School youngsters of the High Plains will have a holiday, Friday, March 14, while their teachers and school administrators will journey to Amarillo for the annual District

Supt. W. O. Carrick announced this week that there will be no school Monday, March 17, on account of St. Patrick's Day Celebration which is being held at Shamrock.

Interest is being created in the third food handlers' school which is being offered to all food handlers in the Wheeler area, March 17th through 19th. Food handlers in Mobettie, Kelton, Allison and Briscoe are invited to attend this school.

The present day public has become more and more aware of sanitary regulations and have a right to insist that food establishments

### SCHOOL POSTPONED ONE DAY

County Sanitarian W. R. Rittner announced today (Thursday) that due to the conflict with the St. Patrick's Day Celebration Monday the food handlers' school which was originally scheduled for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of next week will be held Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of next week instead. Monday's lessons will be taught Tuesday and so on.

All who are planning to attend this school are urged to take notice of this postponement and plan to attend the school Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. The school will be held at the same hours as originally scheduled.

ments observe and adhere to them. The food handlers' school is being brought here for the purpose of giving service to the public. Control measures for reducing diseases that may be contracted by infection in food and drink, must be centered around educating the food handler with proper methods of preparing and handling food.

Many of today's dreaded contagious diseases may be transmitted in food and drink, by hand to mouth infection, by cooking utensils, chinaware, silverware and other eating utensils.

This free course has been designed to raise the health standards in food handling. It is the duty of every food handler to attend these classes and earn a certificate as a trained food handler.

Those who attend four classes out of the five will be recognized by receiving a Certificate in sanitary foodhandling. Food establishments represented by at least 80% of their personnel earning certificates, will automatically receive a State placard.

J. T. Warren, Field Sanitation Advisor of the Texas State Department of Health will conduct the classes twice daily to enable personnel working on shifts, to attend one of the two classes offered each day. Morning classes will convene from 9:30 to 11 o'clock; and afternoon classes from 4 to 5:30 o'clock.

The subject matter of the lectures and the pictures shown will be different from those shown in prior food handlers schools held here.

Interest and cooperation in these health programs are urged by the local Health Department.

At a meeting of the Wheeler Independent School Board which was held last Thursday night, the group hired teachers for the 1952-53 school year.

The contracts of Supt. W. O. Carrick and Paul E. Jones were not renewed. All other teachers now in the system were offered contracts for the ensuing school year.

A Times reporter has had the fact that a rumor to the effect that Mr. Carrick resigned has been circulated about town and Mr. Carrick stated in an interview with the Times reporter this morning that such is not the case and he wishes to have this rumor spiked.

Since the meeting, Barney Teague, grade school principal for the past several years, has tendered his resignation to the board to become effective at the close of the current school year.

Carrick took over as head of the local school system approximately seven years ago when the system was in bad shape partially due to the management of his predecessor in that post. Students had staged a strike demand that Mr. Carrick's predecessor be relieved of his duties as superintendent of the Wheeler Schools and the schools were generally in bad shape due to the fact that teachers had been hard to secure during the war and the fact that the buildings and equipment had not been properly cared for.

Mr. Carrick's leadership has raised the scholastic standards of the local schools considerably during his tenure as superintendent and many improvements and repairs have been effected within the local plant and its facilities.

In connection with the hiring of teachers for the next school year, it is understood that Lyndon Sims, president of the present board, is tendering his resignation as a board member probably due to his feelings in the matter of the board to rehire Mr. Carrick as superintendent.

## GLENN KING IS CANDIDATE FOR CO. JUDGE

Glenn King, prominent farmer of the Twitty Community, this week authorized the Times to announce his candidacy for the office of Wheeler County Judge, subject to the action of voters in the July Democratic Primary.

"I have decided to ask the good people of the county for the job after talking with many of my friends since Judge George Hefley announced that he would not be a candidate for re-election," Mr. King declared.

"I realize the importance attached to the high office, and feel that the experience I had while serving on the Commissioners' Court in the past will better qualify me to fulfill the many and varied duties.

"If elected, I pledge to look after the duties of the office to the best of my knowledge and to do my dead level best to make a hand," Mr. King declared.

Mr. King has been a resident of Wheeler County for the past 43 years, residing in Shamrock and the Twitty Community all of that time. He and Mrs. King now reside on their farm northwest of Twitty.

