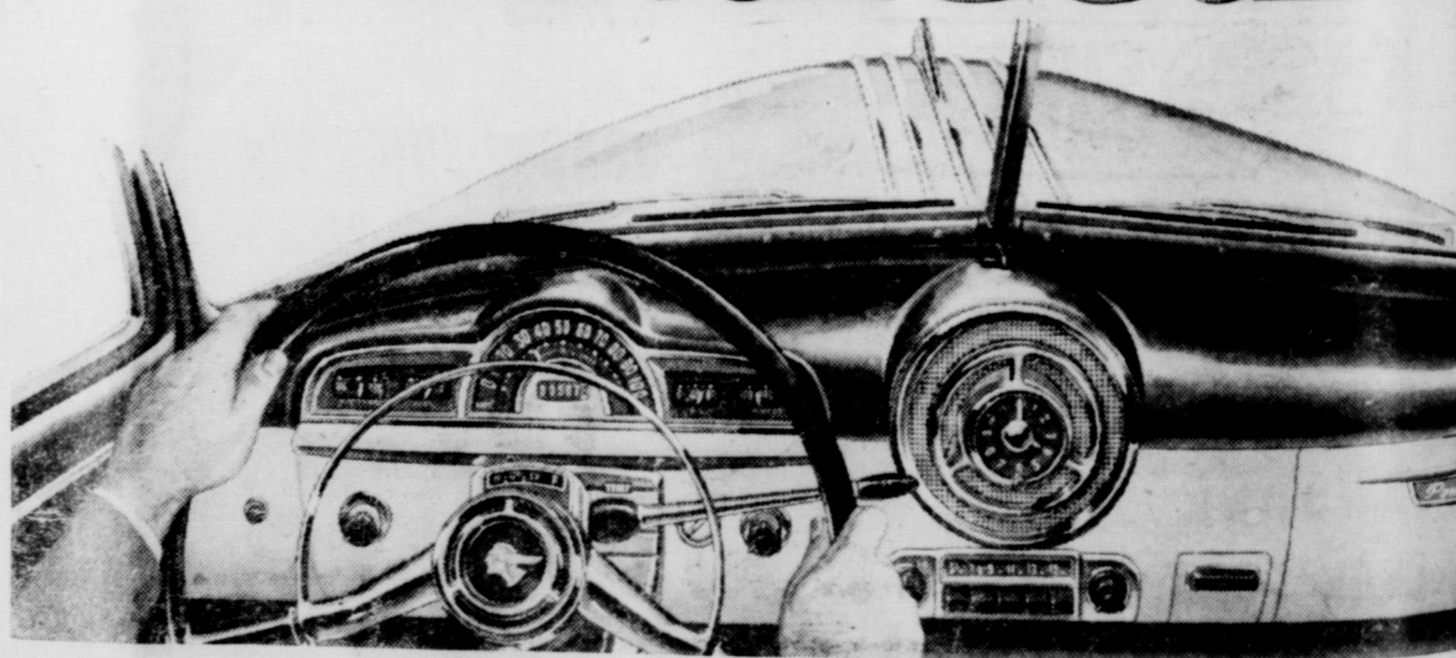

### KAS SCHOOLS FACING CRISIS

Schools are facing one of the most critical periods in their history. Charles H. Tennyson, executive secretary of the Texas Teachers Association, said as he outlined pressing for new buildings and more teachers over the entire state. School population, particularly on the elementary level, is increasing at an alarming rate, he pointed out.

For example, births in Texas in 1945—this year's first graders—numbered 156,000. In 1947, births in the Lone Star State jumped to 197,000, an increase of 65,000. If this additional group could be divided into classes of 30 children each, Texas would still need 2100 additional teachers and classrooms in just the first and second grades.

And the birthrate continues to climb. In 1950, live births numbered 203,678, and the number for 1951 will exceed that figure.

In addition to the birthrate, educators worry about the size of the graduating class as compared to the number of children entering first grade. For instance, this year

156,000 youngsters crowded into first grade rooms over the state, but only 90,000 graduated from the eighth grade. This left already over-burdened teachers with 66,000 additional children to accommodate in one year.

"The gain is going to continue to increase until at least the 1956-57 school year, Tennyson added. "By that time, the elementary schools must take care of 300,000 children in addition to the ones now enrolled. If 75 percent of this number enters public schools, it will mean 8654 additional classrooms."

The average cost of each classroom and related facilities now exceeds \$28,000. Thus Texas must spend \$242,312,000 for buildings and facilities alone if the children are to have desirable schools. And this does not take into consideration the need for new facilities to replace undesirable buildings and to relieve already over-crowded conditions. A recent survey made by the Texas Education Agency shows that Texas needs to spend \$540,294,500 to bring school buildings, facilities, sites and buses up to ideal conditions.

After the 1956-57 school year, the elementary enrollment over the state should begin to level off, but high schools will then face the problems of increased enrollment.

Texas does not face the educational problem alone. A nose count among elementary children over the entire nation showed that grade school population rose nearly three million from 1947 to 1951. In October 1950, the U. S. Census Bureau reported that enrollment in all schools and colleges was at an all time high of slightly over 30 million persons. This represents a fifth of the nation's total population and half of the population between 5 and 29 years of age.

### Your New SOCIAL SECURITY



Regularly employed farm workers, and household employees who came under Social Security last year need social security account number cards, according to John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office.

"If the worker does not have an account number, or has lost his original card," Sanderson says, "he should get one from our office."

