HIGHWAY 41 IS NOW BEING HARD SURFACED

EDITOR'S NOTE—The following is an article which appeared in the Beckham County, Okla. Democrat last week regarding the hard surfacing of Highway 41 from the Texas State Line to Sweetwater, Okla. We understand that work on this project started last week.

It won't be long now until the five miles of dirt on State Highway 41 running on the Beckham-Roger Mills county line from Sweetwater west to the Texas state line will be hard surfaced.

State Highway Director C. A. Stoldt announces the paving work is scheduled to get started by Feb. 20 and is to be completed within 50 working days from that date.

The job will be done by Smith Brothers of Noble, under a \$78,872 state highway commission contract that provides for 14 inches of soil and asphaltic stabilized base and 24 foot wide paving.

The paving is going down on a 30-foot roadbed now in the last stages of construction by Honegger, Brothers of Kingfisher and costing \$72,722.

At Sweetwater the projects intersects 15 miles of paving on State Highway 30 that comes in to Erick to join US Highway 66.

Editorial

THE BOY SCOUTS

One of the finest organizations in the
country is the Boy Scouts of America. No
one can estimate the value of the good deeds
and molded characters this organization has
achieved in the United States since 1909.
Despite its youth, the Boy Scout organiza-
tion has become a tremendous influence
on the American scene. Interestingly enough,
it had a happen-so beginning. William D.
Boyce, a Chicago publisher, was in London on

a very foggy day in 1908 and, as he stood
uncertainly on the sidewalk, wondering
which way to go, a scout boy offered to show
him the way.

Mr. Boyce gave the boy the address he
was seeking and the scout delivered him to
the address. Mr. Boyce tried to give the boy
a shilling. He refused to accept it and said,
"A scout never takes money for courtesies."

Mr. Boyce became so interested in the
scout and his organization that he visited
its headquarters and met Sir Robert Baden-
Powell and learned about the scout organiza-
tion. He returned to the United States and,
in 1909, started the organization of the Boy
Scouts of America.

Today, there stands in Gilwell Park, in
England, a bronze statue of a buffalo, the
gift of the Boy Scouts of America, on which
this inscription is printed: "To the unknown
scout whose faithful performance of the
scout movement to America."

Since the beginning of the scout move-
ment in this country, just a little over forty
years ago, more than five million boys have
received scout training and beginning with
President Taft, each President of the United
States has been honorary head of the scouts
since its beginning.

The courage, ideals and courtesies of
the boy scout is legend. In America, the
organization has certainly fulfilled all the
highest ideals that Sir Robert Baden-Powell
conceived while serving in South Africa as
an English army officer. The scout organiza-
tion—founded just forty-three years ago,
this month—is an organization this country
cannot do without.

THIS BUSINESS OF RECREATION

During the year 1950, more than a
quarter of a billion dollars was spent on re-
creation. Private financing accounted for
only four percent of the total, which of
course, means that taxpayers is playing the
biggest role in the multi-million dollar re-
creation business.

According to the mid-century edition of
the Recreation and Park Yearbook published
by the National Recreation Association,
there were only about a dozen cities in the
nation that had playgrounds for small chil-
dren at the turn of the century. Now the
nation boasts over 24 thousand playgrounds,
recreation buildings, and other indoor centers.

Early playgrounds had only a sandbox,
swings, see-saws, and a bench for mothers.
Now some communities have bathing beach-
es, archery ranges, bridle paths, camps,
gardens, nature trails, shooting ranges, out-
door theaters, and toboggan slides. The im-
portance of proper recreation is thus being
realized in America's cities.

From the report it appears that swim-
ming centers attract the largest gross at-
tendance, with softball diamonds, picnic
areas, and zoos following in that order.

**Parents Warned To
Guard Against Danger
Of Whooping Cough**

Inasmuch as the incidence of
whooping cough in Texas is ex-
pected to show an increase dur-
ing the coming months, Dr. Geo.
W. Cox, State Health Officer, re-
leased a statement today urging
that strenuous efforts be made to
control the spread of this debili-
tating childhood disease. There
were 1273 cases reported during
the first 5 weeks of this year.

"Whooping cough can only be
contracted by direct exposure to
the disease, and isolation of cases
must be universally practiced if
the incidence is to be controlled,"
Dr. Cox stated.

"The infectious agent or germ
of whooping cough is transmitted

by droplets expelled in coughing,
sneezing or speaking," Dr. Cox
said. "The discharges from the nose
and throat are dangerous to sus-
ceptible persons; the need for
early recognition and careful iso-
lation of whooping cough is ob-
vious. Your family physician should
be called at the first sign."

"The first symptom of this dis-
ease is usually a dry cough, which
persists day and night and tends
to become increasingly severe. The
disease is fully developed when
vomiting of food and whooping ac-
company the paroxysm of cough."
Dr. Cox stressed the fact that
children who have whooping
cough should not attend school or
come in contact with other chil-
dren until three weeks after the
appearance of typical signs of the
disease.

Prevention and control of
whooping cough, especially among
infants and small children, may
be accomplished through use of
approved vaccine and convales-
cent serum," Dr. Cox asserted,
and it is important that such
measures be taken to protect them.
Neglecting to do so, and allowing
the young child to suffer an attack

of this disease, may seriously im-
pair his future health.

the Amarillo office of the Social Security Administration. Self-employed persons were first brought under the law effective January 1, 1951. In order to receive social security credit for their 1951 self-employment income, Sanderson reminds owners and partners in trades or businesses that they must include a special report along with their income tax return due on or before March 15.

The social security tax report is required of all persons having a net income from self-employment of \$400 or more in a year. The only exception is those persons who are farm owners or operators and professional people, such as physicians, dentists, lawyers, accountants, funeral directors, and some others.

The amount of tax from self-employment persons on their net income will range from a minimum of \$9 to a maximum of \$81. The rate is 2¼ percent on self-employment earnings up to \$3600.

It is very important, Sanderson stated, that the self-employed person apply for a social security account number if he has never had one before and also if he has lost the original card. This number will be needed when he files his income tax return and it is the only means of assuring proper credit for his net income can be given.

The Amarillo social security office will be glad to furnish further information. Sanderson suggested that all self-employed people ask for a copy of the booklet "Do you Work For Yourself?"