Stating that he wants to contact as many people as possible and ask them personally for their vote and support, Mr. King said that he plans to make a house-to-house canvass of the entire county. "In the event I do not have the opportunity of contacting some persons, I hope they will take this as a sincere appeal for their consideration of my candidacy for Wheeler County Judge," he declared.

*Editorial*

**U. S. SPYING**

The Soviet Army publication Red Star  
this month charged that United States Central  
Intelligence had organized a special bureau  
to carry out anti-Soviet and anti-Communist  
plots, in an attempt to center the  
vigorous propaganda and underground of the  
Communists throughout the world.

The Soviet newspaper called for intensive  
vigilance by all Soviet Army officers and  
men against the efforts of Americans  
engaged in this anti-Communist work.

The editor cannot substantiate the Russian  
charge, contained in Red Star, but does  
praise the idea highly and offers wholeheart-

ed support to such efforts. Keen political  
observers the world over have long said that  
one of the main weaknesses of the democ-  
racies, in their fight against Communist  
ruthlessness, was the lack of positive ruth-  
less action by democratic underground move-  
ments.

Especially in places like the Middle East  
is the need for strong underground move-  
ments obvious. While the Communist under-  
ground movements use every brutal and  
ruthless method to gain their end, including  
the assassination of pro-Western leaders, the  
Democracies have failed to fight fire with  
fire and, as a result, have seen many of their  
friends killed and others intimidated in the  
political disturbances all over the world.

While it is an unpleasant decision to  
make, world events have shown clearly that  
the Western powers are losing the under-  
ground fight for control of the masses in  
several areas of the world and must adopt  
vigorous tactics if they are to turn the tide  
in this sphere.

The Communists charge U. S. Central  
Intelligence with setting up a special bureau  
with the designation "I" to carry out anti-  
Communist plots. Red Star asserts the  
United States had such a "plan" as early as  
1948, which had as its purpose the organi-  
zation of underground anti-Communist forces  
in Europe. Without being able to confirm or  
deny this charge the editor endorses the idea  
highly and suggests that if such a special  
intelligence bureau is not in operation, the  
country would do well to organize one.

**TESTING THE COMMON FLY**

The Communicable Disease Center of  
the Public Health Service has demonstrated  
that the common house fly sometimes travels  
as much as eight miles in search of food.  
More than two hundred thousand radio-  
active flies were released in recent tests and  
then certain traps were set up at various  
distances from the released points.

While the flight range of flies has been  
checked by dyes, chalk and enamel, it is be-  
lieved that radio-isotopes are better because  
they give off radiation with the aid of which  
scientists can trace them through complete  
chemical and biological processes. As a mat-  
ter of fact, in less than five minutes a few  
radioactive flies can be isolated from thou-  
sands of untagged flies.

These tests indicated that flies move at  
random from any given location until they  
detect food or breeding material called at-  
tractants. The flies fly from attractant to  
attractant and cover considerable distances,  
but of the tagged flies recaptured more than  
eighty percent were traced to within one mile  
of the point where they were released.

These tests are important in working  
out intelligent fly control programs. These  
tests indicate that importance must be at-  
tached to removing breeding sources and dis-  
posing of attractants. Unless this is done  
flies will come into cities from adjacent areas  
in search of food and breeding areas.

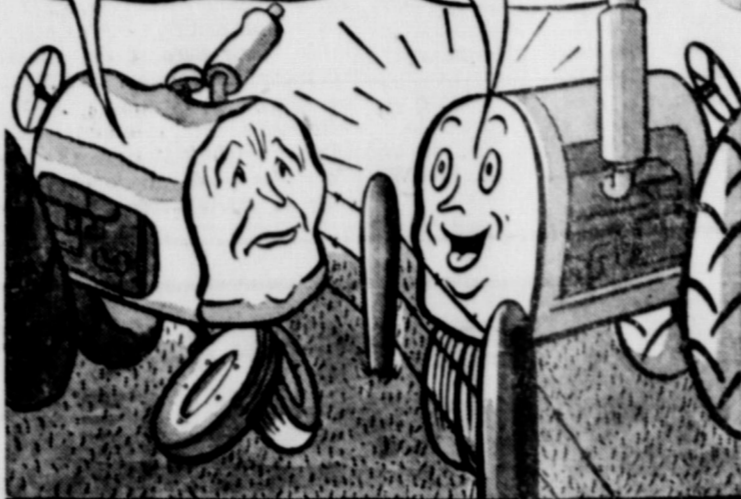