Sanderson points out that farm and household workers who become covered under Social Security now earn Old-Age and Survivors Insurance benefits along with other workers in business and industry. "Benefits are based on wages and the worker needs to get credit for every dollar he earns up to \$3600 in a calendar year. So that he may obtain proper credit for his wages, the worker should show his social security account number card to his employer the first day he goes to work," Sanderson concluded.

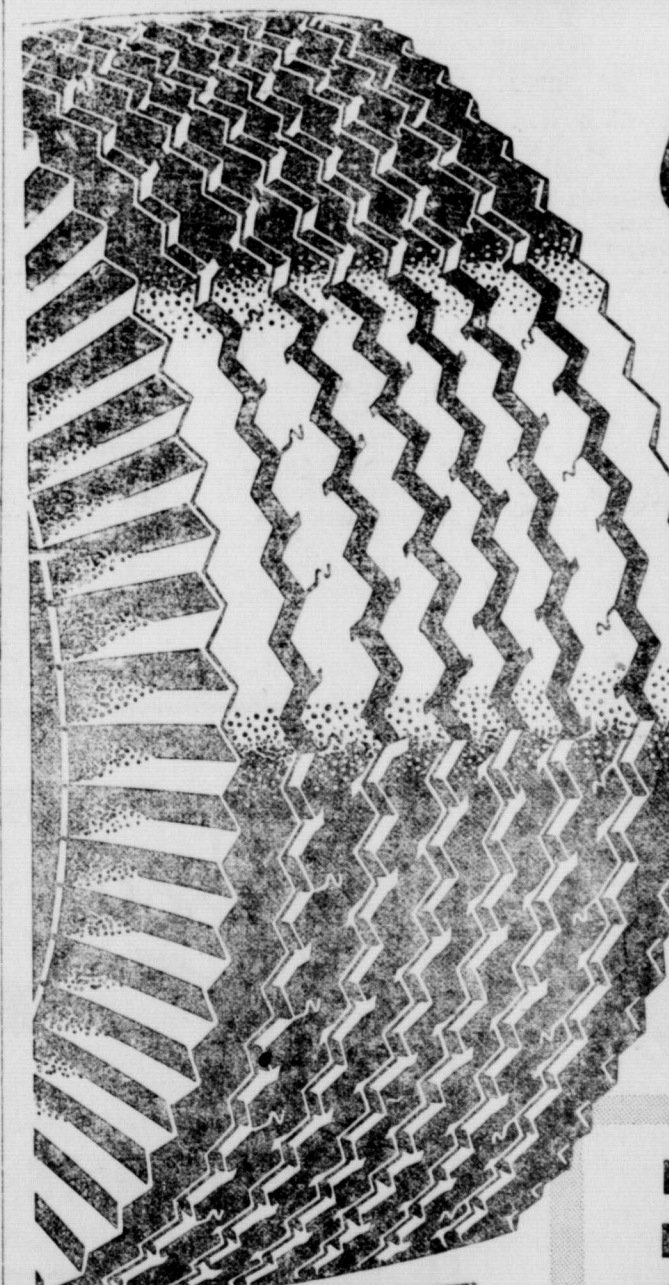

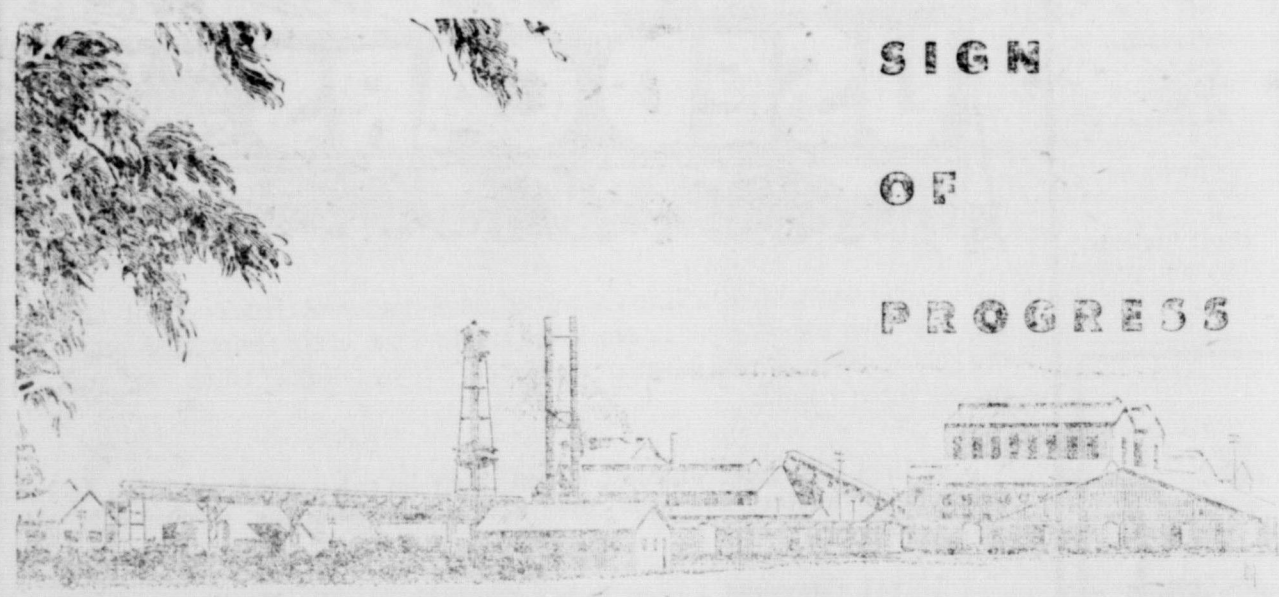
