## MUSTANGS NEED WIN FOR CLEAR TITLE

They don't come much more important than the game between the Wheeler Mustangs and the Booker Kiowas will be Friday for both ball clubs and it will be one of the top games in the Texas Panhandle.

The game has playoff hopes of both teams riding on the outcome. This writer was wrong when I wrote last week that a Wheeler win over Sunray would cinch a playoff berth.

A Wheeler win gives the Mustangs an undisputed title of District 1-1A North. A Wheeler loss and a Booker win over Follett next week would give

the Kiowas the crown and top seed and the Mustangs would be the number two team in the playoffs. A Booker win over Wheeler and a loss to Follett would throw Wheeler, Booker and Follett in a 3 way tie and a point system would be used to break the tie and then a flip of the coin if that didn't break it.

The Mustangs can clear this muddle by a win over Booker but there will be a battle before this one is over.

We lived in Donley County for 24 years and returned to Wheeler County in November of 1986.

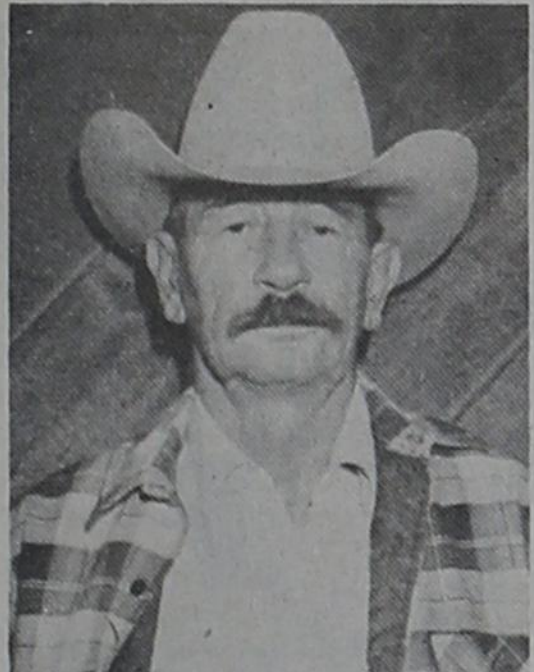
